

Raider Teams To Travel This Week

Ashland - All four spring sports at Southern Oregon college will be on the road for collegiate action this week.

Coach Al Atkins' Raider golf team will take a three-day northern swing starting Wednesday with a match against the University of Oregon Ducks at Eugene, then meet Oregon Collegiate conference rival Portland State Thursday at Portland. The road trip will conclude with a match with Oregon College of Education at Monmouth on Friday.

Season record in dual matches for the Raider links crew is 1-0, the lone win a 15-0 conquest of Oregon Tech last week. Leading the Raider squad is senior captain Gordy

Marlatt, runnerup to the OCC medalist title last year. Other squad members are Phil Monaghan, Bob Jones, Tony Lopez and Dick Wood.

After losing all three conference games to Portland State last week end to dump them into second place in the standings, the Raider baseball squad will be heading for La Grande Thursday where they open a three-game week end series with Eastern Oregon college. A single nine-inning game will be played Friday, and a doubleheader on Saturday.

Dr. Alex Peterson's SOC tennis team will be looking for their sixth win of the season when they trek to Eugene Thursday for a match with the strong University of Oregon netmen. The Raider netters, composed of John Root, Ron Singler, Lorraine Eckworth, Ken Miller and Bruce Engle, have won five of eight matches played this spring and are defending Conference champions.

Southern Oregon's highly-improved track and field squad will try to run their dual meet win skein this spring to six straight when they tackle Chico State at Chico, Calif., Thursday. Led by the undefeated Doyle Branson who racked up his fifth straight triple win, the Raiders crushed OCE, 90 1/2 to 40 1/2 last week end in a dual meet.

Branson, a sophomore from Jacksonville, set one of four new SOC school records when he leaped 21 feet, 11 inches in the broad jump, while also winning the 100 yard dash in 10 seconds flat and the 220 in 22.2.

NBA Rookie Hospitalized

Olean, N. Y. - UP- Tom Stith always dreamed of becoming a pro basketball star. When he was a kid playing schoolboy basketball in his native Brooklyn, Tom used to tell his teammates:

"Wait until I'm playing with the Knicks in the Garden - I'll get all you guys in free."

Stith went from Brooklyn to little St. Bonaventure college and immediately captured the eyes of pro scouts with his amazing shooting. He was named to the United Press International All-America team for the second straight time this year and then was made the No. 1 pick of the New York Knicks - back in the National Basketball Association.

Tom, 22, signed a contract with the Knicks last month

and was looking ahead to a pro career Monday when he learned he was a victim of pulmonary tuberculosis.

Ned Irish, president of the Knickerbockers, said that first reports indicated Stith might not be playing in the fall. Tom's personal physician was not as pessimistic.

"Tom's an All-America all the way," he said. "He's a fighter."

Enters Hospital

Arrangements were being made today to transfer Stith to the Mt. Morris Tuberculosis hospital north of this college community.

The doctor, whose name was not revealed, said Stith would be confined for at least three months and undergo treatment for an indefinite period.

Upland Bird Kill Totals 893,600

Portland - Final tabulations by the game commission of the 1960 upland game bird and waterfowl seasons show a grand total of just over 893,600 upland game birds of all species and just over 532,900 waterfowl were taken by hunters during last year's hunts.

Although the take of waterfowl and upland game birds was down from 1959 and from the record kill of 1958, hunting compared favorably with previous years. During 1959 hunters took around 893,000 upland game birds and some 694,500 waterfowl.

Pheasant hunters reported a take of just over 351,000 of the colorful ring-necked birds which was down from the 375,000 reported in 1959. Success was a good 3.7 birds per man. Almost 95,000 scattergunners reported they hunted pheasants last year compared to over 97,000 the previous year.

Quail hunters reported in with over 190,800 quail of all species compared to 224,000 birds in 1959. Success ran high for the 30,800 quail hunters who reported bagging 6.2 birds per man.

Better Partridge Hunting

Chukar partridge hunters did a little better than last year with a reported take of almost 37,700 birds compared to 36,300 the year before. Success was a modest 4.0 birds per man reported by over 9,400 chukar hunters. More than 5,500 Hungarian partridge hunters reported taking close to 16,800 Hungarians with a success of 3.0 birds per man.

From the timbered sections of the state hunters reported taking close to 36,600 blue and ruffed grouse, above the 1959 tally of 32,700 birds. Over 17,000 nimbros hunted grouse and bagged just a little over 2.0 birds per man.

To round out the upland game picture, more than 173,000 mourning doves were taken by around 14,900 scattergunners and over 86,900 banded pigeons reported taken by around 13,000 hunters. Success on doves was high with a reported 11.6 doves per man. Pigeon hunters had a respectable success of 6.6 birds per man.

Waterfowl hunters gunning the flyways found nothing to shout about and wound up the season with 23 per cent fewer birds than in 1959, which in turn was around 40 per cent fewer birds than the banner year of 1958.

Waterfowl hunters numbered close to 54,700 who reported making an average of 6.5 trips afield. These gunners took a total of 454,257 ducks of all species and 78,669 geese of all species.

