Tornado Nabs Two From Grants Pass; Yreka Beaten 10-1

Heavy hitting and bases on balls were put together effectively here yesterday afternoon by the Medford Black Tornado for a 10 to 1 baseball win over Yreka, Calif., high.

Bob Quinney hit three for four with a triple and home run. Bob Schroeder doubled and tripled in four times up. Dick Ragdale socked a three-base hit. Dan Miles, Ragdale, Quinney and Schroeder each knocked in two runs. Steve Ray hurled four innings of two hit ball for the Black Tornado.

Tony Croville hit safely twice for Yreka.

Medford collected nine hits off three Yreka hurlers who issued the same number of bases on balls.

Jiggs Sage, the first Miner to walk, walked three straight Medfordites and was relieved by Mike Jones who gave up singles to Quinney and Sam Knudsen and a three-bagger to Schroeder. Jim Barry aided with a sacrifice flyout as the Tornado rolled over five runs in the first inning.

Two more Medford markers were in the third frame on Schroeder's two-baser, Miles' single and two walks. Quinney's homer was in the fourth panel and was a fly to deep left field. Outfielder Croville going far back did manage to get a glove on the ball. But, it was a hard chance and Croville fell and couldn't hold on to it.

Two bases on balls and a Croville single for its run in the fourth inning.

Walt Wheeler took over on the mound for Medford in the third inning. He allowed three hits and no walks and had no strikeouts. Ray whiffed twice.

John Lawe and Mike Newman each doubled for Yreka in the seventh canto. Lawe was out trying to stretch his hit to three bases. Wheeler turned and threw to shortstop Miles to pick Newman off second base.

Jim Barry and Bob Quinney walked two-run home runs and Sam Knudsen blasted three hits Friday to be a doubleheader baseball sweep by the Medford high Black Tornado over the Grants Pass Caversen in the Climate city lower on the Rogue. Scores were 10 to 1 and 9 to 4.

The first game was a Southern Oregon conference contest and gave the Big Wind 2-1 standing in the loop. The second mix was kings-x and marked the Tornado's fourth triumph through seven games this season. GP suffered its second league loss and is 0-5 for the year.

Quinney's homer far into left pasture with Dan Miles aboard was a top of the fifth inning blow in the conference tangle and brought the first scoring in the game. Breaks more often than not, went against Medford in this skirmish but the Tornado on a combination of hits and GP misuses managed a third marker in inning No. 6.

After six innings of two-hit shutout ball, MHS hurler gave up two safeties in the seventh canto that GP put together for a run.

Barry's roundtripper, with Dick Ragdale on base, bounced onto the paved base parking area back of centerfield and launched a five-run sixth stanza spurge which made the final difference in the second game. The score was double-dogged 4 each after the five scheduled innings and the clock showed almost 7 p.m. after the extra frame.

Some fine field work in the clutch held off the Caversen in the opener and saved the Tornado from defeat in the second fray.

Quinney hurled a four-hitter for the Tornadoes in the counter, striking out four and walking three. Paul Blinka, GP topper, gave up five safeties, also whiffed four and walked seven batsmen.

Art Ruhl, who had two hits for the afternoon, led off the fifth inning of the opener for Medford by drawing a base on balls. Miles bunted and Blinka's throw to second base got away from Jack Sakradia. Ruhl headed and was caught in a hot box. This action ended with Ruhl out and Miles on second base. After Ragdale fanned, Quinney came through with his four-base sock.

In the sixth inning with

two out, Bob Schroeder got a free pass for Medford. Mike Neathamer singled and the ball was misplayed by Fritz DeBo in right field. The throw in got through Mike Milleman at third base and Schroeder crossed the platter. Ruhl singled and Neathamer came home from second but was ruled out for failure to touch third base.

For the GP seventh inning marker, the Caversen used hits by Dave Hauntz and Milleman and a groundout by Rich Benner. A good running catch by Medford centerfielder Ragdale ended the game.

The Tornado had the bases filled in the third inning with no one out but failed to tally. In the fourth panel, Tim White, who had doubled, attempted to steal home. He slid in under the pitch but was called out.

The Climate city club threatened in the fifth inning on a dropped third strike and two passed balls. But catcher Barry made up for it by standing firm, taking shortstop Miles' throw and tagging out Hauntz who was trying to come home on Milleman's ground ball.

Singles by Miles and Ragdale, three bases on balls and an error, along with the homer, got the five runs in the sixth frame of the nightcap.

Medford led 4 to 1 after its fourth inning batting turn in the second game. In the sixth of the fourth, Benner, Mark Milleman and Mike Milleman got to Medford pitcher Stewart Young for singles and the chucker hit a batter as the Caversen got one run.

