Sheriff's Office To Check on Boat Safety Equipment

Required marine safety equipment is the chief concern of the sheriff's boat patrol, according to Sheriff Joe Walsh.

This includes such life-saving devices as life preservers for each boat, occupant, fire extinguishers, lights for boats operated during night or early morning hours, and other equipment stipulated in the new Oregon marine boating laws.

Deputies, assisted by members of the Rogue Aqua Ski club, will check boat operations closely, Walsh said.

"We had several cases of too much motor for the boat," the sheriff commented. "This caused several upsets last season. Boat operators should become familiar with the maximum power needed to operate a boat safely. Anything more than that will cause the boat to capsize."

Receives Complaints

Walsh said several skin-divers have complained that boaters do not recognize the diver's flag. This is a red flag with a white diagonal stripe. This is either flown from a boat or a float when a diver is swimming under water in a particular spot. Boaters should stay clear of the area, Walsh said.

Walsh also noted that all boating accidents involving property damage or injuries must be reported to the sheriff's office or directly to the state marine board in Salem within 48 hours of the accident.

Accident forms are available at the sheriff's office, Walsh said.

Beauti Pleat To Be Displayed

The first public showing in southern Oregon of Beauti Pleat, a new drapery hardware and fabrication method, will be at the Crater Lions Sportsfair and Home and Garden show.

Among the offerings of Beauti Pleat, according to Custom House, a new area decorating and fabricating service which will have a booth at the event, are symmetrical pleating that never "bunches up" regardless of whether the draperies are open or closed, and the fact they will lay flat for cleaning and pressing.

Archery Exhibit Planned at Fair

Archery, a sport in which probably too few people participate, will be represented at the Crater Lions Sportsfair and Home and Garden show at the Medford armory grounds.

The Savage Archers, a southern Oregon club of about 28 members, mostly husband and wife members, plan a display of archery equipment and demonstrations.

Members of the club keep in shape by holding weekly shoots, and both indoor and outdoor tournaments with entrants coming from as far as

100 miles or more.

Members of the Savage Archers have at different times won many ribbons and awards at various tournaments in southern Oregon and northern California. Recently, the club sponsored a novelty shoot at its outdoor range on the Ashland Mine rd.

One of the largest archery shoots in this area is planned the week end of July 1 and 2, when about 350 archers from Oregon, Washington and Idaho are expected to participate in a trail shoot at the Lake of the Woods.

Mobile Homes Become Popular

Increasing in popularity throughout the country is the use of mobile homes, and southern Oregon and northern California is not without its share of the interest.

This was noted recently at an open house at Walker the Weeper's on South Riverside ave., Medford, when an estimated 3,000 people inspected several types of mobile homes.

Mobile homes are available in all sizes, ranging from those used for permanent homes in attractive, especially constructed parks, to camping trailers for a week end in the mountains.

Many of the mobile homes used as permanent residences require special handling when they are moved over the highways, and specialized convoy companies have been formed to move the homes. Permits are required in Oregon before the mobile homes can be moved because of their width and length.

These homes provide comfortable living quarters with

attractive interior decorating and furniture, including, in some cases, built-in refrigerators. Many of them feature carpeted floors in all but the kitchen area and bath.

In many parks where mobile homes are used as a permanent residence, there are community laundry facilities, swimming pools, play areas for children, sanitary facilities connected to the home, and electricity.

Probably the most popular of the mobile homes is the smaller type suitable for vacationists or week end campers. There is a variety of such trailers, including the locally produced Holiday House.

Although not elaborate, the "haul-it-yourself" trailer provides sufficient room and comfort for vacation trips and week ends in the nearby campgrounds.

Mobile homes of all sizes will be displayed, and open to the public, at the Sportsfair and Home and Garden show at the Medford armory grounds May 5, 6 and 7.

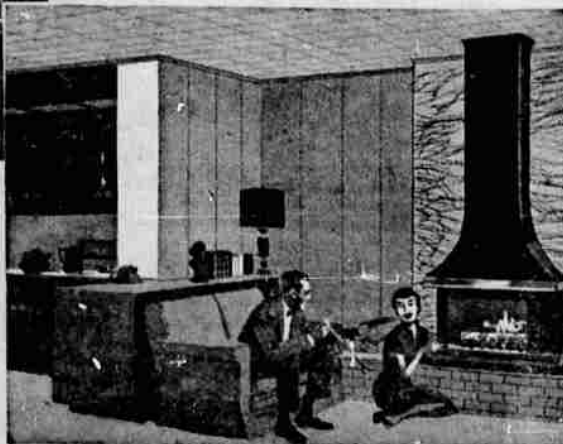
