The living room of the home was decorated with lavender and white stock and white asters. The dining room decorations were also in lavender and white.

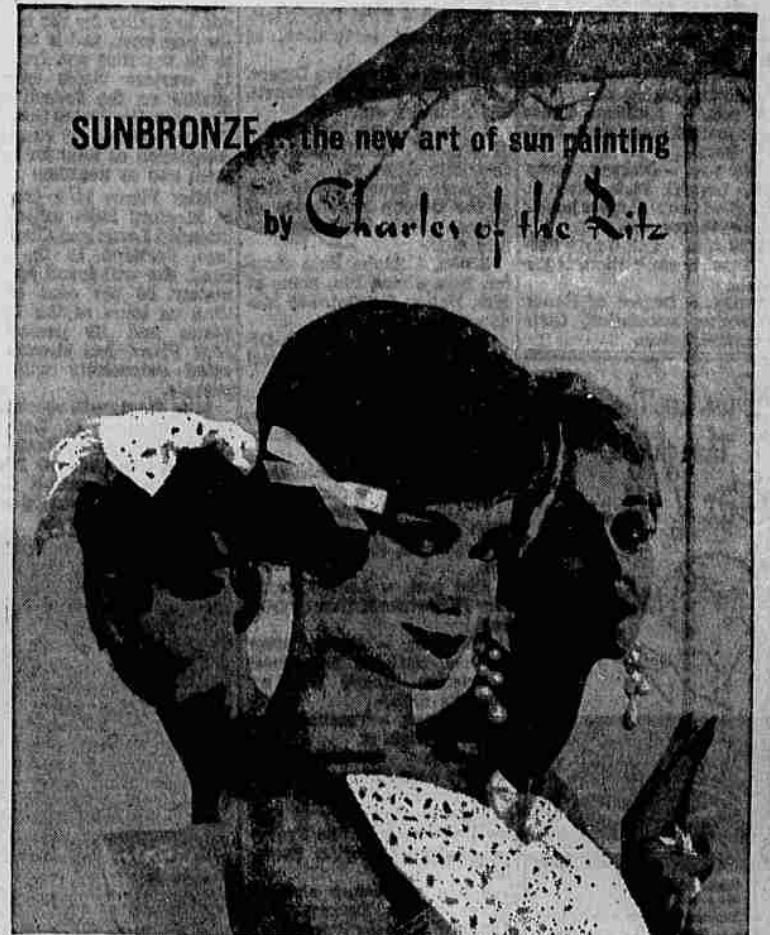