Great throws from the outfield by Barry and Ragdale caught runners at the plate and kept GP from getting the runs that might have meant home team victory in five frames. Ragdale made his catch barehanded to get his throw off quicker.

Safe socks by DeBo and Bob Varne, a walk and a hit batter got Gants Pass a fifth inning marker.

For three Medford runs in the first inning there were singles by Ruhl, Knudsen, Schroeder and Ray Stewart, three walks and a double steal by Ruhl and Miles. In the same stanza GP scored twice on a base on balls and three Medford misuses. The fourth inning saw Barry double home Miles who had walked and stolen second and third.

Medford tagged pitcher Dave Hauntz for 10 hits and the chucker walked nine, fanning three. Young permitted six safeties. He walked and struck out three each. The Tornado recovered well from its erratic second game start. Ray Stewart at third base handled three successive fielding chances for assists and made the first putout of the next inning.

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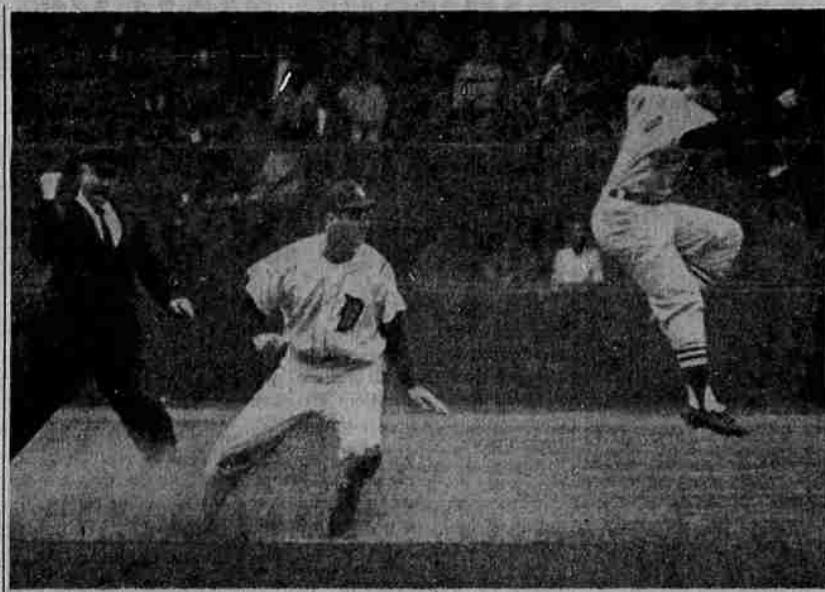

Orioles and Red Sox Notch First Victories of Season

Southpaw Steve Barber and right-hander Ike Delock pitched shutouts Saturday to give the Baltimore Orioles and the Boston Red Sox their first victories in the young American league season.

Barber gave up five hits in hurling the Orioles to an 8-0 triumph over the Minnesota Twins and Delock pitched a four-hitter as the Red Sox beat the Los Angeles Angels, 3-0.

In other A.L. games, the New York Yankees defeated the Kansas City Athletics, 5-3, also for their first victory; the Cleveland Indians topped the Washington Senators, 3-1; and the Detroit Tigers beat the Chicago White Sox, 6-2.

Barber, wearing uniform number 13, yielded five singles and walked six batters. The Orioles supported him in the field with four double plays. Dick Williams, acquired by

Baltimore in a trade earlier during the week, hit a two-run homer. Minnesota made New York ankees defeated 10es three unearned runs in the third inning off losing starter Chuck Stobbs.

Rookie outfielder Carl Yas-tremski drove home a pair of runs with a single and a sacrifice fly and scored Boston's other run after hitting a triple. Pete Runnels' two-bagger scored Yas-tremski.

The Yankees capitalized on the early wildness of Kansas City's Bud Dalrymple for four runs in the second inning. Bob Turley had a 5-0 lead until he was knocked out by a three-run upswing in the eighth. Rookie Bill Stafford saved the Tigers' victory.

Bill Bruton hit a three-run homer and Norm Cash drove in two more runs with a triple as Detroit beat Chicago. Don Mossi was credited with the victory although he was re-

moved in the sixth and Terry Fox held the White Sox to one hit in the last 3 1/2 innings.

Maintains Mastery

Jim (Mudcat) Grant maintained his customary mastery in Washington's Griffith stadium, even though he was pitching against different Washington Senators. He previously had beaten the old Senators in Washington eight straight times.

Grant was lifted for a pinch hitter in the eighth after yielding Washington's only run in the inning before on a pinch homer by Billy Klaus. Bubba Phillips made three of Cleveland's eight hits, driving in one run and scoring another. Bennie Daniels yielded all three Cleveland runs.
