New York - (UPI) - Once a career woman, always a career woman. Or, so it would seem in the case of three young women who had successful jobs, quit to marry and start families, became bored with the "just a housewife" role, and pooled their talents to form a fashion manufacturing concern.

They specialize in boutique items for babies - "grandma bait," as some retailers call these specialties. And for whom else, when among the three there are five small children?

The women are Patricia Perry and Evelyn Robbins, both of Manhattan, and Jane Darby of Westbury, N.Y., a suburb. Six months ago, the three - all in their 30's - decided to penetrate the booming baby market with items which were useful, and still fetching to the eye.

Their first design was a reversible carriage cover and pillow case of cerise velvet on one side, while the other, Mrs. Robbins, wife of a publishing house editor, took the sample to the buyer of a New York specialty shop. So far, the three-way partnership operates from the residences of the women. Mrs. Robbins, who has worked in advertising and as an editor of women's magazines, does some of the fabric shopping and most of the selling.

Mrs. Darby, whose husband is an art director, has a background in both editing and retelling and does most of the sketching. Mrs. Perry, whose husband is in insurance, once was a designer for Mollie Parris and Christian Dior - New York and does most of the sewing.

"As for ideas, they come from all three of us," said Mrs. Robbins.

The women intend to keep fine handwork their trademark, even as they expand production.

"We're convinced," said Mrs. Robbins, "that no matter what parents may do without, they will spend on the children."

"And of course, there are doting grandparents."

Rugged Decor Is Suggested For Boys Rooms

Chicago - (UPI) - The problem of decorating a small boy's room is where to put the "snakes and snails and puppy dog tails."

Lisa Lamberty, home furnishings coordinator, suggested meeting the challenge with a handsome but rugged early American decor.

"But leave the delicate four-poster bed of Early American tradition out of a boy's room," she counseled. "A trundle bed will reflect the same period and it's better for bouncing."

Miss Lamberty's newest design for a boy's room makes use of a Salem maple-finished bed, with the trundle or lower bed rolling out for an overnight guest. Or, it can be placed at right angles with the top bed, where space allows.

While rosebud strewn sheets and coverlets look marvelous with Early American maple or pine, Miss Lamberty is against them for a boy's room.

"Hound the stores for cotton coverlets printed with gaily colored pennants, Madras spreads, striped bolsters and tailored throw pillows. If you want to please the little fellow," she advised.

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Tips Given On Clothing Selection

In selecting colors for children's clothing one should keep in mind that attractive clothes arouse interest in a child and actually encourage them to attempt to dress themselves.

A child's coloring, personality, safety and personal preferences are the basis for color selection. An infant's skin is soft and smooth and so the pastel colors tend to enhance their appearance, but as a child increases in age their coloring intensifies and consequently they can wear brighter colors or gay plaids and prints.

Children should start learning at an early age how to select colors. It helps them learn to make a decision and also develops their color sense. In planning a child's wardrobe it is a good idea to limit the colors to two or three basic colors that harmonize, then when they select their own socks, dress, or shirt the colors will coordinate no matter which they choose.

Color also is an important part of safety since bright colors show up at a distance and motorists can easily see the child should they dart across the street and busy mothers can keep a watchful eye on them when they play in their own backyard.

Choosing clothing for a child, comfort should be of prime consideration. Also, the homemaker is wise to consider the amount of care involved in taking care of the clothing. Some factors to remember are: select washable, colorfast fabrics with wash and wear features. Some of the finished fabrics do not collect dirt as easily as coarse or nubby materials.

Printed fabrics with a colored background do not show the soil or wrinkles as easily as fabrics with white backgrounds and wide spaced patterns. The pattern in fabric should be scaled to the size of the child it is being used for. Large plaids, checks and figures are out of proportion to a child's figure. Dark plaids should have a white accent around the child's face because of the youthfulness of their skin and features.

Read the label on the garment, or if purchasing material to make a garment to learn how much shrinkage can be expected and if there are any particular instructions for the care of the material.

Consideration of a child's likes and dislikes in clothing helps to choose garments that a child will enjoy wearing. Some of these factors to consider are appropriate style, suitable color and design, wash and wear features, and the comfort in wearing the garment.
