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Mary Pierce Is Accepted For WAF Band

Miss Mary E. Pierce, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Pierce, Pierce heights, Medford, has enlisted in Women in the Air Force for an assignment with the United States Air Force Women's band.

According to M. Sgt. Harold K. O'Leary, local Air Force recruiter, Miss Pierce is the first young woman from Oregon to qualify for the band in the past year, and is believed to be the first one from the 11 western states ever to qualify on the French horn.

The recruiter states that Miss Pierce qualified by successful completion of tests for enlistment and by audition.

Miss Pierce is a graduate of Medford High school and attended Lewis and Clark college, Portland. In the WAF band, she will spend approximately 60 per cent of her time on tours of the United States and its possessions. Miss Pierce has already traveled extensively with her parents.

Miss Pierce will receive her basic training at Lackland Air Force base in Texas and will then proceed to Norton AFB, San Bernardino, Calif., where she will join 50 other WAF band members.

Winner Of Award Announced

Miss Martha Simpson, senior at Medford High school, won first place in Oregon in the American Legion Auxiliary National President's scholarship contest. Her entry has been entered in competition on the national level for a \$1,000 scholarship, according to Mrs. Kathryn Stancliffe, education and scholarship chairman for the auxiliary.

As state winner, Miss Simpson will receive a \$300 scholarship which would go to the second place winner in Oregon if she receives the national prize. The scholarship is awarded to daughters of deceased veterans for first year's college expense.

She is a four-year honor roll student, member of Torch honor society, uniform manager of the band, member of the senior symphony, Future Business Leaders of America, La Tertulia Spanish club, International Relations League serving as a delegate to the state convention in Eugene in March, participated in Student Government duty filling the position of public works director, has been named to the Academic Honors list and has a pen-pal in Alba, Italy, under the Town Affiliation program for Medford's sister city.

In previous years she has also participated in debate, varsity band, Boosters club and the Horizon club. She also assisted her parents in the operation of the Roxy Radio network sponsored by the Southern Oregon Conservation and Tree Farm association.

The booklet is compiled annually by the American Legion Committee on education and scholarships for the purpose to interest and assist all children to further their education. Eagle Point—Mrs. Gertrude Haak, South B street, was honored with a surprise luncheon and party in honor of her 86th birthday anniversary Friday, April 14, at the home of Mrs. Ray Chamberlain, Brownboro road. Mrs. Haak was born in Grand Rapids, Mich., April 18, 1875, and came to Eagle Point in 1908 with her husband.

The Haaks settled on the old Leverette orchard, or what is now the Vaughan place, and moved to their present location in 1930. Mrs. Haak's husband died in 1948. Two adopted children of the couple live in California. Mrs. Haak's homestead includes about one-half acre of ground, where she gardens. "I just love to grow things and work with growing things," she said as she showed her many flowers, both outside and inside. She has a small vegetable garden for her own enjoyment and use.

Mrs. Haak, Mrs. Clarence Davies, Mrs. Wilfred Davies, and Mrs. Karl Von der Hellen started the first garden club in Eagle Point during World War II. The honored woman has been active in the community, and during her earlier days worked with the Eagle Point Grange and the Jackson County Pomona Grange.

"The study of the Word and teaching it is my main and only interest now," Mrs. Haak stated. She says she can't remember exactly how many years she has taught the adult Bible class at the Eagle Point Community church.
