Saigon—UPI—Election officials today confirmed President Ngo Dinh Diem's landslide reelection victory, saying he polled 89.4 per cent of the total vote in Sunday's election.

Diem was opposed by a retired rubber planter and an herb doctor, neither of them prominent in politics.

The heavy vote was a defeat for the Communists.

Prevention of Mental Health Problems Stressed at Meeting

Few people consider prevention in treatment of emotional disorders because of some basic reasons, Dr. Eli M. Bower, deputy director, liaison and prevention services, California department of mental hygiene, told more than 100 people attending the annual dinner meeting of the Family and Child Guidance Clinic association last night at Hoover school.

Society unconsciously opposes preventative treatment, but does not know why, Dr. Bower said. Until people understand these hidden reasons, treatment of emotional and mental disorders will be similar to old tests, given people suspected of insanity.

Salem—UPI—A House committee began adding coastal safeguards to three oil bills Monday, while a committee member accused a state official of apparent "fraternizing" with the oil lobby.

Youth Booked for Assault on Mother

Portland—UPI—Police late Monday booked David H. English, 18, Portland, on a charge of assault with intent to kill in connection with the wounding of the youth's mother.

The mother, Mrs. Catherine C. English, was wounded at their home early Monday morning. She was in critical condition in a hospital with a 22 bullet wound in the head.

Detectives said they were not satisfied with parts of the youth's story about the shooting. The youth told police the shooting was accidental. He said the revolver accidentally discharged while he and his mother were looking for a prowler.

peared to have been "completely fraternizing with the oil lobbyists."

"Is he working for the state, the oil companies, or what?" she asked.

Dole strongly denied the charge, and declared he was interested in having oil discovered off the coast that would benefit the state. He added such a disclosure requirement was frowned on by the U.S. geology department.

The committee postponed final action on the amendment.

Limit To Two Years

Adopted were amendments to prohibit drilling on beaches and to limit geological and seismic survey permits to two years, subject to renewal. Several smaller changes were made.

At Coos Bay, the Oregon Coast Association adopted a short resolution saying it favored offshore oil activity on the state's tidelands "providing it is properly conducted, properly safeguarded and properly supervised." The association rejected a list of suggestions by Jack Churchill, Nehalem, which asked for a resolution calling for more specific safeguards. Delegates said the legislature "can be trusted to safeguard our interests."
