

## Harvey Aluminum Cooperation Lauded

Portland - (UPI) - The State Sanitary Authority has praised cooperation of Harvey Aluminum Co. of The Dalles and has continued indefinitely a hearing on air pollution.

An order to the company holds the hearing in abeyance as long as Harvey cooperates with SSA's engineers in a joint effort to determine what additional air pollution controls might be needed.

## Shakespearean Festival Lauded

Portland - (UPI) - A top executive of Pan American World Airways cataloging Pacific Northwest cultural achievements Monday night, made special mention of Ashland's Shakespeare Festival.

Robert B. Murray Jr., the airline's executive vice president, told a dinner meeting of the Pacific Northwest Trade association that the Festival "has achieved worldwide renown."

"As perhaps you know, the 40 performances given last year drew the attendance of some 80,000 people," he said. "More important was the fact that these people came from all over the world to experience the meaning of Shakespeare's immortal plays in a setting uniquely Elizabethan. In connection with the Festival, Dr. Margery Bailey's Institute of Renaissance Studies has likewise captured the attention of scholars throughout the world."

## Spring Returns In Most of Nation

Spring bounced back today on the heels of warm air streaming north and east from the Gulf of Mexico.

The Midwest gradually returned to normal from its week end pummeling of snows as high as 20 inches in Minnesota. Snow on downtown Chicago streets vanished overnight after a 6.8-inch fall between Saturday night and Monday.

Warmer air from the gulf raised temperatures to the 40s from the middle Atlantic Coast southwest along the Appalachians and west to Colorado. The mercury ranged from 50 to the low 80s in the Carolinas, most of the Deep South and Texas.

San Francisco celebrated the 55th anniversary of the city's great earthquake and fire in 57-degree weather under partly cloudy skies.

## Speed, Drinking Top Death Causes

Salem - (UPI) - More than 21 per cent of Oregon's fatal traffic accidents in 1960 involved excessive speed and drinking, the Oregon Motor Vehicles department said Monday.

A special study revealed evidence in drinking in 13.2 per cent of the deaths. There were 385 fatal accidents in 1960 and they claimed 463 lives.

The department said intoxication figured in 1.3 per cent of the deaths.

The department distinguished between "intoxication" and "evidence of drinking" because, it said, "a driver does not have to be legally intoxicated before consumption of alcohol definitely affects his ability to drive safely."

Excessive speed accounted for 6 1/2 per cent of the fatal mishaps.

## The Medical Roundup

**Acid Stomach or Burnings**  
Many people beg me for information about burnings in the stomach, but I cannot help them without knowing more about their symptoms. If the burning remains in one spot in the pit of the stomach it is practically always of nervous origin; it is out in the skin, and it hasn't anything to do with the stomach.

If, however, I ask a person to show me where his burning is, and he starts with his hand over the pit of his stomach and runs it up to his neck, I know he has heartburn, which is an entirely different condition. This discomfort seems to be produced when some of the acid juice which is normally in the stomach, regurgitates, or runs back into the gullet.

In order for this to cause distress, the gullet must first be sensitized in some way. There are many mechanisms which can produce such sensitization. It can follow the eating of some food, like radishes or onions, to which the person is sensitive, or it can follow the smoking of some particular brand of tobacco, or it can follow the blowing of one's stack. Many a hot-tempered man has told me that if he blows up, he will be "on fire" for the next three or four days. It is interesting that a tendency to heartburn runs in Jewish families.

I have asked scores of people with heartburn how they get rid of the burning, and they say that much better than swallowing a tablet is to take a couple of the tablets or a little sodium bicarbonate (baking soda) and dissolve a half-teaspoonful in half a glass of water and then sip the water. This washes the acid out of the gullet and thereby gives prompt relief.

I don't know any good treatment for burning in the pit of the stomach. Also, I cannot say right off what is a cure for "acid stomach" due to indigestion. Sometimes the only cure comes if the person will keep a record to see if his burning stomach comes only after he has eaten some particular food.
