

Chances of Three-Way Compensation Bill Unlikely for This Session

Kennedy Orders Full-Scale Review Of Country's Foreign Intelligence

Washington—(UPI)—President Kennedy today formally ordered a full-scale review of this country's foreign intelligence effort.

The President's order, latest in a series of actions following the Cuban invasion fiasco, was an amplification

of Wednesday's White House announcement that the President was reconstituting his board of consultants on foreign intelligence activities.

Today, the White House made public an executive order by Kennedy which reactivates the board "under broadened terms of reference" and appoints new members to it.

The six-member group, drawn from outside the government, "will be responsible for conducting an objective, independent review of the foreign intelligence and related activities of the government," the White House said.

The group will report periodically to Kennedy "with respect to its assessment of the objectives and performances of those activities by the Central Intelligence Agency and the several additional civilian and military agencies engaged therein."

As announced Wednesday, the board will be headed by Dr. James R. Killian Jr., chairman of the corporation of Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Other members named by Kennedy are Dr. William O. Baker, vice president for research of the Bell Telephone Laboratories, Murray Hill, N.J.; retired Air Force Lt. Gen. James H. Doolittle, board chairman, Space Technology Laboratories, Inc., Los Angeles; Dr. William L. Langer, history professor at Har-

vard University; former Undersecretary of State Robert D. Murphy, president, Corning Glass International, New York City; and retired Army Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, president of the Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts, New York City.

The White House said the board's activities "are to be distinguished from the much more limited study" that Taylor is heading on so-called para-military operations, which entail intelligence as well as guerrilla and other limited war activities.

McCANN DIES

Manila—(UPI)—Robert E. McCann, an American businessman who spent 10 years in a Communist Chinese prison on espionage charges, died of cancer today at the Clark Air Base Hospital in Luzon, the U.S. Air Force reported. He was 60.

Death came to McCann just 28 days after he was carried into the free world on a stretcher after being released by his Red Chinese captors.

NOT BRAINWASHED

London—(UPI)—Prime Minister Harold Macmillan today said British agent George Blake decided to become a Russian spy of his own free will—not because of any brainwashing in a Communist prison camp.

OFFERED ONE CHILD

Jerusalem—(UPI)—A witness at the Adolf Eichmann trial told today how the Nazis offered a Jewish woman the life of one of her three children who were taken to extermination.

"She could not choose," said Dr. Aharon Peretz, "and all three were taken."

Chain Owned Markets Increase 4 Per Cent

New York—(UPI)—The latest nose count by Chain Store Age shows a 4 per cent increase since last year in the number of U.S. chain-operated supermarkets.

The publication lists 3,387 food chains which operate 29,833 stores, 22,049 of them supermarkets. This compares with 28,527 stores a year ago of which 21,186 were supermarkets.

Duncan Denies Pearson Charge Of Double-Cross

Salem—(UPI)—A week of negotiations ended with a bang and a whimper Wednesday night when charges of a "double-cross" snuffed out a special meeting on a three-way workmen's compensation compromise.

It made chances of a three-way bill, or any other workmen's compensation legislation, appear virtually nil this session.

The special House Labor Committee session was called a few hours after Speaker Robert Duncan revealed he had reached a "so-called compromise" with Sen. Walter Pearson on three-way.

In the most sharply-fought controversy of the session, the House Labor Committee, the House refused to release Pearson's original, Senate-passed three-way measure. Duncan agreed to ask the committee to look at the new alternative.

Newsmen Upset Things

Both Duncan and Pearson were present at the tense meeting when the appearance of newsmen caused Pearson to turn on Duncan. "I am sick and tired of being double-crossed," Pearson declared. "You don't arrive at a compromise when the press is present."

Duncan denied a double-cross, but the exchange prompted committee members Ed Whelan and Sidney Leikin to leave. Later, the two returned and Whelan moved to adjourn.

Only Chairman W. O. Kelsey, a three-way opponent, voted against ending the meeting.

Further Sessions Unlikely

Later, Kelsey indicated no further sessions appeared in the offing.

The original three-way bill, bitterly opposed by labor, would have let private insurance firms write workmen's compensation insurance. The state now enjoys a monopoly.

The compromise would have let private firms into a corner of the workmen's compensation field. Duncan and Pearson differed on the extent.

Presidential Suites Furnished With Antiques

Chicago—(UPI)—Mary Morrison Kennedy buys antiques for presidential suites only. She would like to indulge her taste for antiques in more of the 27,000 hotel rooms she supervises as vice president in charge of decorating, design and architecture for the Sheraton hotel chain. But most of the rooms are too small for anything but Danish modern.

Time was when Mrs. Kennedy's firm did not furnish even its spacious presidential suites with genuine antiques. A visit from President Eisenhower changed that. The chain owned New York's Astor hotel at the time, and Mrs. Kennedy had just a week to get the presidential suite ready for Mr. Eisenhower. In her opinion, nothing but antiques would do, and there wasn't time to talk her out of it.

She rushed over to Third avenue, the heart of New York's antique district, and tracked down enough American Colonial pieces for three rooms. It was the first hotel suite she ever decorated with antiques, and the idea caught on with her firm.

Antique Furniture Now, all the presidential suites in the chain are furnished with antiques selected by Mrs. Kennedy.

The average presidential suite has a 20x30 foot living room, two bedrooms and two baths. Mrs. Kennedy said. It is not easy to find the right pieces for such a large suite. A large suite generally demands a sofa, loveseat, two commodes, two wing chairs, a desk, small dining table, four straight-backed chairs and a curio cabinet or other occasional pieces.

If a suite is being readied especially for a president or presidential candidate, there is also the question of which period antiques would be most suitable.

Mrs. Kennedy redecorated two presidential suites in Chicago last summer for the GOP national convention—one for Vice President Richard Nixon, the other for New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller.

She asked a few discreet questions, then settled on French antiques, mostly from the Louis XV period, for the Rockefeller; American Colonial for the Nixons.

Stocks Continue Firm; Blue Chips Increase

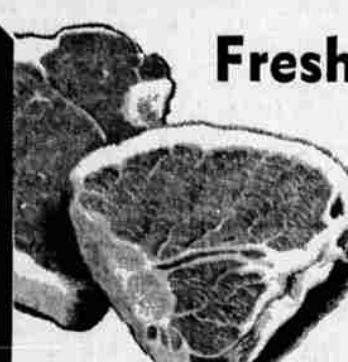
