Survival Course Concluded

The last program in Operation X, the Girl Scout survival course, was presented by Maj. Gen. J. H. Hicks, Jackson county civil defense director. He spoke on survival during and after an atomic attack. Mrs. Roy Wilkes, co-chairman of water safety for the Red Cross, spoke on safety near, on and in the water. General Hicks described the necessity for a fallout or bomb shelter, how one can be constructed and how it should be supplied with food, water, and other necessities.

Mrs. Wilkes, who is also director of women's swim classes at the Medford Young Men's Christian association, gave the girls many do's and don't's to be observed while swimming, boating, or water skiing.

Operation X, which started with a program by Roby Maberry of Crater Lake National park on snow survival, has been attended by intermediate Scouts of the sixth grade, and Senior Scouts, from the South Medford, Madrona, and North Jackson districts with their leaders. The program was designed to teach the girls how best to survive in a difficult or dangerous situation.

In February Operation X featured Claude Haggard, director of safety for the California Oregon Power company, with his program on the history of electricity and the safety demonstration "Safe Handling of Our Great Servant, Reddy Kilowatt."

Medford Police Sgt. DeLair Tuscov spoke on the operation of the police department and highway safety; and Westley Stanfield, technical assistant and forester for the Oregon State Department of Forests, spoke to the girls on safety in the woods, at the March program.
