

Legislature Adjournment Predicted for Tonight

Salem — (UPI) — The Legislature tried to adjourn Tuesday night but failed and today entered what session leaders billed as the last day — the 122nd.

The House had approved a final adjournment time of 8 p.m. Tuesday but the Senate ignored this, breaking up shortly before 5 p.m. and scheduling a full day today.

It takes agreement of both houses for final adjournment. There was widespread feeling in both chambers that session time today — probably tonight — is it.

Regular committee action remained almost non-existent

Tuesday as both houses labor through long calendars. Special conference committees of four members each continued to hammer out last-minute compromises, with the income tax relief conferees still at an impasse.

The next two-year budget continued to shape up as about \$366 million, \$7 million over that recommended by Gov. Mark Hatfield, with the key Ways and Means committee ready to quit.

Other Highlights

Education — A basic school support hike from the present \$105 per census child to \$120 per child by 1963 passed the

Senate unanimously and went to Hatfield. This is \$5 a child more than he recommended for the second year of the biennium. The state's contribution to school costs would be \$20 million over the present \$107 million.

Senate Approves Commercial Code

Salem — (UPI) — The Senate late Tuesday approved the uniform commercial code bill, a swing proposal that affects just about every business transaction in the state.

The bill passed 20-8 and went back to the House for concurrence in amendments. Effective date of the act, as proposed by the Senate, would be Sept. 1, 1963.

Sen. Thomas R. Mahoney (D-Portland) lost in an attempt to get the measure referred to legislative counsel. He said making the effective date in 1963 is like "putting a time bomb in your house and if you don't pull the plug in two years it'll blow up in your face."

Mahoney declared it would "wreck" bulk sales, hurting wholesalers.

House and went to the Governor. Effective in 1963, the proposal would streamline business laws and affect virtually every business deal in Oregon.

Timber Tax — The fast and slow cutter compromise on Western Oregon timber taxation won concurrence and repassage in the Senate and went to the governor. Fast timber cutters pay more tax under the bill and slower cutters get that spread of relief.

Constitution — The House okayed and sent to the Senate a measure setting up a 21-member commission on revision of the state constitution. It would include former governors, 10 lay members and eight legislators. It would make recommendations to the 1963 legislature.

Politics — A much-rewritten bill requiring convening of state party conventions within 45 to 60 days after a primary election won 40-20 approval in the House and headed for the governor. Originally it allowed political parties to choose national committee members and national convention delegates but this was knocked out by the Senate.

Schools — The Senate Education Committee voted out "do pass" a bill transferring authority over school board members from county courts to rural school boards. The vote was 6-1.

Johnson To Meet With Viet Nam President Tonight

United Press International Honolulu — Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson, ready for the long hop to Red-throated Viet Nam, called on Americans today to answer communism's "deviousness" with free world determination.

The vice president was to wind up his 17-hour stopover in Hawaii with a 10 a.m. (PST) takeoff for Saigon, where tonight he will open discussions with President Ngo Dinh Diem on how far the United States will go to beef up that government's resistance to communism.

Second on Journey

His Viet Nam visit will be the second stop of a two-week, 28,500-mile journey which probably will take him around the world.

Johnson's Honolulu welcome was enough to warm the heart of any Texan. The former Texas senator basked in Hawaiian sunshine and choruses of "aloha" as he sped through two formal speeches, two receptions, a dinner and scores of conversations.

It reminded newsmen traveling with Johnson of his grueling 1960 campaign—and of former Vice President Richard Nixon's own goodwill mission to Hawaii and the Far East in 1953.

Kept Silence Johnson kept his silence on specifics of the message he is taking to Diem from President Kennedy. He firmly refused to comment on a report he was carrying an offer of \$40 million to Saigon—the amount Diem is said to seek. But other sources here tagged this as sheer speculation.

In other ways the vice president strongly indicated the United States is prepared to stand squarely behind Viet Nam's resistance to the Communist threat which has grown in importance to Red gains in neighboring Laos.

Gromyko To Attend Laos Conference

Geneva — (UPI) — Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko flew in from Moscow today for the Laos peace conference.

The 14-nation conference is scheduled to open Friday. But the United States and Britain have said they will not participate without proof of an effective cease fire in the Southeast Asian kingdom.

A three-nation cease fire team has been dispatched to Laos but thus far has been unable to contact any competent pro-Communist rebel officials. A dispatch by the Soviet news agency Tass from Hanoi today quoted the Pathet Lao as saying that the provisions of the cease fire "must be agreed upon first" by the rival factions before the international control commission could begin operations.

School Support Hike Approved

Salem — (UPI) — The Senate Tuesday approved and sent to the governor a bill increasing basic school support from \$105 per census child to \$120 per child over the next two years.

The present state aid for local school costs amounts to \$107 million but \$1108 increases this to \$127 million, or 38.2 per cent.

The proposal makes the boost to \$115 a child in 1961-62 moving to the \$120 per child figure in 1962-63.

This is the same that Gov. Mark Hatfield recommended the first year, but \$5 more than he recommended the second year.

The vote was unanimous and came after a motion by Sen. Monroe Sweetland to earmark part of a future state surplus for basic school use.

The Milwaukie Democrat proposed that 75 per cent of any state surplus over the next two years over that envisioned by the Ways and Means committee be earmarked for basic school.

This was defeated 16-13 after Ways and Means Co-Chairman Daniel Thiel called this "treating on dangerous ground."

Wiretapping Said To Be Necessary

Washington — (UPI) — A New York state official today told the Senate Constitutional Rights sub-committee that law enforcement officers must be able to use wiretaps if they are to break up organized crime.

Goodman A. Sarachan, chairman of the New York State Investigation Commission, told the committee in prepared testimony that telephone eavesdropping is necessary to capture the men "at the top of the criminal syndicates."

The committee is studying proposals to modify a law barring wiretapping. Experts say the law has been changed by court rulings and is widely ignored. It also conflicts with many state laws.

Sarachan said hundreds of criminal proceedings have been held up or dismissed because of the law. He said 25 gambling cases were dismissed three weeks ago in Rochester, N.Y., because the district attorney "felt it would not be safe" to introduce evidence gained from wiretaps.

APPROVE TREATY

Washington — (UPI) — The Senate Foreign Relations Committee has approved an extradition treaty with Brazil designed to eliminate a haven for American criminals. The committee sent the pact to the Senate Tuesday for ratification after State Department legal adviser Abram Chayes testified that it would permit the United States to seek the return of a number of U.S. citizens under indictment for various crimes.

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
