Excessive Changes Blamed for Delays At Missile Bases

Washington — (UPI) — A top AFL-CIO official said today that organized labor was not responsible for the major delays in construction of U.S. space and missile bases.

C. J. (Neil) Haggerty, president of the AFL-CIO Building Trades Department, contended that inefficient management and multiple changes in construction plans caused the lag in missile bases completion.

Testimony before a Senate investigations subcommittee headed by Sen. John L. McClellan (D-Ark.) had indicated that a series of union strikes, slowdowns and excessive overtime caused the delay.

Meantime, Secretary of Labor Arthur J. Goldberg was expected to report on proposals for setting up new government machinery to bring labor-management peace to the missile sites.

Haggerty said in a statement filed with the McClellan subcommittee that excessive modification in missile launching plans were a major factor in the delay.

"The preponderance of evidence from all sources shows that the delays in the completion of the missile base construction program are primarily due to nonlabor factors, such as the inordinate number of change orders resulting from the concurrency policy," Haggerty said.

This policy was designed to keep the missile sites up to date by introducing modifications even while they were being built.

At Lowry Air Force Base, near Denver, Haggerty said, there were 800 major design changes. The utility piping system was modified six times.

The union spokesman said the AFL-CIO department does not condone "unauthorized, irresponsible and unjustified strikes" at missile bases. On the contrary, he said, the unions have voluntarily taken action to keep such workouts at a minimum.
