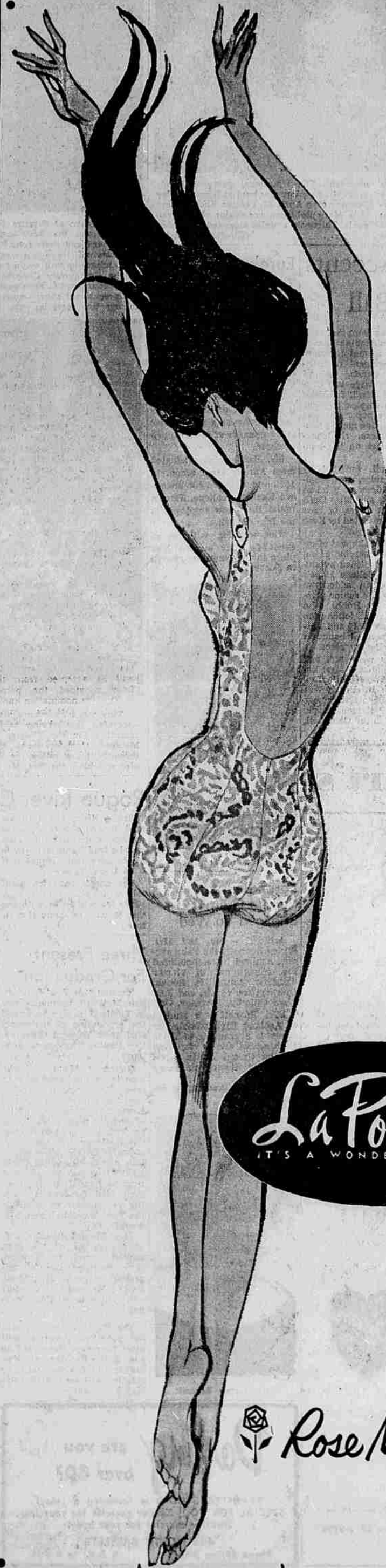
tured in the Phoenix show this year.
