Mr. Bullock came to the valley in 1902 and now lives with his youngest daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. K. J. Knutson. He has five children, seven grandchildren, and twelve great-grandchildren. He was a custodian in Medford schools from 1911 to 1938.

Psychologist Gives Advice to Wives

Milwaukee - (UPI) - A psychologist who specializes in the problems of management believes a woman who wants to help her husband's career can be extremely effective if she just leaves him alone at work.

David K. Spelt, of Rohrer, Hibler, Repligle, Milwaukee consulting psychologists, recently told wives of employees of the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Co., a wife should have "enough imagination and self-sufficiency to run a modern home without making many interruptions at her husband's office."

Spelt said interruptions are distracting to a man at work and if he "is constantly interrupted during the day by calls from home he well might be looked on as one who may be unable to give his best during the working day" when it comes to concentration and decision making.

Spelt told the wives they have "an obligation to keep material and financial ambitions in line with the family situation."

He also said it is desirable for women to have "enough intelligence to keep reasonably in stride with her husband."
