

Brown, Pender To Defend Ring Crowns This Week

New York—(UPI)—Joe Brown makes his 10th defense of the world lightweight title and Paul Pender defends the New York-Massachusetts-European version of the middleweight crown in the blue ribbon bouts on this week's international boxing program.

Brown, 35-year-old champion from Baton Rouge, La., defends against Dave Charnley, the British and European titleholder, in London, Tuesday while Pender, 30 and just beginning to cash in his share of the crown, faces former champion Carmen Basilio in Boston on Saturday night.

Brown is a 2-1 favorite over Charnley and Pender is a 12-5 pick over Basilio. Each bout is scheduled for 15 rounds, of course, with the

Pender-Basilio affair a TV-spectacular beginning at 10 p.m., est, Saturday.

Brown is making his first title defense outside the United States against an opponent he stopped on cuts in five rounds, Dec. 2, 1959. Charnley claims he hurt Brown in their previous match and figures he has a good chance if the bout is close in his home territory.

Basilio Pleases
Brown has scored 39 knockouts during a pro career in which he has compiled an 82-18-10 record. Charnley stands 37-6-1 with 22 knockouts. A crowd of about 18,000 is expected at Earl's Court stadium.

Basilio isn't ranked among the top 10 contenders but his appearance is likely to bring a capacity crowd into the Boston Garden. Although 34 and battle-worn to say the least, Basilio is a hard worker who never fails to please and has a wide following. Pender, under-rated when he first won the crown, is gaining popularity, too. Pender is 30, four years younger than Basilio.

Greensboro, N. C. — (UPI)—"I needed a good win at home and now I've got it," Mike Souchak said today of his victory in the Greater Greensboro Open Golf tournament.

Souchak, a former Duke university ace, finished with an eight under par 276 to top runner-up Sammy Snead by seven strokes and win first prize money of \$3,200. Snead had won the Greater Greensboro seven times in the past.

Bill Maxwell of Dallas, Tex., who fell to a 75 on the final round after starting the day only two strokes behind Souchak, was third with a 284. Negro pro Charlie Siford of Los Angeles, playing in his first southern PGA-sponsored tournament, wound up in a tie for fourth place with Stan Leonard of Vancouver, B. C., at 285.

Dallas, Tex.—(UPI)—Tournament-tested Louise Suggs still ruled as queen of the prettiefest golf tour today as the feminine professionals moved on to the next Texas stop—the Babe Zaharias Open at Beaumont.

The 37-year-old Miss Suggs fattened her purse by \$1,750 Sunday when she protected a three-stroke lead through the final round to post a 37-36-73 and win the Dallas Civitan Women's Open with a 72-hole score of 291.

It was her fourth tournament triumph of the season, and it marked the third year in a row the Atlanta, Ga., veteran had copped the Civitan crown.
