

OSC Students Win Honors

Corvallis — Top national honors have been won by stenography students at Oregon State college for the fourth straight year.

The OSC students repeated as winners of first place in International college shorthand competition sponsored annually by Gregg Publishing company.

Helping to win the honor for OSC were two Medford students, Nancy G. Adams, route 4, box 410H, a junior; and Annette G. Davidson, 1308 Eureka Circle, a freshman.

In the contest, student and teacher entries are sent into the company and judged on shorthand style and form of shorthand character. Citations are given to the three U.S. colleges whose students rank highest.

OSC has been among the top three schools every year but one since 1954, and its record of four first places in a row is the best compiled by any college. The work of 178 advanced students made up the OSC entry. Their teachers were Mrs. Louise Orner, Mrs. Hilda M. Jones, and Lloyd Q. Larse.

The demand for OSC-trained secretaries and business education teachers far exceeds the supply of graduates every year, according to Dr. C. T. Yerian, head of the department of secretarial science and business education.

Jacksonville Boy Named OSC Advisor

He was forced to abdicate by the Indian government in 1927 after Pakistani tribesmen invaded his mountain kingdom.

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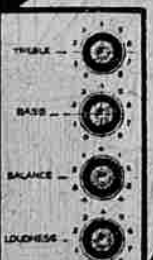
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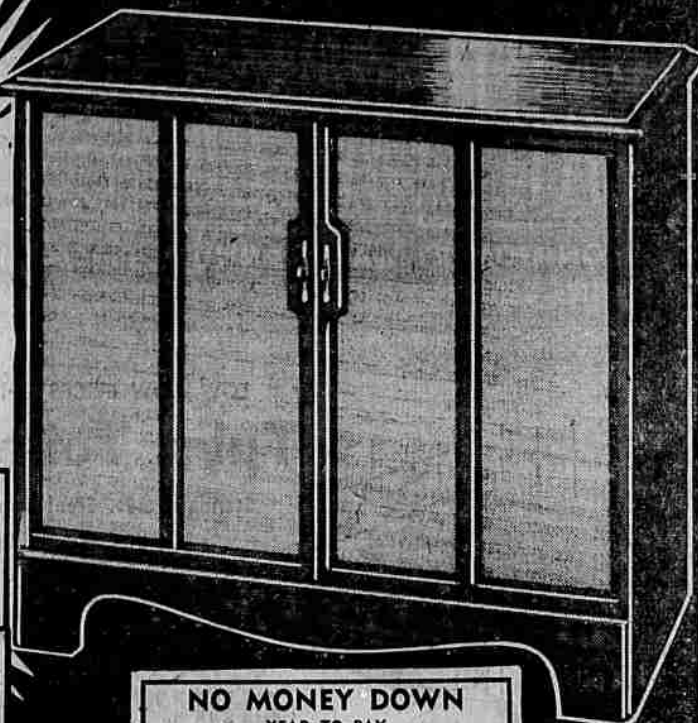
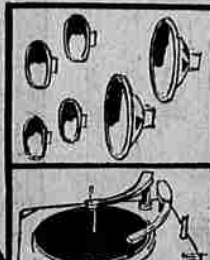
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
