POST ELECTION THOUGHTS

Now that the Gold Hill Water filtration plant proposal has been soundly thrashed by more than a 6 to 1 majority, there are probably many who are hopeful the turmoil which engulfed the city will be buried. We join in this hope.

Passions brought forth for and against the proposal created bitterness in many quarters. Whether hatchets will be buried soon is a matter for speculation. I hope they are. Gold Hill is a fine Oregon small city. It has many assets, including beautiful home sites and an outstanding sewage disposal plant. Unlike many other area cities, Gold Hill isn't facing a water shortage which could limit future growth.

The potential is there. It would be nice if everyone could get together and pull for a common cause again, extolling the virtues of the city and adopting a city slogan such as "800 Friendly People Welcome You to Gold Hill, A Fine Place to Live."

As many Gold Hill regional page readers know, this column supported the filtration plant proposal. No apologies will be offered, only disappointment. And not disappointment that the proposal was defeated. We respect the judgment of the 196 who voted "no" and know they did so with strong conviction.

But in our judgment, there are many who voted no because they were confused about facts when they went to the polls. One astute political authority observed many years ago that when people aren't sure of what they are voting for, they will vote no.

The Gold Hill politicians did little to unswear the maze of facts. Less than 50 people attended the filtration plant public hearing April 12. With over 200 voters in the city, it should have been obvious that a well planned publicity campaign was needed to acquaint all voters with the issue. As it was, rumors spread, and figures were abundant. And as rumors spread, they just became more distorted.

Things got out of hand for advocates of the proposal. But little was done to officially set the record straight. Members of the city council and the mayor remained silent. Then on the night before the election, a pamphlet signed by the mayor was circulated explaining the issue. It said "there are the facts and figures which cannot be changed regardless of what has been written." The intentions were admirable, but the timing was poor. The night before an election is hardly the time to set the record straight.

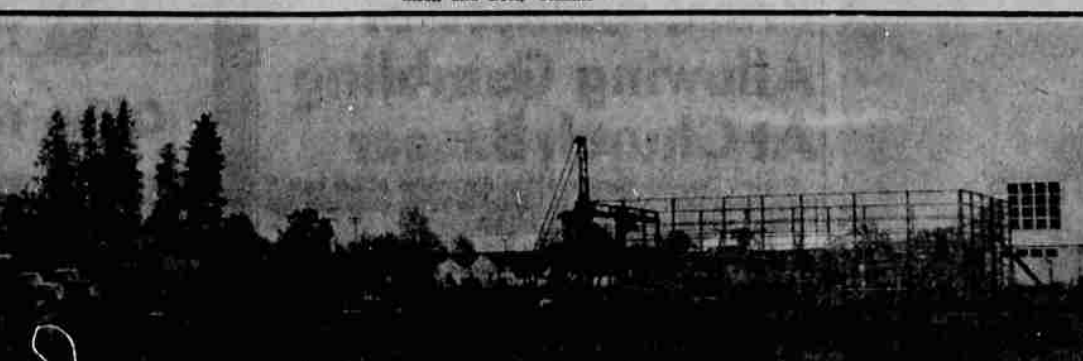

Cave Junction Gets Sewer Study Grant

Cave Junction—The Federal Community Facilities Administration has approved an advance of \$1,200 to Cave Junction for preliminary planning of a sanitary sewer system to cost an estimated \$80,725, according to Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.).

In making the announcement, Morse said construction of the system is scheduled to start next January. Present methods of sewage disposal have become a health hazard, according to city officials.

The advance planning funds are authorized by the Federal Housing Act of 1954, which contains a section authorizing free advances for planning essential public works. The advance will be repayable upon start of construction.

Gold Hill Street Extension Opposed

Gold Hill - Thirteen property owners in Block 2 of the Riverside addition voted against a proposal that First ave. be extended through that section of Gold Hill at a recent public hearing conducted by the city council.

The hearing was conducted to consider a request by Mr. and Mrs. John Cogswell that their property in the Riverside addition be rezoned from residential to commercial. The Cogswells' propose to build a super market and shopping center on the property.

Mayor Milton Steinmetz said that as far as he was concerned the street extension proposal would not be considered by the council when acting on the zone change request.

