Sox Mentor Says Star Is Welcome

Los Angeles - UP - Outfielder Jackie Jensen, who quit baseball for the 1950 season, was due to rejoin the Boston Red Sox today after leaving the club for a week because he was despondent over his slow start this year.

The one-time Most Valuable American leaguer telephoned Sox Vice President Dick O'Connell Sunday from Las Vegas, Nev., saying he was driving here to rejoin the team.

Manager Mike Higgins, hearing the former football star had decided to return, said he would be welcomed back.

"Other guys have jumped teams before for other reasons. Jackie just made a mistake," Higgins said.

"He's done a lot for this team in the past," added pitcher Mike Fournelle, "and he can do it again."

The Red Sox arrived here by plane from Minneapolis late Sunday night. Jensen was due to arrive at about the same time, but sources said he was staying overnight with friends.

Jensen jumped the team April 29 in Cleveland, without any explanation.

Jensen, who was hitting just .130 when he dramatically left the team, later explained he quit because he didn't feel he was doing the Red Sox any good.

O'Connell accepted Jensen's apologies for leaving the team and immediately said the hard hitting outfielder was welcome back.

Vikings Sign Right Guards

St. Paul-Minneapolis - UP - A battle for the job of offensive right guard with the Minnesota Vikings was assured today with the signing of veterans Mike Rabold and Grady Alderman.

Rabold, obtained from the St. Louis Cardinals, stands 6 feet 2 inches and weighs 240 and was graduated from Indiana in 1959. Alderman, 6-3 and 235 pounds, is a Detroit University graduate who played with the Lions last year.
