

Tigers Take Two From Chicago While Yanks Lose To Angels

White Sox Falter Twice By 8-6 and 5-3 Scores

United Press International. "Going places with youth." That's the battle cry of the Detroit Tiger and Cincinnati Reds as they streak through the early season like pennant winners.

Who would have thought one month ago that Jake Wood, Phil Regan and Joe Grzenda would play important roles in pulling the Tigers away to a 2½-game lead in the American league race? Or, for that matter, who could have figured that Gordon Coleman, Chico Cardenas, Jim O'Toole and Howie Nunn would help boost the Reds into second place on May 8, just two games behind the San Francisco Giants?

The Tigers made it five straight victories and eight in their last 10 games by sweeping a doubleheader Sunday from the faltering Chicago White Sox, 8-6 and 5-3.

The Reds, who one week ago broke an eight-game losing streak, ran their current string of victories to eight straight by winning both games of a doubleheader from the Milwaukee Braves, 5-4 and 4-0.

San Francisco widened its National league lead to two games by beating the Philadelphia Phils, 7-0, while the Los Angeles Dodgers dropped the Pittsburgh Pirates into third place with a 4-2 setback.

The St. Louis Cardinals beat the Chicago Cubs, 4-2, in the first game of a scheduled twill called after five innings because of rain.

In the AL, the Los Angeles Angels helped Detroit's cause by beating the second-place New York Yankees for the second straight day, 5-3.

The Washington Senators split a doubleheader with the Cleveland Indians, winning the opener, 4-3, after losing the second, 4-3. The Boston Red Sox outslugged the Minnesota Twins, 11-9, and the Kansas City Athletics edged the Baltimore Orioles, 5-4 in 10 innings. A scheduled second game between the A's and Orioles was rained out.

Detroit's double victory extended the White Sox's losing streak to seven games and dropped them into last place. After two homers by Roy Sievers had sent Chicago off to a 6-2 lead in the opening game, the Tigers exploded with five runs in the seventh inning. Wood tripled home two runs off Early Wynn during the rally and hit an insurance homer in the eighth. Grzenda pitched one hitless relief inning and was credited with his first major league triumph.

Home Barge Wins. In the nightcap, Regan gave up eight hits, including home runs by Al Smith and Minnie Miñoso. Sievers' throwing arm and Chico Fernandez' two-run single in the third and Rocky Colavito's homer in the fifth provided the runs that beat Cal McLish.

Cincinnati, trailing Warren Spahn 0-4 going into the eighth inning of the opener, erupted with a four-homer barrage in the last two innings. "Old-timers" Frank Robinson and Wally Post hit back-to-back homers for three runs in the eighth. Cardenas

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Phils Hit, Can't Score; Giants Win

Pittsburgh — (UPI) — The San Francisco Giants have added another item to their list of unbelievable feats for 1961.

Alvin Dark's National league leaders were outlasted Sunday—yet won by a 7-0 shutout over Philadelphia. Giants stranded just one baserunner in a combination of home run power, basepath hustling and sharp fielding.

Philadelphia, meanwhile, abandoned six men. In one inning the Phils drilled three straight singles but failed to advance a runner to third.

Broadway Billy Loe went the route for his third victory against one loss. He tossed a slick seven-hitter while striking out seven, walking none, and equalling his total victory record for last season.

Veteran Robin Roberts, off to the worst start of his long baseball career, dropped his fifth straight without a victory.

Pirates Next

But the moment of truth may be near for the Candlestickers, who have won four straight, eight of 10 on the road, and 10 of their last 13. The Giants must face the defending world champion Pittsburgh Pirates for three games beginning tonight.

Jack Sanford (1-2) gets the call for San Francisco. He'll face Harvey Haddix (1-0) of the Pirates, who trail the Giants by two and one-half games in third place. San Francisco leads second place Cincinnati by two.

Felipe Alou, Orlando Cepeda and Ed Bailey all blasted circuit clouts Sunday.

Alou slammed his third homer of the campaign in the second to put the Giants on top 1-0.

Some heads-up baserunning by Willie Mays made it 2-0 in the fourth. Mays walked, stole second and kept right on going to third when the ball skipped into center field. Willie then scored on the first of two sacrifice flies by Willie McCovey.

That was enough for the Giant victory. But San Francisco really unloaded on Roberts, who tossed a three-hitter for the first five frames, in the sixth.

Jim Davenport and Chuck Hiller singled and the runners went to second and third when Johnny Callison's throw from the outfield hit Davenport. Mays was walked intentionally to fill the bases. McCovey hit his second sacrifice fly. Then Cepeda bombed one of the longest homers hit in Connie Mack stadium to empty the bases.

The blow, Cepeda's fifth this year, landed atop the left field second-deck bleacher roof. It probably would have traveled 450 feet if not halted by a soft-drink sign.

Bailey's first roundtripper of the season as a Giant came during the seventh to complete the scoring.

Alou saved Loe's shutout in the fourth when the Phils opened with three straight singles. The Giant right fielder cut down Bob Sadwaski's perfect from first to third with a going no-bounce heave after the second base blow. Loe got out of the frame by getting Clay Dalrymple to pop, and striking out Pancho Herrera.

Philadelphia outlasted San Francisco, 7-8. But all but one of the Phils' safeties were singles. It marked Philadelphia's sixth straight loss.

