Jacksonville — The Jacksonville museum is continuing to build up its Civil War exhibits, and received several donations to it last month, according to Miss Mary Hanley, curator.

Collections of pictures, many of them copies of Brady photographs, were presented by Glenn Simpson and Dr. Arthur S. Taylor.

Other additions were made by Clyde E. Smith who donated a frame of Civil War mementoes, including a collection of commemorative Lincoln stamps, F. C. Crosslin donated pictures, magazines and a collection of GAR badges, a Confederate flag and a large collection of Confederate money.

Miss Lydia McCall, Ashland, presented the museum a copy of the first issue of the Ashland Tidings dated June 17, 1876, and large framed pictures of Capt. J. M. McCall and Mrs. McCall.

A photograph of Dr. S. F. Chapin, who practiced in Jacksonville in 1872-73, was presented by his daughter, Mrs. Marie E. McCann, Waterville, Calif.

Officers elected included George F. Connell, Rogue River, re-elected as district commander; Frederick H. Kirby, Ashland, senior vice commander; Dr. Carroll W. Dewey, Del Rogue Post, junior vice commander; Glenn W. Hutchinson, Rogue River, quartermaster; Charles L. Smith, Grants Pass, adjutant; Leo E. Orvis, Rogue River, district chaplain; Harry Birch, Shady Cove, judge advocate; and Dr. D. G. Mackie, Grants Pass, surgeon.

Trustees for 1961-62 are Floyd Crosslin, Ashland; Col. Ted Hopkins, Rogue River; and Daniel Krotz II, Shady Cove. Jack Stewart, Rogue River, was appointed officer of the day, and Hopkins will be service officer. Red Wilson, Shady Cove, is guard.

Fred Corn, Oregon VFW commander, was the installing officer. He also spoke on the affairs of the Oregon department. Mark Davis, department senior vice commander, presented a citation to Harold C. Sutherland, commander of Crater Lake Post, Medford, for the post's effort in attaining over 100 per cent membership and other community activities during the past year.

Ira Canfield, past department commander and a delegate from Crater Lake Post, presented a letter to be sent to President John F. Kennedy for his stand against Communism and the handling of the Cuban situation.

VFW officials have announced that the fall district meeting will be held at the VFW hall in Ashland. The department's annual convention will be held in Astoria June 14 to 18.

All-Day Session On Alcoholism Is Slated Tuesday

Mrs. Marty Mann, New York, a member of the National Council on Alcoholism, will speak at an all-day session on alcoholism in Medford Tuesday, May 9. Her visit to Oregon has been arranged by the Oregon State Alcoholic Education committee, and the Medford conference is sponsored by the Southern Oregon Alcoholic Rehabilitation committee.

Invitations have been sent to ministers, welfare workers, public health officials, police, medical society members, Alcoholic Anonymous groups, and others interested.

The conference will begin at 8:45 a.m. in First Methodist church and is the only one scheduled for southern Oregon by Mrs. Mann. A public talk at 1 p.m. will follow the noon luncheon.

The speaker has lectured all over the world on alcoholism and related health problems. She will discuss alcoholism and tuberculosis at the Medford meeting, stressing the need for a "great-hearted effort toward the sufferers of alcoholism that the American public has made in the past over those who had tuberculosis, heart disease or cancer."

Poppy Sale Slated Here May 26, 27

"Buddy Poppy" sales will be held May 26 and 27 in Medford by the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Crater Lake Post and auxiliary. At 8 p.m., May 25 all volunteer members will meet to prepare for the sales.

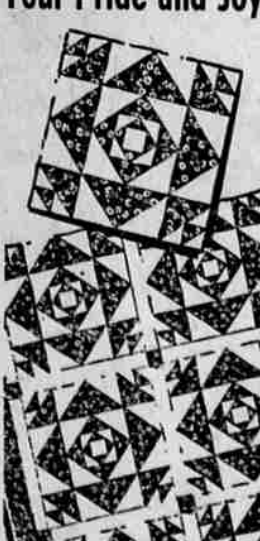
VFW officials noted that the poppy idea originated in France during 1921 when the Little Children's league decided to help widows and orphans left destitute. The league adopted the red poppy, its national flower, as a money-making project to help veterans and their families.

The red flower symbolizes those who lost their lives, and it now aids those who survive. Following the dissolution of the Franco-American league in 1922, the VFW made a national appeal to sell the poppy in the U.S. The VFW has promoted the project since 1924, and it was decided to allow disabled and needy veterans to assemble the poppies. Proceeds from the poppy sales are used for local projects, supplies, payment for the veterans who assemble them, and for the National VFW Eastern Rapid home for orphaned children.

