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Snead Holds 5-Stroke Lead In Tournament of Champions

Las Vegas—(UPI)—Old Slamin' Sam Snead, his straw hat flopping jauntily in the breeze, rolled in a 50-foot, wind-aided birdie putt on the 18th green Saturday to clinch a brilliant round that vaulted him into a five-stroke lead after 54 holes in the Tournament of Champions.

While Jay Hebert, leader at the halfway mark, faltered and shot a fat 78, Snead posted a three under par 69 in winds that reached 25 to 35 miles an hour. He had a 54-hole score of 204.

Deadlocked for second, with 209 each, were South Africa's Gary Player, who also shot a 69, and Tommy Bolt who had a 73.

Tied at 210 were Doug Ford, Crystal River, Fla., and Stan Leonard, Vancouver, B. C. Hebert had 211, along with Billy Casper.

And far down in the running was National Open cham-

pion Arnold Palmer, who shot a four over par nine on the 15th hole and still came in with 73 for a 218 score.

A failure in three previous appearances in this golf tournament, the colorful Snead, now 48 years old, thrilled the gallery of 11,000 around the final hole with his 50-foot downhill putt. When the ball dropped into the cup, the crowd let out a thunderclap of applause.

"I hit that putt a mighty light," said Sam later, but the wind helped it the last couple of feet."

The wind ruined what should have been a brilliant round for Player. Five under par going into the 18th hole, Player's tee shot went into a lake and he took a double bogey for a 69. That tied him with Bolt, who had a 73 to do.

Hebert complicated his problems on the par four 18th,

a well trapped, 432-yard hole. He hit his second shot into the trap, failed to get out on his first attempt. In disgust he slammed his club into the sand, then blasted out the next time. He later called a two-stroke penalty on himself for grounding his club in the trap, taking a seven.

Snead said he played very well considering the wind.

"I hit my woods just about as good as I can," he said.

"But my putting mostly was lousy. I missed a half dozen little ones."

Besides the 50-footer, however, he sank one from 13 feet on the ninth and from 10 feet on the 13th for birdies. He had nines of 35-34.

Others still in contention included Bill Collins, Crystal River, Fla., at 212, and Julius Boros, Mid Pines, N. C., with 213.

Woolpert, who has been out of coaching for a couple of seasons, was mentor of the University of San Francisco Dons team which won the National Collegiate Athletic association basketball championship in 1955 and 1956. He was recently named coach of the San Francisco Saints entry in the new professional American Basketball league.

Woolpert was coach at USF of Bill Russell and Casey Jones who now play for the Boston Celtics.

St. Mary's football, basketball and track men will be honored at the dinner. Basketball and track athletes will receive their awards. Football awards were made last December.

Pete Newell, athletic director at University of California and coach of the 1960 U. S. Olympic basketball team, addressed the SM dinner a year ago.

Medford Choice

COMPARE FAVORABLE
Oregon high school graduates participating in varsity athletics at University of Oregon had a grade point average of 2.48 as a group during the past fall and winter terms,

according to Leo Harris, athletic director. Varsity athletes at Oregon out of California schools had a 2.42 mark and those coming to the university from other states had a 2.47 average, Harris said.

The survey on athlete scholarship at UO serves to contradict unfavorable and inaccurate comment concerning student athletes at the school. Harris said the school administration believes the survey confirms the contention that student athletes at UO continue to make satisfactory progress toward graduation and have a GPA which compares very favorably with the average GPA of male students at the school. He didn't say what the latter average is.

Highest average was among the footballers from high schools outside of Oregon and California. Their GPA was 2.78. Track men from states other than Oregon and California showed 2.72.

Corvallis—(UPI)—Oregon State rolled up its seventh and eighth dual track meet wins of the season by rolling over Washington State and Idaho here Saturday.

The Beavers defeated the Cougars 91-39 and routed Idaho 107-23. No triangular or Washington State-Idaho meet scores were compiled.

Versatile Steve Pauly led the Beaver onslaught. Pauly picked up firsts in the 120-yard high hurdles in 14.7 seconds and captured the javelin throw with a heave of 208-feet-6.

Oregon State, beaten only by Oregon in dual meet competition this year, took first places in 10 events.
