Some of these funds have been used for construction of a giant new bulk-unloader which will cut importing costs of ores, ore concentrates and other dry bulk cargoes.

Yreka City Council Accepts \$109,317 Swim Center Bid

Yreka — The Yreka City Council accepted a bid of \$109,317 for construction of the Ringe Memorial Swimming center at its meeting April 20.

Geremia Paddock Pools, Inc., of Sacramento, submitted the low bid. Seven bids were submitted and opened. However, one of these was a telegraphed bid of \$89,789 and was termed unacceptable.

Bidding was originally opened in March. At the March 2 council meeting only one bid was submitted. Myers Jones Construction company, of Medford made a bid of \$109,

800. At that time, the council voted to postpone action. At the March 2 meeting, Councilman Harry Friedman said the reason for lack of bids should be investigated to see if steps could be taken to remedy the situation.

One Yreka contractor indicated he had intended to bid but saw it couldn't be done with money available. He said other contractors in the area felt the same.

Following acceptance of the Geremia bid, Mayor Matt McNeil expressed disappointment there were no lower bids, but he added, "at least we had a choice."

Five alternate pool bids were rejected. Four called for use of "inferior materials, or construction" and would have meant deductions in cost. The fifth was use of concrete instead of funnite floors and would have raised the cost slightly.

Four councilmen and Oscar Plemma, city engineer, were named to direct construction once it starts.

Josephine County Medical Disaster Force Organized

Grants Pass — Preliminary plans for organization of a medical force to cope with any major disaster in the Josephine county area were made at a meeting of county doctors Friday.

All county medical doctors plus two oral surgeons, an ophthalmologist, x-ray specialist, Josephine General hospital administrator and hospital head nurse attended the organizational meeting.

Others attending included representatives of city police, county sheriff's office, city fire department, state police, civil defense, sheriff's posse, police reserves and ambulance companies.

Director — Dr. John R. Boe will be director of the disaster force. Dr. D. McCarthy was named alternate director.

Doctors were assigned various points to be set up in case of a disaster.

Plans were made for a trial run of the disaster plan on Thursday afternoon, May 25.

Suit Filed Against Grants Pass Concern

Portland — A suit under the Federal Wage-Hour law for \$3,772 in back pay allegedly due six employees of Sunny Valley Lumber company, Grants Pass, has been filed in federal district court in Portland.

The action was filed in the name of Secretary of Labor Arthur J. Goldberg, upon receipt of written requests from the employees, as provided by the statute.

The complaint alleged that the firm failed to pay the employees the required one and one-half times the regular rate for time worked in excess of 40 hours per workweek. Five of the claimants were employed as log truck drivers and the sixth as a mechanic.

Filing of the complaint followed an investigation of the firm by the U. S. labor department's wage and hour and public contracts divisions.

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
