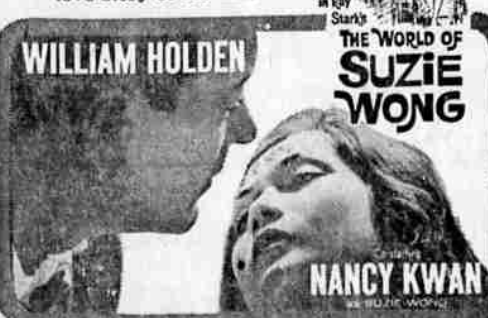

Liquor Revenue Increase Approved

Salem —UPI— An additional \$2.2 million in liquor revenues for cities and counties, to be balanced by a 10-cent-a-bottle hike in liquor prices, won House approval today. The bill went to the Senate. Counties for the first time will get \$1.5 million, or five per cent of state-collected liquor revenues. It will help meet counties' share of new programs such as medicare and surplus food distribution. The rest comes primarily from county-collected property taxes.

Cities will receive an additional \$750,000, or \$3.7 million over the biennium. The increase in liquor prices requires only an instructive order to the Liquor Control Commission.

The commission said the increase, although averaging 10 cents a bottle, will vary with different brands.

Timber Tax Reform Measures Approved

Salem —UPI— The Senate today approved both the Eastern and Western Oregon timber tax reform bills, sending them back to the House for concurrence in minor amendments.

HB1114 substitutes a severance tax on pine east of the Cascade Range for the present ad valorem tax. Tree owners favor this.

This bill passed 28-1 with Sen. Melvin Goode, (R-Albany), voting no.

HB1438 is the compromise between Georgia-Pacific Corp. and Weyerhaeuser Co. with Weyerhaeuser, the sustained-yield operator, winning some tax relief.

The vote on this was 27-2 with Sens. Vernon Cook (D-Troutdale), and Goode voting no.

Bill Regulates Theater Closures

Salem —UPI— Sen. Thomas R. Mahoney (D-Portland) won Senate Rules committee approval today and introduced a bill requiring certain drive-in theaters to shut down by 10 p.m.

The bill pertains to those theaters located within 2,000 feet of a public highway. Violation would be a misdemeanor. The ban would be in effect from May 1 to Sept. 30 each year.

Intent is to "protect the public safety, peace and morals and to prevent traffic congestion on the public highways." Mahoney attached an emergency clause, allowing the bill to go into effect immediately upon passage.

Congressmen Laud Space Shot

Washington —UPI— Jubilant members of Congress today cheered the heroic achievement of Astronaut Alan B. Shepard.

They hailed his space flight as a giant American stride in the space race with Russia. But some cautioned that there are still challenges ahead.

Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson, president of the Senate and head of President Kennedy's Space Advisory committee said Shepard "will never be forgotten."

"It was a great feat. I am very proud. It was very gratifying to me as I feel sure it was to all the American people that we have demonstrated that we can send a man into space."

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield (Mont.)—"I'm delighted on behalf of both the astronaut and our country that the flight was so successful. It is indeed great news."

Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen (Ill.)—"It's wonderful. This reaffirms the faith of the country in our capacity to do these things and to move ahead in the space field."

Eichmann Defense Witnesses Barred

Jerusalem —UPI— Israel barred the way today to four more possible witnesses for Adolf Eichmann by branding them as war criminals and announcing they would be arrested if they set foot in this country.

The action brought to a total of eight the number of West Germans who have been denied safe conduct to Israel for the purpose of testifying for the defense. The court of three Israeli judges had ruled it has no authority to grant or deny safe conduct because that is a function of the executive branch of the government.
