

Republican Says Don't Be 'Too Fair'

Don't be "too fair" in politics, or you'll lose the election. This is the theory of Gene L. Brown, Grants Pass attorney, who spoke for the April meeting of the Medford unit, Oregon Federation of Women's Republican clubs, held yesterday noon at North's Chuck Wagon.

Mr. Brown spoke under the title "are you too fair-minded to be a good Republican." He said "It's impossible to admit for most of the time that a man is a good, able fellow and then start pointing out his deficiencies when he becomes a candidate. You can't praise a man part of the time and then start talking against him in a campaign."

"We're apt to give too much credit to the opposition," he said. He believes this is not political dishonesty, but simply the facts of political life, a realistic, practical approach to winning elections.

Mr. Brown advised his fellow Republicans to vote for their party's candidate, even though they believed the opposition candidate might be more able. He qualified this somewhat by adding that voters must draw the line if a candidate was too bad, but said in that case they should not cast any vote for that office.

Compares Men
The speaker, who at one time served in the Oregon legislature, began his talk by asking "What is a Republican?" He pointed out the differences in such men as Barry Goldwater, former President Eisenhower and Richard Nixon, or, on the state level, such men as Robert Duncan of Medford, Monroe Sweetland and Harry Bolvin, all Democrats. He added that "Bolvin is more conservative than Goldwater, and Sweetland is about as far left as a Democrat can go."

Mr. Duncan he described as a "total liberal who votes contrary to his beliefs" if it is politically expedient to do so. Later he said "Duncan talks one way and votes another because he thinks it will get him elected governor."

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berger and former Governor Robert Holmes as examples of men who enjoyed political triumphs because the Republicans in the state were "too fair." Mr. Brown was in the legislature when the late Senator Neuberger was also serving and told his audience yesterday that when he attempted to stand up to the latter, his fellow Republicans chided him and said "let him talk, it won't do any harm."

"We were too fair with both Neuberger and Holmes," Brown declared. "If you're