Council Approves 2 Acre Annexation

Phoenix - The Phoenix city council passed an ordinance annexing two acres to the city at its meeting Monday night.

The new annexation is on the corner of Rost st. and Bolz rd. Mrs. A. H. Dudley, owner of the annexed area and the Athel Hupp Dudley Truck Transporting Inc. is constructing a truck terminal on the property.

Other additions to the city in the last two years have been the Hacienda Park subdivision and a strip of land bordering north on Fern Valley rd.

Grants Pass Man Asks Carrier Permit

Salem - WFO - The application of a Grants Pass livestock dealer asking common and private carrier authority has been set for a public hearing May 25 in Grants Pass.

Public Utility Commissioner Jonel C. Hill said the application was filed by George E. Bretz. He wants to haul livestock, feed and private property in Josephine county.

At least one protest has been filed. This came from E. J. Lathrop of Central Point who contends that he provides adequate area service under his permit and further competition is not justified.

Crater French Teacher To Attend Institute

Central Point - Mrs. Barbara Tomlinson, Crater High school French and English teacher, has been chosen to attend a foreign language institute for high school French teachers.

The institute will be held at Montana State university in Missoula from June 19 through August 12. Mrs. Tomlinson's expenses will be paid by the National Defense Education act, designed to make teachers orally proficient in the language which they are currently teaching. Study will include linguistics and syntax of French, phonetics and language laboratory techniques.

Participants will live in a special dormitory where nothing but French will be spoken. Mrs. Tomlinson has also been chosen as alternate for a Fulbright scholarship in French and as alternate for a fellowship given by the French-American Cultural service in New York.

Well Child Clinic Set for Prospect

Prospect - A well child clinic will be held at the Prospect Community hall May 17 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Children from 6 months to 6 years are eligible to attend. The clinic is primarily for children not under regular health supervision by a family physician.

Immunizations will be offered. Dr. A. E. Merkel, public health physician, will be examining doctor. Appointments may be made by calling UNION 9-2201.

Eagle Point Council Approves 3 Resolutions

Eagle Point - Three resolutions were approved at the re-convened session of the Eagle Point City Council's May meeting Monday night. Enforcement of the Jackson county dog control law was also asked.

A resolution authorized the city attorney to make necessary applications for Federal Housing and Finance agency funds for sale of sewage disposal plant bonds.

In a second resolution, the council showed their intent to study a program to increase sewer charges to better benefit the bond interest rate if necessary.

Clifford Wolfe, investment counselor with June S. Jones Survey Counselors of Portland, was hired by the city following an interview with council members Sunday.

Due to the \$12,000 deficit in collection of property taxes in the area, professional help in making a survey of the area's economic and tax payment records was found necessary to successfully sell the sewer bonds at a reasonable rate.

Wolfe assured the council that he was certain the bonds could be sold at a favorable interest rate following survey and compilation of necessary facts. A third resolution authorized the recorder to pay Wolfe

Church Official Raps Birch Society

Los Angeles - WFO - Dr. Eugene Carson Blake, chief executive of the United Presbyterian Church in the United States, criticized the John Birch Society and its founder, Robert Welch, Tuesday for saying Communists have infiltrated the Protestant ministry.

"I'll stand the Presbyterian ministry and the Protestant ministry in general up against any similar sized group for their loyalty," Blake told a meeting of the Los Angeles Presbytery, the denomination's largest.

Blake compared charges leveled at ministers to the "big lie" technique of Adolf Hitler, who, he said, proved that no matter how absurd a falsehood it could brainwash a whole nation if repeated often enough.

"Allegations of Communist infiltration of the Protestant ministry or of the leadership of our church are brazen falsehoods," he said.

Eugene Man Hurt In Plane Crash

Eugene - WFO - George Millet Jr., Eugene, was injured seriously Tuesday when the single-engine plane he was piloting crashed near Coburg.

Millet, who was brought to Sacred Heart hospital here, suffered a cut on his forehead and leg injuries. A witness said the plane apparently stalled and crashed nose down into the ground. Millet was trapped in the plane's cabin for some time before he could be removed.

The crash occurred about three miles north of Coburg in a field near the Coburg-Brownsville road.
