

Fir-Ply Bids High For Forest Timber

Fir-Ply, Inc., White City, was high bidder this week for 780,000 board feet of national forest timber in the Bessie Creek select area, Prospect Ranger district, Rogue River National Forest. Forest Supervisor C. E. Brown reported the high bid totaled \$29,453.50. This compares with the forest service

appraised price for the timber of \$22,509.50, an increase of 31 per cent. Next high bidder in the oral auction for the timber was W. B. McElmurry of Prospect. Other bidders were C. M. and D. Logging, G and R Logging, Olson - Lawyer

Lbr., Inc., and Red Blanket Lumber company. The timber in this unit consisted of 820,000 board feet of Douglas-fir, bid in at \$43 per thousand feet, 70 thousand board feet of sugar pine bid in at \$26.15 per thousand board feet, and 90 thousand

board feet of white fir and other species bid in at \$10.70 per thousand board feet.

Fir-Ply, Inc., White City, was also high bidder for 2,000,000 board feet of national forest timber in the Prospect Flat select 4 area, Prospect Ranger district.

The high bid totaled \$55,746, compared to the forest service appraised price of \$55,713.

Next high bidder in the oral auction was Southern Oregon Plywood of Grants Pass. Other bidder was Olson-Lawyer Lumber, Inc.

The timber in this unit consisted of 1,800,000 board feet of Douglas-fir, bid in at \$29.45 per thousand board feet, 140,000 board feet of sugar pine and Ponderosa pine, bid in at \$15.30 per thousand board feet, and 60,000 board feet of white fir and other species bid in at \$9.90 per thousand board feet.

Kreisman Gets GM Scholarship

Ashland—Peter J. Kreisman, Ashland, is one of seven outstanding high school seniors from the Pacific northwest who have been awarded four-year General Motors college scholarships, the corporation announced Wednesday.

He is the son of Dr. and Mrs. Arthur Kreisman, 455 Liberty st. A Baker High school student, Walter A. Scott, also has been awarded a General Motors scholarship. The awards are worth from \$200 to \$2,000 a year, depending

upon the need of the student, and winners may select the college they wish to attend and pursue their individual choice of study.

The awards were made on the basis of national competitive examinations taken by more than 21,000 high school seniors.

Young Kreisman plans to attend Stanford university, where he will major in physics. He was recently named an honorary merit scholar by the National Merit Scholarship corporation.

Young Men Reminded of Registering When 18

A reminder to register on time for selective service was given this week by local board No. 17 of the selective service system, 33 North Riverside ave.

The law requires that every young man must register on his 18th birthday or within five days thereafter unless on active duty, even though he may be a member of a reserve unit or the National Guard.

Men on regular active military duty must register within 30 days of separation if not previously registered; if registered prior to entry into the service, they must report within 10 days after separation.

Aliens born on or after Sept. 15, 1925, who have entered the United States on a permanent visa are required

to register within six months after entry.

The purpose of registration, the board said, is not only to provide lists of prospective peacetime draftees, but also furnishes the government with information concerning available manpower should total mobilization become necessary.

Failure to register on time may result in the possibility of being prosecuted or inducted ahead of others in the same age group who are registered.

National Conference Is Planned at University

Eugene—Advanced placement conferences for administrators and biologists will be held June 22-24 at the University of Oregon, the first university on the west coast to be host to the national conferences.

College Students Attend Conference

Ashland—Five prominent Southern Oregon college student body officers are presently attending the Pacific States Presidents association conference in San Francisco.

Officers attending are Dale Truax, president elect, Ashland; Barry Pitts, incumbent, Klamath Falls; Terry Tallis, first vice president, Hills, Calif.; Jonieta Smith, treasurer, Ashland; and Penny Cantwell, secretary, Grants Pass.

George Chee, Eugene, also attending, will report on the meeting.

Such conferences are held annually by the College Entrance Examination Board to explain the Advanced Placement Program. Through the program, high school students take college-level courses and if they pass rigorous examinations may receive college credit for the courses.

High school and college teachers in 11 fields and administrators meet to discuss practical aspects of the program, such as selection of teachers and students, materials to be used, and grading of examinations. Administrators meeting for the June conference in Eugene will hear objectives and recent developments in the program and will discuss the program.

Speakers will include Dr. Thomas C. Mendenhall, president of Smith college and chairman of the Advanced Placement Program; B. J. McCormick, principal of Taylor Alldredge High school in Pittsburgh, Pa.; Richard Walte of the New York department of education; and three representatives from the national headquarters of the Advanced Placement Program.

High school and college biology teachers, at their conference, will also hear experienced Advanced Placement Program leaders. Speakers will include John Karling, professor of botany at Purdue university; and chief reader of the biology examinations for the program; Frank Carpenter, professor of biology at Harvard university and national chairman of the Advanced Placement Program; E. S. Willing of the Lakeside schools, Seattle; and a representative of the biological sciences curriculum study group at the University of Colorado.

Those interested in the conference for administrators should write to its director, Roland Bartel, 103 Johnson, University of Oregon. The biologists' conference is under direction of Sanford S. Tepfer, biology department, University of Oregon.

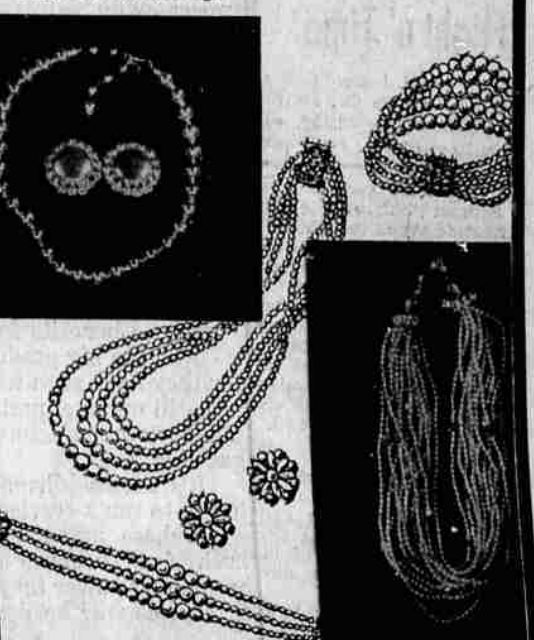

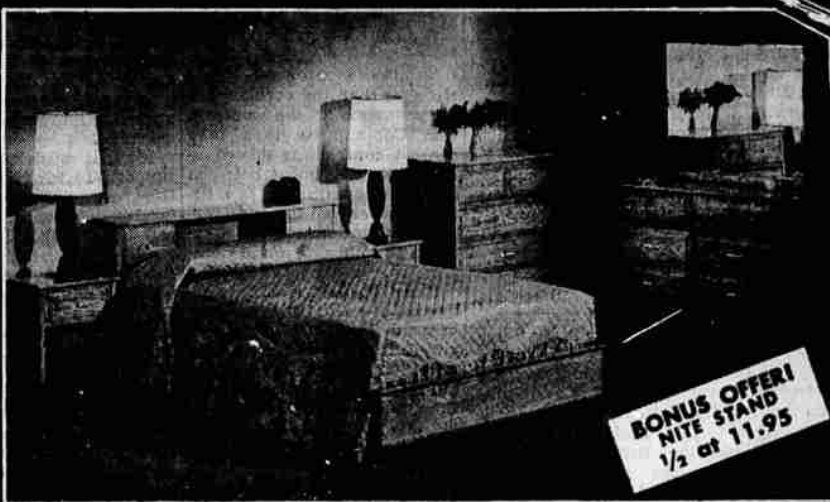
