Algeria Peace Talks Hoped This Week

Paris-AP — Negotiations to settle the war between France and the Algerian rebels may begin next Friday after a two-week delay, informed sources said Saturday.

Both government and rebel leaders indicated optimism that talks to end the 6-1/2 year Moslem insurrection would open soon.

Sources here were confident the negotiations would get underway, at the latest, a few days after their predicted date of next Friday. They said the machinery set up prior to an abortive try at peace talks earlier this month would permit bargaining to resume Friday if an agreement to meet again was reached by Monday.

Calyx Spray Should Be Applied to Pears Soon

Calyx spray should be applied to pears, if needed, after 80 per cent of the petals have fallen, County Horticultural Agent Clifford B. Cordy and Entomologist Louis B. Gentner have recommended.

If new scab roots are showing or if the orchard has a bad scab history, they recommended seven pounds of Ziram per acre or 1 1/2 pounds per 100 gallons. If lots of new scab spots show up, four pounds of Cypres per acre or three-fourths pound per 100 gallons may be used, the two men recommended.

Pylla are generally well controlled, but if a spray is needed, they recommended six pounds of Parathion per acre or one pound per 100

gallons. This will also control aphids and European Red Mites and will help with control of San Jose scale. Parathion is a good insurance material because of its broad control and can be added if any spray is applied, Cordy pointed out.

Late blossoms opening on Bartlett are susceptible to blight. Ziram will give some protection, but one - fourth pound of neutral copper per 100 gallons is better, and should be used if blossoms are numerous or blight was a problem last year, Cordy said. Streptomycin is effective, but its added expense hardly seems justified except in extreme cases.

Committee Reports Given at SOCTFA Meeting in City

Several committee reports were presented at Friday night's meeting of Southern Oregon Conservation and Tree Farm association.

Glenn Duysen, Kogap, chairman of the timber committee, reported on the combined meeting of the timber and truck committees held in Grants Pass, and complimented the members from Grants Pass for their attendance and renewed interest in the aims and project of the association.

He asked for industry support of House Bill 1438, the compromise forest taxation bill, and urged members to show their support to their legislators.

Duysen praised the work of Darrell Davis and his truck committee for "bird dogging" legislation important to the lumber industry.

Fire Training Course

All logging foremen should be enrolled in the fire training short course set for May 13 at the state forest headquarters in Medford, Sam B. Taylor, Elk Lumber company, fire committee chairman, reminded those attending.

Last year's course for mill foremen and this year's course for logging foremen should help alleviate the confusion on fires of "project" proportions, Taylor said.

The Interstate Commerce commission has issued a temporary suspension of seven cents per 100 pounds reduction in outbound lumber shipments from the west, according to Russ Hogue, chairman of the SOCTFA traffic committee.

This may become a permanent suspension, Hogue said, or the ICC may call for a hearing. It could mean more than \$25 million to western lumber shippers, he pointed out, and the reduction is vital to western lumber areas if they are to compete with lumber producing areas in the east and south.
