In other home action the Red Raider tennis squad plays host to Humboldt State college's Lumberjacks in a pair of matches on Friday at 2 p.m. and on Saturday at 10 a.m.

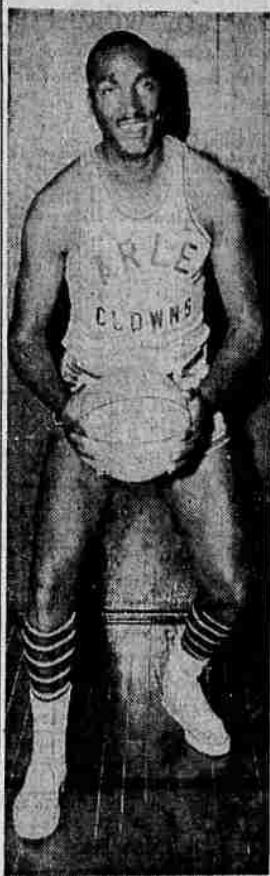
While the Raider cinder and racket crews perform at home, the Ted Schopf-coached baseballers hit the road for a three-game series with Oregon College of Education Friday and Saturday at Monmouth. The series will be the opening action in the Oregon Collegiate conference for both clubs.

Schopf's squad, now with a 1-6 record after dropping three games to Humboldt State last week end, will tangle with the Wolves of OCE, defending conference champions, on Friday at 3 p.m., and Saturday in a pair of games beginning at 10 a.m.

Dr. Alex Petersen's Raider racketeers lost a close 4-3 decision to defending District NAIA champion Whitworth here last Saturday to even their season record at 3-3. However, Dr. Petersen was pleased by the Raider's strong showing despite the loss. SOC swept three out of the five singles matches, but lost the match when Whitworth nabbed both doubles matches.

Southern Oregon's cindermen cast aside tradition by handily defeating favored Humboldt State 74-56 last Saturday, their first win over the Lumberjacks in six years. Two school records fell in the process, freshman Harold Haugen establishing one in the mile with 4:36.7 and another frosh, Jerry Arndt, setting the other with 2:02.5 in the 880-yard run.

Coach Dan Bulkley's Raider crew now is undefeated in its only two dual meets of the season. The Raiders nipped the Cal Aggies earlier.

New York—This was in 1948 at the Braves field in Boston and the wiry, hawk-faced young man tapped his cleats nervously with a bat. "I've really got butterflies in my belly," said Alvin Dark, who has just completed a successful rookie season and now faced his first World Series game against the Indians. "I'm almost as nervous as I was on the first day of the season."

Yesterday another season got going full blast and once again Dark was a rookie—this time on the manager's bench—and the "butterflies" must have beat their wings as of old against the lining of his stomach.

It's a new beginning for a lot of them, erstwhile bushers still awed by the magnitude of their new surroundings, to whom the pressure seems almost insufferable. But the tension was there, too, for the old pros like Dark and Ralph Houk of the Yankees as they began to call the payoff shots as new members of the splinter brigade.

Another junior member of the managerial order, Mickey Vernon, made his string-pulling bow Monday in the traditional Washington opener. It was an unsuccessful one, but there previously had been serious doubts as to whether the new Senators could win the American league pennant.

Houk, as the Yankees face the Minnesota Twins, is on a king-sized spot. Succeeding Casey Stengel, he must continue the old perfunctory miracles. That it is expected can be seen from the pre-season polls which placed the burden of anticipation on the Yanks. Vernon, and Dark to a lesser degree, can assume the receipt of greater leniency.

It probably will not help Houk that only 10 men in baseball history have managed to win pennants in their freshmen seasons as managers. The first was Hugh Jennings at Detroit in 1907, followed by Pat Moran of the Phillies in 1915, Kid Gleason with the White Sox in 1919 and Bucky Harris as the boy wonder of the Senators in 1924.

Five times during the '30s first year pilot phenomena were able to, as Joe Gans' mother once wired him, "Bring home the bacon." Gabby Street did it with the Cardinals in 1930, Jolly Cholly Grimm with the Cubs in 1932, Joe Cronin with Washington in 1933, Mickey Cochrane at Detroit in 1934 and Gabby Hartnett with the Cubs in 1938. Grimm and Hartnett did it after taking over from their predecessors in mid-season.

Don Jordan On Stand

Los Angeles—UPI—Don Jordan, former welterweight champion, was called back to the witness stand today for cross examination by the prosecution in the extortion trial of underworld boxing czar Frankie Carbo and four others.

Jordan, who lost his crown last May to Benny (Kid) Paret, testified for the defense Tuesday that former fight promoter Jackie Leonard and Jackie McCoy were his undercover managers when he won the title in December 1958.

Leonard was the government's chief witness in the trial involving charges that Carbo, Frank (Blinky) Palermo, Truman Gibson Jr., Joseph Sica and Louis Tom Dragna tried to muscle in on Jordan's earnings.

Leonard denied earlier in the trial he had anything to do with managing Jordan of Los Angeles.

Jordan said neither Leonard nor McCoy was listed as his manager with the state athletic commission. His manager of record was Don Neseeth, but he testified the two other men helped guide his ring career.
