Safety Committee Will Meet Tonight

Berry Bigham, Pacific Telephone - Northwest, chairman of the Southern Oregon Regional Safety committee, has called a meeting of the group for 7:30 o'clock tonight in the auditorium of the Jackson county courthouse.
Plans for the Safe O Rama later this month will be discussed, and additional committee assignments will be made, Bigham said. Committee members and others interested in the safety project are invited to attend.
More than 20 safety skits, demonstrations and illustrated talks are scheduled for the Safe O Rama, Bigham said. They will range from pole top resuscitation and rescue breathing demonstrations to fire arm and water safety skits. Details of the event will be reviewed at tonight's meeting.

The SORSC is comprised of public officials and private industry representatives who jointly sponsor a safety conference at two-year intervals. The work of the committee is carried on in cooperation with the Oregon State Industrial Accident commission, accident prevention division.

Judge James Bain Dies in Portland

Portland - (UPI) - Retired Circuit Court Judge James R. Bain, 71, died Sunday at his home.

Judge Bain retired from the bench March 31. He had been in ill health since breaking a hip in a fall at San Francisco last September.

Judge Bain was a life-long resident of Portland. He was a graduate of the University of Oregon and was in private practice here from 1912 until he was appointed deputy city attorney in 1923.

He was Multnomah county district attorney for 10 years until elected circuit judge in 1944.

Survivors include his widow, Ester; his mother, Lillie; a brother, Thomas E.; and two foster sons, Richard and James. All are Portland residents.
