Red Cross Honors Past Chairmen

The Jackson County chapter of the American Red Cross observed International Red Cross day and honored four past chairmen at the monthly board meeting Thursday noon at the chapter house.

Past chairmen honored were Seth M. Bullis, Eugene Thorndike, Edward Branchfield and Manville Heisel. Mrs. John S. Day reviewed the chapter's program and accomplishments during the time each man had served as chairman. Mr. Bullis served from 1940-1950; Mr. Branchfield from 1950-52; Mr. Thorndike, who is in Europe and unable to attend the session, from 1952-57, and Mr. Heisel, who succeeded this term by Dr. Elmo Stevenson of Southern Oregon college.

Mrs. Day mentioned that during recent years the chapter has moved into a new building donated by Mr. and Mrs. Alfred S. V. Carpenter, Red Cross workers and sponsors of many years.

Four young people spoke on various phases of the International Red Cross. They were in Suk Bak, Korean student at Southern Oregon college; Tom Strong, Canadian student at SOC; Brian Porter, president of the McLoughlin

Junior High school student body, and Steve Blackhurst, president of Hedrick Junior High school student body.

In addition Miss Seung Rhee, another Korean student at SOC, played a piano selection.

The speakers pointed out that the Red Cross, organized about 100 years ago to alleviate suffering during war times, has now broadened its scope until the National Societies of the Red Cross operate in every country.

The organization strives to help countries devastated by epidemics or floods, and gives aid regardless of race, creed or nationality. The international headquarters are in Geneva, Switzerland, because of this country's position of neutrality, and there a committee of 25 operates as a mediator between countries in matters coming under the Red Cross program.

Brian Porter said the Junior Red Cross is organized to fill the needs of youth in each country and works toward "a better world with a share and share alike idea." He said the Junior Red Cross promotes "bonds of affection between peoples." Steve Blackhurst talked of the international al-

bum project of JRC which helps the youth of each country learn about another nation, and also promotes "self analysis and a sense of human values."

The international school art program was also explained.

In Suk Bak, in addition to speaking on International Red Cross, told of seeing Red Cross workers during the bombings of Japan during World War II. The Canadian student spoke of how Junior Red Cross operates in his country, saying that it is well organized for all grades in the public school system.

Dr. Stevenson presided. Luncheon was served by the Red Cross Canteen corps.
