

Yanks Edge Indians 4 to 2; Baltimore Beats Senators

Yogi Berra's first home run of the season Saturday capped a three-run rally that carried the New York Yankees to a 4-2 victory over the Cleveland Indians.

Ralph Terry started for the Yankees and picked up his first decision of the year although he needed late help from Luis Arroyo. Terry allowed the first two men to face him in the eighth inning and got Bubba Phillips to bounce into a double play to kill the rally.

Woodie Held hit his first homer of the year for Cleveland in the fourth and the Indians got their final run in the sixth on a triple by Phillips and a single by Vic Power.

First Defeat
Jim Pate yielded eight of the Yankees' nine hits and all their runs before he departed in the seventh inning. It was the first defeat of the year for the Cleveland right-hander

after two victories.
Milt Pappas gave up just six hits in pitching the Baltimore Orioles to a 5-0 victory over the Washington Senators. Gus Triandos drove in three runs with three hits for the Orioles, who now have won three straight and four of their last five.

Rookie Ed Hobaugh was the starting and losing pitcher for Washington. The Senators have lost six of their last seven games and have scored a total of five runs in their last six outings.

Frank Lary was given a nine-run lead by the Detroit Tigers, but he still needed bullpen help before achieving his fourth straight triumph of the season, 9-5, over Boston. Dick Brown hit a grand slam homer for the Tigers. Jake Wood connected for a three-run blow and Rocky Colavito contributed a solo blast. Tom Brewer of Boston was tagged with his first defeat against two victories.
Marv Throneberry hit a

grand-slam homer off Herb Score and Haywood Sullivan socked a three-run double to pace the Kansas City Athletics to a 13-9 decision over the Chicago White Sox. Relief pitcher Dave Wickenscham, recalled from Shreveport of the Southern association earlier this week, got the win and Gerry Staley was charged with the defeat.

Ken McBride pitched a five-hitter and Ken Aspromonte hit a two-run first-inning homer to pace the Los Angeles Angels to a 4-1 victory over the Minnesota Twins. Earl Battey homered in the fourth inning to produce Minnesota's run.

Ashland — Pitcher Gordon Riese smashed a two-run home run in the top of the 12th inning here Saturday to give Portland State college an 8 to 6 win and a sweep of the three game week end series with Southern Oregon college.

Riese's 350-foot blow over the right field fence broke up a tight pitching duel by relief pitchers Earle Tichenor of SOC and the Vikings' Ted Hendry. Both took the mound in relief roles in the fourth inning.

In the opener of Saturday's twinbill, four SOC errors and 14 PSC hits made the difference as the Vikings won, 10-4. On Friday PSC scored a 12-7 win.

Portland State now sports a perfect 5-0 record in Oregon Collegiate conference action while the Raiders are second with a 5-3 record.

Friday the Raiders held a 2-0 lead going into the fifth inning, but the Portlanders scored four times in the fifth and five more in the sixth to send the Raiders down to defeat.

Frank Howard drove in six runs Saturday with two homers, including a towering 440-foot bases-full shot into the centerfield bleachers, to pace the Los Angeles Dodgers to a 9-4 victory and break a Chicago Cubs' winning streak of four games.

Howard, the Dodgers' 6-7 first baseman, gave Johnny Podres all the support he needed in working to his third pitching victory against no defeats. Podres gave up only seven hits, including a ninth inping home run by Ernie Banks.

Podres was locked in a 3-3 battle when Howard cleared the bases with his grand slam smash in the fifth inning. Charlie Smith followed with the third Dodger home run off Cub starter and loser Dick Ellsworth.

Howard hit his first home run in the second inning, a drive over the left field wall which also brought in Don Demeter, who was safe on the first of two Chicago errors.

The San Francisco Giants, hitless against Warren Spahn Friday night, blasted 15 safeties Saturday, including five homers, to defeat the Milwaukee Braves, 7-3. Willie McCovey slammed two round trippers for the Giants, and the other were hit by Felipe Alou, Orlando Cepeda and Jim Davenport.

Juan Marichal went all the way for San Francisco to gain his first victory of the season against one defeat and starter Bob Buhl suffered his second straight setback for the Braves.