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Great Decisions Voters Say Vital Society Crucial

A vital society is crucial to American survival emphasized 81 per cent of Oregon participants in 1961's Great Decisions discussion groups. Voters included economic growth, social development, quality of life, and values of freedom in the term "society." One hundred per cent of Jackson county voters agreed.

Sixty-one per cent of the state's voters and 34 per cent of Jackson county voters added growth of a world community that is increasingly strong, free, and resistant to communism as also important to American survival.

Opinion ballots from 20 Oregon counties were tabulated last week by Oregon State university extension service.

'Arms and Survival' — Ballots on the topic "Arms and Survival" showed 88 per cent of the statewide voters believe the U.S. must have an indestructible retaliatory force to convince Russia we can and will strike back if we or an ally is attacked. Nearly as many added that the U.S. must also have a standby conventional force capable of resisting future Korea-type aggression.

Seventy-one per cent of the people voting in Oregon said since we wish to deter war, we must be prepared to wage, win and survive any war we may be forced to fight. Eighty per cent of Jackson county voters balloted the same way.

Sixty-eight per cent of statewide voters believe the U.S. must protect its civilian population to insure survival of greatest number, and to convince Russia we can and will retaliate, even after being hit.

Nearly as many voters insist that military measures are not enough. The U.S. must also invest in economic, social, and political development of non-communist world community. Sixty-one per cent of Jackson county voters agreed.

Home Rule Study Group Continues Its Discussion

The Jackson county home rule study committee continued its evaluation of possible county powers under a home rule charter Thursday night and posed a number of questions.

Some of the main questions were: whether the district attorney or a county counsel should prosecute violations of ordinances enacted under a charter? May a county charter make other than existing state election laws? What is a floating bond issue? What is really the basic political organization in the county? The county has certain rights, the county and the state. Who has the rights left over—the residual rights?

Other questions which will be asked authorities on political science and law are: Is there a distinction between the powers the county assumes as a body-politic and those assumed by the administrative and legislative functions of county government?

To Meet with Group — The committee agreed to ask Marshall E. Woodell, Southern Oregon college professor of social science, to meet with the group. Thomas Owens, chief deputy district attorney, will be asked to act as the committee's legal advisor.

Emphasize Education

On the topic "Blueprints for the World Economy," three-fourths of those who voted in Oregon said the U.S. should emphasize education and training projects which contribute to political as well as economic development.

Some dissatisfaction was evident with administration of U.S. economic assistance to underdeveloped nations. Sixty-one per cent of the voters said better administration is desirable whether the U.S. raises, lowers, or does not alter its present level of aid.

About the same number felt the U.S. should urge its allies to increase substantially their present levels of economic development assistance.

Only 1 per cent of the state's voters said the U.S. should provide economic aid only to U.S. military allies. All of the Jackson county voters indicated they felt the same way.

Turning their attention to the topic "The Americans in Jeopardy," 65 per cent of the voters encouraged more productive use of existing capital, land, and other private Latin American resources in the development of free Latin American economies.

Sixty-nine per cent of the state voters and 93 per cent of Jackson county voters said the U.S. should expand technical assistance and aid to education because of its importance to economic, social and political development in freedom.

LU VAN SANH Financially Adopted

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Vietnamese Boy 'Adopted' by Club At Power Firm

The Uncle Jack club, an employees group at the Californian Oregon Power company, has financially "adopted" its second child, a 12-year-old Vietnamese boy, Lu Van Sanh.

The group is already assisting a 10-year-old Korean girl, Kim Bu Ja.

Members of the club adopted the youngsters through the Foster Parents' Plan, Inc., 352 Park ave., south New York City, by promising to contribute \$15 a month toward each child's support for at least one year.

Lu Van Sanh lives with his mother, two brothers, aged 6 and 10 months, a sister, 3, and his maternal grandmother in Saigon. The family has been abandoned by the father and the mother is ill with tuberculosis, according to Foster Parents. The mother, a seamstress, earns not more than 41 cents a day for the support of the family of six.

Has One Wooden Bed — Their house is about 9 by 24 feet and contains one wooden bed, a board that serves as a bed, two small tables and a food cupboard.

The agency wishes the local club that "Sanh is a nice-looking boy with an oval face and short hair. He makes a good impression on strangers, is kind and has a pleasing manner that attracts many friends. A good student, he is now in the first year of secondary school and has to pay \$1.37 per month in school fees. After class, he carries water for the family's use and takes care of the younger children."

The Copco club's contribution will assure him a monthly cash grant of \$8, periodic

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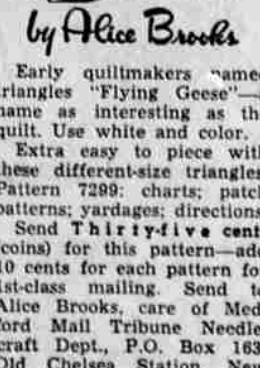
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
