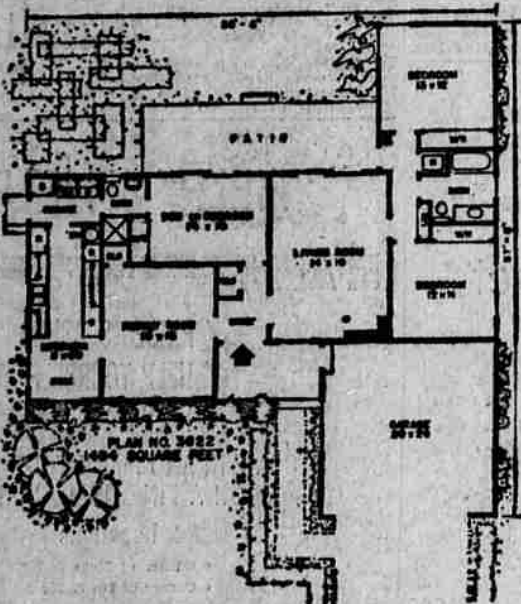


This Week's Ranch and Modern Home

The exterior of this design is both visually exciting and wonderfully practical. A wide eave overhangs the entire house protects the windows from the direct rays of the sun and rain.

Up-to-date aluminum windows have been specified throughout this modern ranch style home as they are much easier to keep clean and there is a minimum of maintenance involved.

The garage door has been constructed of strong exterior plywood and is so light in weight that it can easily be opened by a child. Strips of wood have been nailed over the plywood to form a design. These strips of wood can be painted a different color so as to contrast with the color of the door.

Vertical stacked concrete block - stone or brick could be substituted if desired - have been used in the wide chimney and to form a window high planter across the front of the kitchen and family room. From the garage, one has access to the covered front porch and double front doors which open to the wide entry. From the entry, one can enter the den or fourth bedroom, the family room or the living room.

The three-quarter bath serves both the service area and the den. There is a full bath located in the bedroom wing which features a pullman lavatory and a tub and shower combination.

All bedrooms have wide wardrobes and there is also a guest closet, a broom closet, a general storage closet off the family room, and off the bedroom hall is a wide linen storage, a general storage closet and a closet for the furnace. The furnace could be located in the garage if preferred. Sliding doors open to the large rear patio from both the

den and living room. A door also opens from the bedroom hall to the patio which guarantees that anyone building this home will be able to enjoy indoor-outdoor living to the utmost.

The victims were Guy Pascal, 61, a patient at the Oregon State hospital in Salem, and Mrs. E. J. Seelye, about 50, Port Orford.

Pascal was injured fatally when he was struck by a car while riding a bicycle in Salem. The driver of the car was not cited.

Spanish Start 1st Free Clinic For Alcoholics

Madrid - UP - While many European nations refuse to admit they have an alcoholic problem, Spain has not only decided to admit it but do something about it.

The first free out-patient clinic for alcoholics in Spain has been opened here and already has 30 patients who go every Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings for one hour of voluntary analysis of their drinking problems.

On the staff of the clinic are two psychiatrists, one clinical psychologist, one medical assistant, two social workers and a medical secretary.

The idea of the free clinic was the brain child of Dr. Joaquin Santo-Domingo, who, in collaboration with Dr. Fernandez Turegano, and Dr. Juan Ibor, put it into action. Dr. Turegano, chief of the Madrid Province Health Department, said, he was "alarmed at the tremendous problems alcoholism has created all over the world, and Spain is by no means excluded."

As yet there are no statistics on how many Spaniards can be considered alcoholics, but Dr. Santo-Domingo estimated that in 1957, 31 of every 100 patients that entered the Provincial Hospital in Madrid were alcoholics.

"Alcoholism, of course, is not hereditary, but the tendency for it is," he said. "Children born of alcoholic parents can have physical and moral defects, and in some special cases be deformed or monstrous."

"We study each patient carefully, particularly the psychological aspects of the case, to see what causes the compulsive drinking."

"Afterwards social workers visit the patient's home and place of work in an attempt to find his likes, dislikes, habits, difficulties, or in short, everything about him."

"The alcoholic gets medical treatment," Dr. Santo-Domingo said, "mainly vitamins and medicines which will be most helpful for his nervous system."

There is no set time for curing an alcoholic, according to the doctors. Sometimes they go five years without a drop and then relapse. Some alcoholics must live the rest of their lives under treatment.

The three doctors have noted that alcoholism occurs mostly in Spaniards over 40, but much younger men also go to the clinic for treatment.

Dangerous Disease

"Alcoholism is a very real and dangerous disease," Dr. Santo-Domingo said, "and there are many causes for it."

"One of the most important things for friends and family to remember, during treatment of the alcoholic, is not to watch and stare at him during the time he is trying to stop drinking."

Dr. Turegano said, "We have a new method. We no longer isolate the patient. We feel it is absolutely necessary that the family help him. We found with absolute withdrawal of alcohol, it was too easy, at some later date, for the alcoholic to fall back on his old ways. In the new method we find it of inestimable value for the family to help during the transition period. In this way the patient feels he has conquered his problem half from his environmental change and half from psychotherapy."

The visitation is held so that children will have a chance to familiarize themselves with the school and teachers, according to John E. Myers, principal.

Bills Approved In Final Minutes

Salem - UP - The 1961 legislature, in the final minutes Wednesday night, approved a resolution letting the voters decide in 1962 whether the lawmakers should be allowed to increase their own salaries.

If approved, it would remove the \$600 a year constitutional limitation.

Also passed was a watered-down implied consent traffic bill by which arresting officers could take a suspected drunken driver in for a chemical test on his oral consent.

Under present law written consent must be given.

There were two other key measures hammered out in the closing moments before final adjournment. One restricts the State Welfare Commission from making back collections under a relative responsibility law beyond 1957.

At present, they can go back as far as they want.

The other measure sets up a commission on constitutional revision, to report to the 1963 legislature.

The 17-member group would include six members appointed by the Senate president, seven by the House speaker, two by the governor and two by the chief justice of the State Supreme Court.

Originally the commission called for 21 members with former governors included. There are four living ex-chief executives. But this was stricken on the contention that all four could be appointed by any of the four persons with appointing authority.

Seven of the 17 commissioners must be legislators, three senators and four House members.

Portland Anglers Presumed Drowned

Bend - UP - Search resumed today for the bodies of two Portland fishermen, missing and presumed drowned in the Wicklup reservoir about 50 miles south of here.

State police identified them as Herbert Chilton, 62, and Wayne E. Olsen, 54.

Their boat was recovered Wednesday. State police said the men apparently drowned Tuesday night. They were last seen late Tuesday afternoon and debris from the boat was found later the same day.

The search was to include dragging operations, weather permitting. Searchers have been hampered by high winds and rain.
