The first new service of the association is a "Flora-Cheque" gift certificate, redeemable in plants or flowers in any of 11,000 FTD shops in North America or in the 18,000 shops abroad. The other service offers selected holiday bouquets that can be duplicated and delivered anywhere in the country.

The 51-year-old association is a non-profit organization now operating in 189 countries. Medford members are Medford Flower shop, Leonard Flowers and Ginn's Flowers.

Retired Workers Need Cards Filed

Retired federal employees and survivor annuitants eligible for coverage under the Retired Federal Employees Health Benefits Act must file their election cards by April 30 to enroll in the health insurance program.

John M. Young, director of the 11th U.S. civil service region, Seattle, reminded those eligible that if they do not file by April 30 they will be listed as not wanting to enroll.

He said that only about one-fourth of the 28,000 persons eligible for benefits under the new act in the region's five-state area had signed up in the first 30 days of the 60-day registration period.

Mailing of registration kits to eligible annuitants was completed early in March. The effective date of the benefits of the act is July 1 and the April 30 deadline was set to allow time to check registrations and set up records by July 1.

Coy Watson Starts New Business in Medford

Coy Watson Productions, a new enterprise to provide complete motion picture production service, has opened at 830 North Central ave.

The firm will produce films of all kinds for commercial, theatrical and television use and in sales advertising for industrial and private concerns.

Watson came to Medford from Sacramento, where he was news film director with KCRA-TV for two years.

The North Central ave. location has more than 2,300 square feet of space, and contains a complete film processing facility set up to process 8mm and 16mm black and white film, silent or sound.

Watson announced that he is also able to direct, photograph, process, edit and produce motion pictures in Medford and deliver the film on the same day it is shot.

In 1960 Mr. and Mrs. Watson and children visited Medford and Jacksonville, where his parents were married 49 years ago. The family has purchased a home at 1001 South Oakdale ave.

Watson's father was a pioneer in the motion picture industry and started Coy on his way when he appeared in a Mack Sennett comedy when he was nine months old. He and his five brothers and three sisters acted in movies as children. One of them, Bobs Watson, plays the role of a cub reporter in the television series, "Hot Off the Wire".

Oklahoma City (AP)—The Oklahoma Highway Department has erected the nation's first headlight glare deflector fence on a 3,700-foot stretch of Interstate Highway 35 in Oklahoma City.

The 3-foot high deflector was erected above a guard rail on the highway's median strip. The fence also prevents the danger of school children crossing the highway.
