New Catalogs Available at OSC; Lists More Classes

Ashland—New catalog bulletins for the summer session and the academic year, 1961-62, are now available. Hugh G. Simpson, Southern Oregon college director of publications, has announced.

Those interested in attending the college may obtain the bulletins by contacting Mrs. Mabel W. Winston, registrar. Simpson pointed out that there were a number of important changes in the regular catalog which reflected the growth of the college in terms of enrollment, buildings and facilities, and academic offerings.

Attending the increasingly high standards of the institution was the inclusion of a complete Honors program as a challenge to students of superior scholastic ability. The program offering consists of accelerated classes; advanced placement; a lower-division General Honors program; and an upper-division Degree Honors program.

Students who complete advanced work in high school under the Advanced Placement program of the college entrance examination board and who receive satisfactory grades in examinations administered by the board, may, on admission to SOC, be permitted to enter advanced or accelerated classes.

Entering freshmen who demonstrate high scholastic aptitude may also be allowed to enter such classes. Students in either group who score in the top two deciles or the equivalent will also be eligible to participate in the Freshman Honors Colloquium, a special one-credit course each term.

The lower-division General Honors program is designed to provide a solid general education for the student while

meeting the college's lower-division requirements. Qualifying students must have completed the Freshman Honors Colloquium, a Sophomore Honors Colloquium and must pass with distinction three examinations, one each in the areas of the humanities, science-mathematics, and the social sciences.

Degree Honors

Degree Honors may be earned by the successful completion of the preceding requirements, and by maintaining at least a B average in the junior and senior years. Requirements also include readings, seminars, independent study, special projects, special course
