Water Shortage in Western Area Seen

Washington—(UPI)—Soil conservation service forecasts of snow runoff indicate water shortages are in prospect over a wide area of Utah, Nevada, and California extending to adjacent parts of Oregon, Wyoming and Arizona.

The service said normal streamflow is expected only in the northern half of the Columbia River Basin and in the North Pacific coastal streams.

Forecasts range from two-thirds down to one-quarter of normal streamflow.

The outlook in western Oregon has improved materially with reservoir storage slightly below normal.

Higher Welfare Budget Approved

Salem—(UPI)—A Ways and Means subcommittee has approved a \$101 million state welfare budget—\$1 million faster than Gov. Mark Hatfield planned.

The increase was accomplished at a saving of \$1.5 million in state funds.

The subcommittee cut the state general fund appropriation from \$42 million to \$40.8 million, and postponed a medicare program for the elderly until November at a \$706,000 saving to the state.

At the same time, the subcommittee picked up some \$3 million in additional federal funds, more than offsetting the cuts.

Major increase was \$1.9 million in aid to dependent children. The subcommittee also found extra federal funds for foster care and old age assistance for nursing home patients.

Absentee Ballots Tie Up Election

Hornbrook—Last April 18, voters in the Hornbrook, Calif., school district voted to recall board members Jack Wayne and Frank Cardoza. The vote was 82 to 80 against Cardoza, and 80 to 78 against Wayne.

In a separate ballot measure, however, Wayne was elected by a considerable margin to serve a new term on the board beginning in July.

And yesterday, two absentee ballots were received. Both favored Wayne and Cardoza in the recall election. So, by tie votes of 82 to 82 and 80 to 80, they will be retained on the board.

Woman Dies After Accident

Ashland—An Ashland woman died last night a few hours after she and her husband were involved in an accident. Mrs. Louise Knighten, 64, of 2245 Highway 66 was dead on arrival at Ashland General hospital shortly before 9 p.m. Her husband, Chester, 64, had been hospitalized earlier following the accident.

Ashland police said a car driven by Julia Tummers, 56, of 4815 Hamrick rd., Central Point, collided with a pickup truck driven by Knighten at 5:25 p.m. Knighten was turning left onto Van Ness ave. from North Main st. when the collision occurred. The Dailey car was coming from the opposite direction, police said.

Knighten received lacerations about the head and was taken to the hospital by ambulance. Mrs. Knighten accompanied her husband. When an attending physician offered to examine her, she indicated she had to return home to take care of livestock as soon as she knew her husband was out of danger. She said she was feeling well and returned to their farm home a short time later.

Ashland police called the hospital shortly before 9 o'clock to check on Knighten's condition and were informed Mrs. Knighten had just been brought in and was dead on arrival.

No citation was issued in connection with the accident.

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Employees Meet With Union Official

About 60 employees of the valley's fruit packing houses met Tuesday night with Robert Shaw, secretary-treasurer of Teamsters Union Local 962, to discuss organizational problems. Shaw said today. The workers came from "all packing houses in the area," according to Shaw, and asked questions about methods of organizing, and holding elections. The Teamsters official said those attending told him that many other packing house workers in the valley were interested in union membership, but were afraid to attend the meeting for fear they would be fired from their jobs.

Shaw earlier confirmed reports that attempts are being made to organize workers, but said he didn't want to mention names of companies specifically, because it might jeopardize jobs of employees.

Resolution Opposes John Birch Society

Portland—(UPI)—The Multnomah County Republican Central Committee's executive board Tuesday unanimously passed a resolution leveling opposition to the John Birch Society.

The resolution took exception to "any unethical methods and any untrue or slanderous charges which may have been adopted, urged or leveled by officials or members of the John Birch Society."

Chairman Bob Packwood of the GOP committee said the resolution commended many patriotic motives of many members of the society. But it opposes attacks upon such men as former President Dwight D. Eisenhower and Chief Justice Earl Warren.

The resolution stated that the Communist menace can be more successfully fought by methods which respect the rights of all.
