Washington—(CQ)—How far should the government go in giving aid to religion? That question has come to national attention recently in the dispute over whether to let religious schools share in federal aid to education.

Hoover Marks 37 Years as FBI Head

Washington—(UPI)—J. Edgar Hoover observed the 37th anniversary of his appointment as FBI director Wednesday with the usual "celebration"—a day at his office desk.

It was in 1924 that the late Harlan Fiske Stone, attorney general in the Coolidge cabinet, named the 29-year-old Hoover as head of the newly created Federal Bureau of Investigation.

designed to make people observe Sunday as Sabbath. Orthodox Jewish merchants who close voluntarily on Saturday also object to being forced to close Sunday and losing a second day of business.

The states argue, however, that the Sunday laws are not religious in character, but are simply designed to insure everyone at least one day of rest from work each week.

Involved in part in the Sunday law dispute are economic rivalries between roadside retail chains that cater to Sunday drivers, and the downtown competitors who usually close on Sunday. The latter would like to see the Sunday laws strictly enforced so that the roadside chains would have to close Sunday.

Bible Reading

In Pennsylvania, reading of the Bible in all schools is required each day. One Unitarian parent of three children challenged this law on the grounds that his children were being forced to listen to indoctrination in religious ideas with which he disagreed. The parent charged that the passages read contained doctrines on the trinity and other matters in which Unitarians did not believe. After the case was raised, the state legislature changed the law to permit children to be excused from Bible reading if their parents objected. The case has now been sent back to a lower court, but it illustrates a particularly bitter source of conflict in the localities where Bible reading and recitation of prayer are frequently attacked by minority groups.

Several married couples have challenged this law on the grounds that it violates their rights of privacy. Although there is no direct charge that the state government is trying to enforce the religious beliefs of a particular group that opposes contraception, it is no secret that the Roman Catholic Church, which opposes contraceptive devices on doctrinal grounds, is a major political force in the state.

Central to the cases described above is a major disagreement over the proper state role in religious matters. Arguments for strict separation of church and state generally are based on the fear that any government interference in religion—even to help it—will eventually mean state control and the end of freedom of conscience, particularly for minority groups who fear being compelled to observe the religious norms of the dominant majority in the community.
