She has performed with Arturo Toscanini, Frank Black, Howard Barlow, Lyn Murray, Peter Wilhousky, and the NBC Symphony orchestra.

Mrs. Bailey received the Kathryn Long scholarship at the Metropolitan Opera company, which led to training there.

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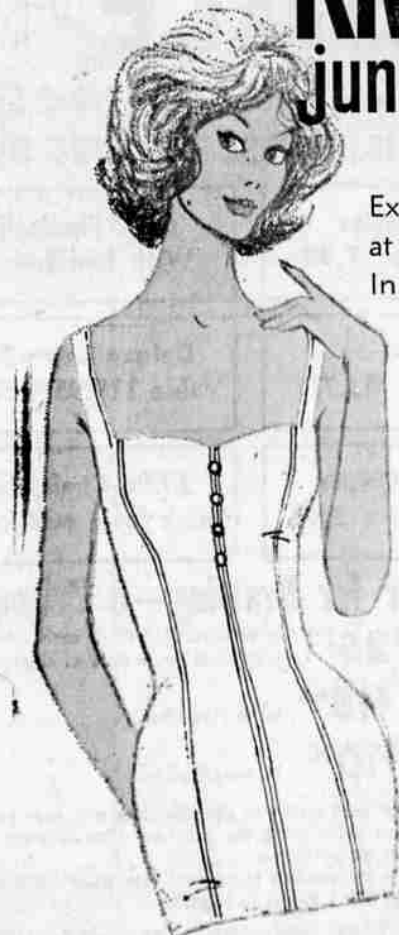
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
