Mental Health Clinics Approved

Salem — (UPI) — A bill to establish community mental health clinics was approved by the Senate State and Federal Affairs Committee today.

Instead of abolishing the Board of Control and placing the clinics under a new social services department, the measure now would strengthen the board by giving it supervision over the clinics.

House Speaker Robert Duncan said he was disappointed at the change. But he said, "I would rather have the mental health program by itself than nothing, as it is the heart of the bill."

It was a significant victory for Secretary of State Howell Applegate Jr., who sits with Gov. Mark Hatfield and Treasurer Howard Belmont on the board.

Applegate has sought to retain the board's power over state hospitals and institutions, while Hatfield, in his government reorganization plan, has tried to eliminate the board.

Coast Cities Adopt 'Sundial Time'

Salem — (UPI) — Seaside, Cannon Beach and Gearhart today "seceded" from the state because of the daylight-standard time confusion and vowed to go on "sundial time."

The tongue-in-cheek decision was announced by Gov. Mark Hatfield by a five-member coast group headed by Rep. William Holmstrom (D-Gearhart).

Holmstrom read a proclamation to Hatfield at his regular news conference announcing formation of the "sovereign domain of the sunset strip," with Holmstrom as premier.

Holmstrom invited Hatfield to the area but asked him not to bring a wristwatch because they won't be needed any more.

Hatfield said he would do that, and cracked that he has two wristwatches now — one for daylight time and one for standard.

The greater Portland area went on daylight time Sunday while the remainder of the state remains on Pacific standard Time.

Resolution Calls for Adjournment

Salem — (UPI) — A resolution calling for sine die adjournment of the 1961 Legislature at 4 p.m. Tuesday was introduced today by the House Rules Committee.

It was an amended version of a resolution that originally called for adjournment for good April 22.

The measure probably will come up for house action late today or early tomorrow.

The senate must agree before it becomes official. The resolution is subject to last-minute revisions in day and hour, but its appearance means adjournment is near.

Nurses Protest Handling of Bill

Salem — (UPI) — The Oregon Nurses association today protested a senate committee's action in tacking the "Little Landrum-Griffin" labor bill onto a nurses' collective bargaining measure to circumvent the House Labor and Industries committee.

Criticizing the senate committee's action on State and Federal Affairs, the association said HB1360, the nurses' bill, should "stand or fall on its own merits."

Mrs. Johnnie C. Schick, association president, said the nurses "dislike having their bill involved in an obvious political maneuver to secure passage of another which is so highly controversial."

The senate committee's purpose was to tack SB206, "Little Landrum-Griffin" to HB1360, the Nurses' Collective Bargaining bill, as an "amendment" so when the package returns to the house it will go directly to the house floor for action rather than to the unfriendly House Labor Committee.

Portland Shooting Ruled Self Defense

Portland — (UPI) — Circuit Judge Donald E. Long ruled in Juvenile Court today that Donald E. Van Acker, 16, who shot and killed his stepfather April 13, acted in defense of his mother and in self defense.

The ruling was made following a hearing into the fatal shooting of William F. Bloomquist on that date.

Witness Describes Ordeal at Hands of Nazi Executioners

Jerusalem — (UPI) — A Jewish woman who suffered a heart attack Friday took the witness stand today to tell how the Nazis shot her in the head and left her in a grave filled with corpses and the moans of the dying.

Mrs. Rivka Yoselevska was supposed to have testified Friday, but just before her scheduled appearance she had a heart attack. Today she insisted on telling her story. Compared to what she has endured in the past, a heart attack seemed to be something as minor as a headache.

Many Grim Stories

Many witnesses have told many grim stories at the trial of Adolf Eichmann, but none has clutched at the hearts of the spectators as did this middle-aged woman who twisted a handkerchief in her hands and occasionally dabbled at her eyes with it.

Mrs. Yoselevska testified after the defense won its first victory in the long running battle over getting someone to testify for Eichmann. The attorney general agreed that Israel would grant safeconduct to two former Nazis who are willing to come here and testify in Eichmann's behalf.

The setting of Mrs. Yoselevska's story was a small town in Russia near Pinsk. The Germans entered in 1941.

"Some of us fled and hid in a small forest," the witness said. "We heard shooting and when it stopped we went back."

"I remained there stretched out on the grave three days and three nights. After three days some herdsmen drove their cows onto the fields and they began throwing stones at me. Then they didn't know if I was dead or mad. Then a farmer went by and he took pity on me. He fed me and helped me to join a group of Jews in the forest. I stayed there until after the war."
