Ribicoff Wants To Debate AMA Head

Washington—UPI—Welfare Secretary Abraham A. Ribicoff has told the American Medical Association he wants to debate medical care for the aged with its president, and no one else. He chided the group for suggesting a lesser official.

F. J. L. Blasingame, AMA executive vice president, had challenged Ribicoff to a debate. Ribicoff replied that he would be glad to debate AMA President Dr. E. Vincent Askey.

But the Health, Education and Welfare Department said Blasingame had sent Ribicoff another telegram suggesting that the secretary debate with another AMA official instead of Askey.

X15 Could Change Course of History

Chicago—UPI—Test pilot Scott Crossfield has compared the X15 rocket plane to the cotton gin, the locomotive and the automobile as a development that could change the course of history.

"World leadership in practical, objective space-directed work lies in the X15 and subsequent models of it," the former Navy pilot said. The United States might take the "practical" lead in the space race with the X15, Crossfield told newsmen Wednesday at the 32nd annual meeting of the Aerospace Medical Association.

Crossfield, who did early experimental work with the X15, said the Soviet man-in-space feat is a "great step forward." But, he said, the space race "involves more than getting a man into space. I really don't know who's ahead."

Auto Workers To Decide on Goals

Detroit—UPI—The United Auto Workers meets today to decide what it wants from the auto industry in a new round of contract talks this summer.

About 3,000 delegates attending a special convention will adopt a specific set of goals for the UAW in the forthcoming negotiations with automakers.

UAW president Walter P. Reuther was scheduled to open the convention with a keynote address outlining the union's broad objectives. Tonight the 3,000 delegates and 2,000 guests will attend an anniversary dinner marking the UAW's 25th birthday. The union was founded in South Bend, Ind., April 27, 1936.
