Gov. Brown Won't Intervene To Save Killer From Execution

Gov. Edmund G. Brown announced that he will not intervene to save Alexander Robillard, Burlingame police officer, who is scheduled to be executed at San Quentin April 28.

Robillard, now 20, was convicted by a San Mateo county jury for the murder of Eugene Doran, a Hillsborough police officer, early on the morning of Aug. 5, 1959.

The officer stopped him after Robillard had stolen one car and burglarized another. Doran, whose third child was born after his death, died from six bullet wounds, at least one possibly fired after he was on the ground.

Hearing Conducted
Brown announced his decision less than 24 hours after conducting a clemency hearing for Robillard in Sacramento.

During the hearing, the governor indicated that Robillard's "extreme youth" bothered him. He said that if Robillard were "over 21, there wouldn't be any question" about letting him be executed.

The youth was under investigation by the FBI as the possible ringleader of a car theft gang at the time of the slaying.

San Quentin prison authorities said Robillard was notified of Brown's decision but showed "no reaction" whatever. He merely said, "Thank you," and turned away, they reported.

At his news conference later, Brown declined to comment on his reasons for refusing to intervene in the Robillard case, but he said the youth is the first minor to be executed during his administration.

Letters From Inmates
"This is also the first time I've got letters from two inmates on death row asking for clemency" for another, Brown said. He claimed this fact gave the pleas some weight.

The letters came from

Clyde Bates, 40, who set a Los Angeles bar after killing six, and Manuel Chavez, 25, convicted in the same case.

Brown said the last time a minor was executed in California was in 1944 under the administration of former Gov. Earl Warren.

Robillard's conviction has been upheld unanimously by the state supreme court.

Elsewhere, there were these developments:

Cooley: A homicide verdict was returned in a Bakersfield inquest into the death of the wife of former western singing star Spade Cooley. A nine-man jury deliberated about 15 minutes before issuing the verdict after the two-hour hearing. Mrs. Ella Mae Cooley, 35, onetime singing star in Cooley's band, was found beaten and strangled in the couple's Willow Springs ranch home April 3. Cooley, 50, has been charged with the murder.

Grammy: Ella Fitzgerald and Ray Charles won the top vocal awards at the third annual Grammy awards dinner of the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences. The record of the year award went to the song "A Summer Place" from the movie by that name. The album of the year award went to comic Bob Newhart's "Button Down Mind," a humorous monologue.

Birch: Robert Welch, founder of the John Birch Society, ran into heckling from university students in Santa Barbara when he said Chief Justice Earl Warren should be ousted. Welch, 61, a retired Belmont, Mass., candymaker, spoke before a capacity crowd of 1,000 at San Marcos High school auditorium. About 200 University of California students expressed their displeasure with boos, hisses, and snickers when Welch praised such figures as the late Senators Joseph McCarthy and Robert A. Taft.

Arsenic: A Stanislaus county superior court jury of six women and six men found Mrs. Esther May Helwinkel, 46, of Turlock guilty of first degree murder in the arsenic poisoning of her husband. The jury's verdict came after eight hours of deliberation. Mrs. Helwinkel broke down and sobbed. It was her first display of emotion since her husband, Lawrence, 51, a poultry plant worker, died Nov. 13 after a lingering illness resulting from food seasoned with arsenic.

Vets: The assembly voted unanimously on an investigation of conditions at the California Veterans Home at Yountville. The study will explore proposals to change the home from its present "quasi-military" status into a rehabilitation home.

Origami Lectures Conducted at SOC

Ashland-Demonstrations in Origami, the Japanese art of paper folding, are being presented to Southern Oregon college students attending the elementary art education classes, Miss Marion Ady, chairman of the art department, has announced. The lectures are being presented by Mrs. Makiko Doi.

Highly decorative swans, flowers, lobsters, fish, paper balloons, and other objects are featured in the lectures and each class member is taught to construct them.

Mrs. Doi, who is the wife of Richard Doi of the SOC art department, is well known in Southern Oregon because of her recent series of television programs concerning the culture and traditions of Japan. She has lectured on these and related subjects before many civic and professional organizations throughout the area.

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
