

Ashland Project On List OK'd By Resources Group

Salem—(UPI)—An extensive recreational development program backed by the Association of O&C land grant counties has been endorsed unanimously by the Governor's Natural Resources Committee.

The action came after Gov. Neil R. McMillen, association president, outlined current projects and general goals of the program.

State Engineer Lewis Stanley said the committee should be "very appreciative" that counties are spending a good share of their O&C funds for development of recreation.

Three Main Projects

Jones, Clackamas county commissioner, said three main projects at present are:

1. A new chair lift at Mt. Hood to replace the old Magic Mile chair lift.
2. New access to the Mt. Ashland ski area.
3. Spencer road, 11 miles O&C timber access roads which will connect with 13 miles of new Klamath county roads. This, Jones said, will provide access to new skiing areas and access to Buck Lake. The route would run from a point near Klamath Falls to a sector south of Lake of the Woods.

Jones said \$72,000 is being spent this year in a cooperative program with the bureau of land management to establish camp sites on O&C lands. Next year another \$100,000 will go for this program and in 1963 \$250,000 is budgeted, he said.

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About Candidates

(Editor's note: This is the last in a series of articles in which the background and qualifications of candidates for the Medford school board is presented. One board member will be elected for a five-year term May 1. Today's article is on LeRoy J. Smith.)

LeRoy J. Smith, 47, of 1015 Whitman ave., Medford, was born in Flatriver, Mo., and has lived in Medford since 1955.

He is employed by the Oregon bureau of labor's wage and hour division in a job which is concerned with the protection of youth in regard to their employment and education.

After graduating from Albuquerque, N.M., High school, he attended the University of New Mexico, studying business administration, and LaSalle Extension university of Chicago studying accounting.

He retired as a first lieutenant in the Army in 1945. During the World War II, Smith served as a forward observer, communications officer, battery commander, and later was an instructor at Washington and Lee university, Lexington, Va. He also served as information and education of-

ficer in the Central Pacific area.

Following his retirement from the service, he was sales manager for the Ediphone division of Thomas A. Edison company, southern California, Arizona and southern Nevada; and was manufacturer's representative in the electronics industry in the same area.

He is married and has three children, Kathleen, 14; Curt, 12; and Michele, 8.

Smith said he is "extremely

proud of our educational system, and the personnel responsible for its success here in Medford, and indeed the entire state.

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Four Appear in Circuit Court

Two Medford men who pleaded guilty to shooting a white face bull owned by Donald J. Grissom, Lake Creek, were placed on probation by Circuit Court Judge James M. Main Wednesday when they appeared for sentencing. The pair was arrested by state police following the Feb. 22 shooting incident, and had pleaded guilty to the charge.

Norman Clarence Love, 27, of 211 North Columbus ave., and Duane Calvert, 27, of 413 West Second st., were placed under strict control of the parole and probation department and imposition of sentence was suspended for five years.

Under terms of the probation, both must refrain from drinking alcoholic beverages, must not own or possess a firearm, and must obey all laws and make restitution, if not already made. Calvert was also ordered to support his legal dependents.

Darrell LaVerne Fariss, 40, of 2870 Crater Lake highway, pleaded guilty in circuit court Wednesday morning to contributing to the delinquency of a minor. Judge Main ordered him to be sent to the Oregon State hospital for examination and a pre-sentence report will be made.

David Eugene Harper, 28, Gold Hill, pleaded guilty to charges of burglary not in a dwelling, and his case was continued for pre-sentence report. Harper was arrested in connection with the entering of a Jacksonville lumber company March 16.

Two People Wanted Here Are Arrested

Two persons who are wanted by the Medford police department on check charges have been arrested elsewhere in Oregon, and Medford police have placed holds on both subjects.

Donna Jean Poffenbarger, 22, was arrested Wednesday in Eugene, and is being held in the Lane county jail. Medford police hold a district court warrant charging her with uttering and publishing a forged check.

Her suspected accomplice, Edward James Chambers, 29, was arrested in Bend Wednesday, and is now held in the Deschutes county jail. Medford police hold a district court warrant charging Chambers with forgery.
