Jim Barry and Tim White each slammed two-run round-trip hits yesterday for the major fireworks as Medford high bounced Crater here 6 to 1 in Southern Oregon conference baseball.

With the verdict Medford pulled back even with Klamath Falls at the head of the league and District 6 A-1 standings. Crater dropped from a tie for third into fourth position.

Barry got his big wallop in the third inning with the ball rifling into center field and bounding off the school building. White's circuit smash was deep into left field in the sixth frame.

Bob Quinney went the distance on the mound for Medford. He yielded five hits and four bases on balls and struck out Comet batters eight times. Two of the walks paved the way for Crater's only run. Quinney weathered a couple of other precarious situations.

The Black Tornado got four hits and four runs off pitcher Doug Pfaff in five innings. He was lifted for a pinch-hitter in the sixth inning and Medford got its other two hits and two runs off Mike Pepper. Pfaff walked just three and fanned two.

Crater's Pat Pepper was the

only player with two hits. Sam Knudsen doubled for Medford.

Comets Score
The Comet run came in the fifth inning. Quinney walked Pfaff and Mike Glines and Lou Alvarez advanced them with a sacrifice. Pfaff scored when shortstop Dan Miles juggled a ground ball by Ed Allen.

Medford got one run in the second inning on Knudsen's double, a high throw error by third baseman Mike Glines and a single by Mike Neathamer. In the third inning Crater shortstop dropped Dick Ragsdale's fly ball but Ragsdale was forced out at second base on outfielder Loyal Higginbotham's throw-in after Bob Quinney's fly fell into center field. With Quinney on first sack Barry homered.

For a single marker in the fourth inning White drew a base on balls, advanced on Neathamer's ground out and tallied on a safety by Art Ruhl. Bob Schroeder singled ahead of White's homer in the sixth.

Both Medford and Crater see week end action. The Tornado will go to Klamath Falls on Friday and Crater to Grants Pass. Medford entertains Ashland on Saturday while Crater is host to Klamath.

Bransom Spurs SOC To Track Victory

Ashland—Sophomore sensation Doyle Bransom racked up his fourth straight triple victory of the track and field season as Southern Oregon's Red Raiders crushed Shasta Junior college 89-33 in a dual meet on Fuller field here Tuesday afternoon.

Triumph was also Raider's fourth consecutive dual meet win of the season. A whopping total of eight meet record, two field and one school mark fell as the men of SOC nabbed 12 of the 14 events and tied for first in another. Bransom easily won the 100-yard dash in a swift 9.9 seconds, the 220 in 22.2, and the broad jump with a leap of 21 feet even in picking up the triple. The Jacksonville speedster is undefeated in all three events this season.

Adding a pair of triumphs each to the Raider total were senior Len Dobry who won the shot put with a toss of 43 feet, 11 1/2 inches, and the discus in 128, 8 1/4 inches, and sophomore Howard Hartman who skinned the high hurdles in 15.9 and the lows in 25.6. Both were new meet record times.

Freshman Harold Haugen, owner of the school mile standard, added the 880 yard mark to his collection with a record-breaking 2:00.7 clocking. Another freshman, Jerry Arndt, held the old mark of 2:01.7 set earlier this spring. Arndt, switching to the mile, took that event in a time of 4:41.8 for one of the records.

A pair of Phoenix frosh, Ron Baker and Ken Jorde, placed second and third behind Dobry in the shot to give the Raiders a sweep in that event. SOC also swept the 220, where Kern Bennett and Rich Lenhart finished behind the fleet Bransom.

The other meet mark to fall was to Terry Boatman and his 10:09.8 clocking in the two-mile.

Soph Ora Bannister added another Raider first with a 51.9 time in the one-lap 440 dash.

The speedy foursome of Bransom, Bannister, Ken Coffman and Chuck Swingle won the mile relay in 3:32.7 for SOC.

Shasta Sweeps High Jump
Shasta's only first place finish was in the high jump

where the trio of Larry Johnson, Roger Penrose and Howard Wilson scored a sweep. Johnson won with a leap of six feet even.

In the pole vault Shasta's Ron Ott tied with SOC's John Dickerson and Brad Flannery for first at 10-6.

Next meet for the Raiders is a dual match with Oregon College of Education here this Saturday at 1 p.m.

Medford high's junior varsity baseballers got one hit, 10 strikeouts pitching by Stewart Young and rallied in the late innings to edge Crater jayvees 8 to 6 at Central Point yesterday.

Crater took a 6 to 1 jump with five runs in the third inning. Medford tied the fracas with five markers in the fifth canto and scored what proved to be the winning tallies in the sixth.

For the two runs in the sixth Dick Deffley singled, Don Anderson doubled and Wayne Couch sacrificed. There was an error and a base on balls.

Anderson, Gary Miller and Bill Funk singled in the fifth inning for Medford. There were walks and an error in the inning.

Ashland-Sound hitting and pitching on the part of the Southern Oregon college Red Raiders paved the way for a 9-1 trouncing of arch-rival Oregon Tech in an Oregon Collegiate conference baseball game here Tuesday afternoon.

Shortstop Dave Hughes' two-run homer in the first inning got the league-leading Raiders off and running to their fifth straight OCC win without a loss.

Solid hurling by Don Vannice, Earle Tichenor and Larry Carr put the third-place Owls down on nine hits and one unearned run which was the result of two Raider fielding errors in the fifth inning.

Vannice started for the Raiders, but retired after two innings after giving up four Tech hits. Tichenor, the winner, took over at that point and gave up only five Owl safeties while striking out two before giving way to Carr who hurled the final inning.

The stocky Raider freshman fanned all three men he faced. Hughes' roundtripper in the first, a line shot over the right-center field fence at the 360 foot mark, chased home teammate Joe Funderburg who had been aboard via an Owl error.

Sacrifice Flies
Two more SOC counters came home in the third as Funderburg was again safe on an Owl miscue, followed by a single over the shortstop's glove by Damien Rossetto and timely sacrifice flies by Hughes and Kerm McLeMore.

Another Tech miscue put John Buck on first to lead off the fourth frame. John Cook, the Raider's leading hitter of the afternoon with a three-for-four performance, singled to right. Eldon Francis sacrificed with Buck scoring all the way from second and Cook moving to third, scoring seconds later as he stole home against OTI loser, Gene Branson.

Two more Raider markers crossed the plate in the fifth as McLeMore singled, catcher Jess Munyon doubled off the fence in deep right, and Cook rifled a single which scored both runners.

Bransom who was reached for 10 SOC hits in the first five innings, was pulled by OTI coach Jim Cordial in favor of Max McKibbin in the sixth. McKibbin allowed the Raiders only two hits the rest of the way, one by Mike Parsons in the sixth and another by Cook in the seventh.

Lone OTI Tally
Cook's one-baser put Ray Endicott, who had been hit by a pitched ball, on third from which he scored when Francis was safe on the fifth OTI error of the game.

Oregon Tech's lone tally came in the fifth off Tichenor as Bransom was safe on McLeMore's bobble at third, a throwing error by Buck at first, a fielders choice which erased Bransom at third and a run-scoring single to left-center by Don Gredsel which plated Ramseyer.

Three timely double plays by the Raider defense wiped out Owl scoring threats in the fifth, sixth and eighth innings.

McLeMore and Francis each had two hits to back up the deadly one-two punch of Hughes and Cook.

The unbeaten Raiders host Portland State (2-0) in a three