Vancouver, Wash.-UP-Defending champion William Eggers, Portland, Ore., fired a 69 Monday for medalist honors in the Oregon Open Golf Tournament being held at the Royal Oaks Club here.

A field of 102 amateurs and 56 professionals toured the course during the first round of the tournament amid intermittent showers.

Bob Duden, Lake Oswego, and Tom Liljeholm, Portland, tied for runner-up spot with 70's. Bracketed at 71 were Eddie Hogan, Portland, and Joe Greer, Yakima.

Another 18 holes will be played today, with the final 36-hole round scheduled for Wednesday.

Jensen Says He Won't Return To Baseball; Meets Wife in Reno

Reno-UP-Outfielder Jackie Jensen, 34, who suddenly quit the Boston Red Sox Sunday and headed for his Lake Tahoe home, got off a train today and said he would not return to baseball.

"He was hitting them, but they were catching them. I know Higgins is upset and I suppose the whole team is, too."

It was believed Jensen's decision to quit "med" from the fact he hit .130 since the season started. He was the American league's most valuable player two years ago but quit baseball for a year largely because of his fear of flying.

He returned to the team this year and expected a good season.

"No," he yelled as the car pulled away. The Jensen's did not say whether they would go to their home at Crystal Bay, where he has a construction business, or to some hideaway. Mrs. Jensen said she "most certainly" planned to try to persuade him to return to the Red Sox.

"I hope we can straighten this thing out," she said as she waited for the train to arrive, "but right now all we plan to do is disappear for two weeks."

Open Won By Palmer

San Antonio, Tex.-UP-Arnold Palmer, who has won just about one out of every three tournaments he has entered over the past 15 months, took the Texas Open crown with him as he left for Las Vegas, Nev., and the Tournament of Champions.

The 31-year-old Pennsylvanian staged one of his typical come-from-behind finishes Sunday to grab his second title in a row here with a final three-under-par 34-34-68 and a 72-hole total of 270.

Kentucky Derby Trial Scheduled for Today

Louisville, Ky.-UP-One of the best renewals of the \$16,500 Derby Trial was on tap at Churchill Downs today with three "speed" horses set to tangle with two "stretch runners" in a race which will greatly influence the size of the Kentucky Derby field on Saturday.

A field of 10 was named for the mile race, which in the past has pointed out four winners of the first of the Triple Crown classics five days later.

But five of them appear to be hopelessly outclassed in this final prep race for the Rose Run, and Churchill Downs racing secretary Doc Lavin feels that one or two of them may be scratched.

Four-and-Twenty co-favorite with Carry Back to win the Kentucky Derby, heads the field. This bay son of Blue Prince led from start to finish in the Santa Anita Derby and the Forerunner Purse at Keeneland a few days ago. He is owned by the Alberta Ranches and ridden by 55-year-old Johnny Longden.

Ready to battle Four-and-Twenty are Fred W. Hooper's Crozier and J. Graham

Brown's He's A Pistol, both endowed with a high turn of speed and likely to challenge the Californian right from the start.

Also in the field are Mrs. Ethel D. Jacobs' Dr. Miller and Red Oaks stable's Injun, the stretch runners.

Gayburn, Star X, Gay's Pal, Prince Nerida and Harry N. complete the listings with all of them quoted at 20-1 or higher.

"The Trial should determine the size of the Kentucky Derby field on Saturday," said Lavin. "If Four-and-Twenty can win big we may lose some of the expected starters. But no matter what happens I think we will have at least 14 in the Derby."

Four-and-Twenty is the 8-5 favorite with Crozier second choice at 3-1. He's A Pistol is 4-1 with Dr. Miller 8-1 and Injun listed at 10-1.

Gene Freese of the Cincinnati Reds and Billy Gardner of the Minnesota Twins never

batted 300 or made an All-Star team, but for several seasons now they've managed to hold major league jobs through hustle and handiness.

Never was this more evident than in the roles they played Monday in helping their clubs win the only two games played in the majors.

Freese hustled home from second base on a hit to deep shortstop with the winning run in the Red's 3-2 victory over the Philadelphia Phils. And Gardner hit a two-out ninth-inning double that chased home Jim Lemon with the run that enabled Minnesota to edge the Chicago White Sox, 6-5.

Wins Six-Hitter

The 27-year-old Freese, now playing with his fifth major league club, is hitting only .242, but he stays in the lineup primarily because of his speed and longball threat.

It was Freese's fleetness that help lefty Jim O'Toole win a six-hitter against Robin Roberts and the Phils Monday night.

With the score tied at 2-2, Freese led off the fourth by reaching first on a wild throw by shortstop Ruben Amaro of the Phils. He moved to second on Chico Cardenas' single.

Don Blasingame then hit a ball into the hole to Amaro's right. The Phils' shortstop made a diving stop but couldn't make a play on Blasingame. Freese, flying at full speed, raced all the way home from second and beat Amaro's throw to the plate.

O'Toole pitched five shut-out innings after that to clinch his second victory against many defeats. He struck out nine batters and walked only two. Gordon Coleman hit a Cincinnati homer in the second inning.

For Roberts, this was the fourth defeat without a victory. Bobby Del Greco's hits helped the Phils score both their runs.