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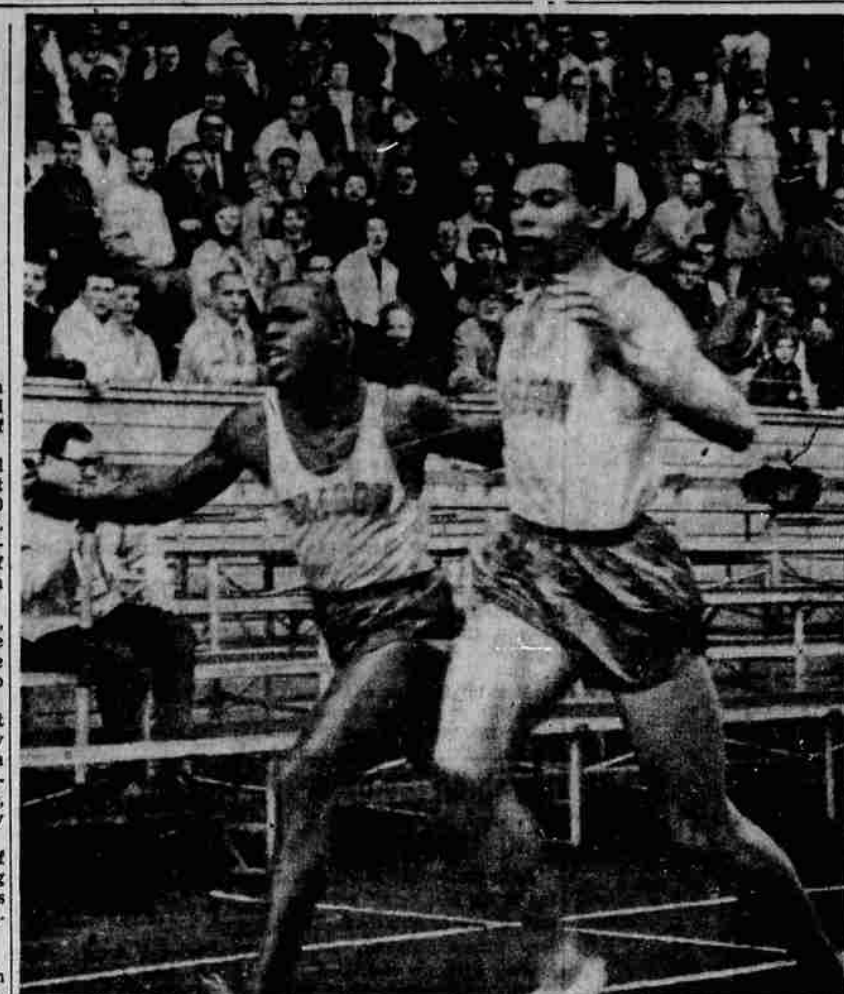

Los Angeles Ace Leads ABC Master's Play

Detroit — (UPI) — Al Horn Jr., 23-year-old Los Angeles bowler who rolled a 300 in qualifying play, starred again Sunday night in the match play finals of the American Bowling Congress Master's bowling tournament.

Horn bowled a 913 four-game set against Harry Smith of St. Louis, former all-star champion who had a 799. Horn's first round total was the best of the night by the 64 finalists.

His perfect game was the first recorded in the 11 years of the Master's tournament.

Four former champions in the large final field also won first round matches.

Defending Champion Billy Golembewski, of Detroit, the defending champion, bested Sneed Christian, of El Paso, Tex., 830 to 677. Ray Bluth, of St. Louis, 1959 titlist, outscored Vern Downing, of Rodeo, Calif., 830 to 806. Dick Hoover, of St. Louis, the only man to win two Master's tournaments in 1956 and 1957, romped over Ralph Brunt, of Atlanta, Ga., 869 to 729.

Tom Hennessey, of St. Louis, the 1958 champion, defeated Bob Goike, of Detroit, 818 to 755.

Wayne Pinkalla, of Milwaukee, who set a qualifying record of 1771, lost his first round match to Mickey Hoydic, of Flint, Mich., 833 to 790.

The Master's tournament is a double elimination match play affair with two defeats and out. The finals will be held Wednesday night.

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Sneed, 49, Easily Wins Golf Tourney

Las Vegas, Nev. — (UPI) — Samuel Jackson Sneed who is pushing 49 has proved once again that age is no barrier to a top notch golf game.

And he's looking forward to another shot at the U. S. Open, the lone major professional golf title that has eluded him.

Sneed ran away with the 72-hole \$52,000 Tournament of Champions on the Desert Inn Country club course Sunday, winning by seven strokes and adding \$10,000 to his already considerable bankroll.

Bucking strong winds which intermittently swept the desert course, he carded a 72-hole total of 273-15 under par.

Second place went to another veteran, Tommy Bolt, with a total of 280 — seven strokes back of Sneed. Bolt picked up \$5,000.

Big Bill Collins, at 281, took third place and \$3,000; Bob Rosberg got 282 and \$2,500; and Doug Ford 283 and \$2,100.

Jay Hebert, the National PGA champion who led the tournament for the first two rounds, finished in a tie for sixth with 284 and \$1,760.

The only two foreign entrants in the elite field of 28 major tournament winners here — Stan Leonard, Vancouver, B. C., and Gary Player, Johannesburg, South Africa — were tied with Hebert at 284.

U. S. Open champion Arnold Palmer, who had a 69 on opening day on the par 36-38-72 Desert Inn course, saw his game go to pieces and finished in a tie for 18th place with Tournament of Champions defending titlist Jerry Barber and Don Fairfield at 296. They didn't go away empty handed, however, and each won \$1,160.

Sneed, who will be 49 May 27, moved into a five-stroke lead at the end of three rounds and breezed in on the final 18. His rounds were: 68-67-69-69 — remarkably consistent golf in erratic weather.

Biggest Money Winner

He has won more golf tournaments and more money than any other man in history. His official lifetime earnings are approximately \$280,000. All told he has won more than \$400,000 and with his victory here he became the

oldest man ever to win a PGA tournament.
