

Personally Speaking

Last Wednesday night at a public meeting in Gold Hill, Mayor Milton Steinmetz introduced a proposal for a city water filtration system. Steinmetz, city councilmen and interested residents are of the opinion that a dangerous situation is becoming more dangerous.

Gold Hill's water comes from the Rogue river. It is pumped into a reservoir where it is treated with chlorine to kill bacteria. The chlorine is used in high concentrations at times and causes an objectionable taste. However, this is a necessary evil. In summer months when the river becomes low, a high bacteria count is present. And in winter months, the bacteria level is increasing due to increasing population along the banks of the river and increased industrial uses of the river. Ted Gerow, of the state sanitary authority, said things aren't going to get any better.

Orie Moore, of the county health department, related some pertinent scientific information to us not long ago. The ideal situation in chlorine treatment is to have just enough chlorine to kill all bacteria. Bacteria are either in solution or clinging to solid particles in the water. The solid particles soak up the chlorine. Moore said it is possible for all chlorine to be used up by the solid materials, leaving the bacteria in solution untreated.

The solution is to have just enough of a chlorine excess to insure proper water treatment.

So what would a water filtration plant accomplish? Just this. It would remove chlorine consuming solid particles from the water. Thus, only particles in solution would have to be treated. The filtration plant won't eliminate use of chlorine. However, as Gerow said, there is a good chance the chlorine concentration could be greatly reduced.

Mayor Steinmetz has been pushing the filtration plant idea for some time. He recognizes the need for the system and is of the opinion that the sooner it can be installed the better. However, the idea of spending \$120,000 for a filtration plant puts fear in some Gold Hill hearts. And rightly so. It is a lot of money. However, the fact remains, if Gold Hill is to have good water on a citywide basis, a filtration plant is going to be necessary.

If a \$120,000 system is installed and five per cent interest is obtained on a bond issue, cost to each water user will be \$4.75 a month, according to Steinmetz. The money will be used solely for the city water system.

Currently, each user pays a monthly rate of \$3. Not all this money is used for the water system. Much of it goes for other city improvements. If the filtration plant comes into being, chances are good some sort of tax will be imposed to take care of city improvements now covered by the water fee.

The thought of a tax is shocking to some people. However, as Councilman Delos Walker pointed out, you don't get something for nothing.

It has been rumored in some quarters that Steinmetz and the council aren't presenting all the facts to the people. This is doubtful. At the public meeting, Steinmetz and councilmen put themselves at the mercy of the people in offering to answer all questions. They could be embarrassing if they were trying to hide facts. They weren't embarrassed.

We don't live in Gold Hill and wouldn't assume any share of the water filtration plant cost. However, a few cold facts are staring the people of Gold Hill in the face.

The water filtration plant is going to come if the qual-

ity of the water is to be lifted.

The current system of treating the water is dangerous healthwise. If the bacteria count surpasses the ability of the chlorine to treat it, an epidemic could break out.

And last but not least, cost of water filtration systems isn't going to go down. Money saved by investing today could be put to another important use tomorrow. Keep pushing, mayor.

Josephine Unit School Budget Unchallenged

Grants Pass — The 1961-62 Josephine County Unit School district budget went unchallenged at a public hearing last week.

Elmer Fleming, county superintendent, said there is no money in the budget for construction of new buildings. He explained that a bond issue will be necessary to finance any new construction the district might undertake. Fleming was questioned about school cafeteria lunch prices. He said experience has shown if the price is raised from the present 25 cents to 30 cents, the volume would drop enough to offset any gains. He said the cafeteria is losing money.

In response to a question about the district's ultimate goal for teachers' salaries, William E. Gilmore, district board chairman from Murphy, said there isn't any definite goal. He said a general goal would be to adopt a schedule which would enable the district to compete for good teachers.

"Obscene Books" — Jim Gleason of Murphy accused Illinois Valley High School and Grants Pass High School of having on their library shelves "obscene, lewd and subversive books" which "Christian parents felt should be removed." He also attacked sex education films shown recently in the schools. He said the films had a tendency toward corrupting students' morals.

Gleason said he represented the Murphy area. However, other residents of the area said he did not speak for them on the matter. He brought three books, which he had a student check out of the Grants Pass library.

He called the books "obscene." When questioned about where he had obtained a list of obscene books, he indicated Harold Anderson, Murphy pastor, had "dug it up." He said the group he represented requested a meeting with the county school board between now and the date set for voting on the budget. He said the group didn't feel they could pass a budget calling for a large amount of tuition necessary to send county students to Grants Pass since "tax money was being used to purchase this type of book."
