

Point Shaving Charges Brought Against 4 Collegians

Raleigh—UPI—Three North Carolina State basketball players and a student at Los Angeles, Calif., State college were charged Saturday with fixing four games through point shaving.

Named in warrants issued by the state bureau of investigation were Stan Niewierowski of Brooklyn, N.Y., captain of the 1961 Wolfpack; Anton Muehlbauer of Brooklyn, star guard; Terry Litchfield of Louisville, Ky., center, and

Lou Barshak of New York City, the California student. Yesterday's disclosure brought to 14 the number of basketball players involved in "point shaving" scandals this year. Last month 11 players from six different schools were named by New York District Attorney Frank Hogan as being involved in fixing games. In addition, two men accused of arranging the "fixes" are under arrest in New York.

SBI Director Walter Anderson, who issued the warrants, said he had statements from Muehlbauer and Litchfield admitting their part in the fix. All four were charged with violation of North Carolina bribery laws.

Muehlbauer was charged with shaving points in games against George Washington University Dec. 3, 1960; Georgia Tech, Dec. 17, 1960, and the University of North Carolina, Feb. 15, 1961. He also

was charged with throwing a game against Duke University Jan. 7, 1961. Niewierowski was charged with shaving points in the North Carolina game Feb. 15 and throwing the Duke game of Jan. 7.

Litchfield was charged with shaving points in the George Washington and Georgia Tech games and Barshak was charged with being the contact man in the bribes. Anderson said that each

charge was a separate offense and carried a maximum penalty of 15 years in prison. He said that the state was asking for a \$3,000 bond for each.

Anderson said although no direct connection has been established between the N. C. State fix and the basketball scandal being investigated in New York City, he believed there is a connection.

He said that the contact for each game was made about an hour before game time.

He said Barshak first approached the players about a fix scheme while all four were playing at a Catskill mountain resort.

The SBI charged that Muehlbauer and Niewierowski each received a total of \$1,250 and Litchfield received \$1,000 for their parts in the fixes.

Muehlbauer was arrested here and Litchfield was placed under house arrest at the college infirmary here.

Police in New York City were asked to arrest Niewierowski and hold him for extradition while Los Angeles police were asked to apprehend Barshak.

Police in New York said, however, that a request for the arrest of Niewierowski had not been received as yet. The SBI director said that the N. C. State players would not be immune from penalties provided by law for testifying. "There is no immunity un-

der North Carolina law," he said.

Anderson said Litchfield had to return his bribe because the game didn't turn out the way the gamblers wanted it.

N. C. State beat George Washington and Georgia Tech, but lost to Duke and UNC after leading at halftime. Anderson said the throwing of the Duke game brought a \$250 bonus to Muehlbauer and Niewierowski.

Anderson said his office was notified by the basketball coaches at N. C. State, who said they "felt the team was not giving its full effort."

Muehlbauer and Niewierowski both withdrew from school in early April and Litchfield was expelled Saturday.

Niewierowski has signed a pro contract with Chicago in the new American Basketball league.

Medford entrants, Mary Kay Harris in singles and Linda Hess and Sandy Shugart in doubles turned back all their Friday opposition to reach Saturday semifinals in the Oregon state high school tennis tournament at Corvallis.

Black Tornado contenders, John McKinley in singles and Jim Randles and Gary Highland and Jill DuCroz and Shirley Hopkins in doubles won two matches in their respective brackets Friday before bowing out in quarterfinal play. Three other Medford girls lost out earlier.

Miss Harris emerged into prominence in the tourney by outscoring defending champ Romy Sprague, Girls' Polytechnic, Portland, in her quarterfinal match. The sets went 6-3 and 7-5.

In the highlight skirmish of the tourney's first day, Randles and Highland carried their quarterfinal to three extra game sets before falling to

Paul McCoy and Jim Krier, The Dalles. Scores were 7-5 for the Medfords and 11-19 and 8-6 for the Indian players in the three-hour scrap that could have gone either way along the route. There were a number of match point situations and Tornado Coach Bob Huff said his duo "played better tennis than I thought they could."

Medford's second girls' singles participant, Nancy Hinman, subdued Betty Geer, Hermiston, 6-3, 6-2 in her opener then was beaten by Miss Sprague, 2-6, 6-8.

'I'D DO IT AGAIN'

Colavito Chases Fan

New York—UPI—"I'm sorry it happened, but I'd do it all over again."

Rocky Colavito, the slugging left-fielder of the Detroit Tigers, was the speaker and he left no doubt whatsoever he would, indeed, do the same thing he did Friday night at Yankee Stadium—if it a similar crisis arose again.

Colavito amazed the crowd of 23,555 when he suddenly vaulted the wire fence near the Tigers' dugout in the last of the eighth inning and charged to the side of his father, Rocco Sr., who was trying to defend himself against an annoying fan. The fan was removed from the park but no charges were placed against him.

"I couldn't miss seeing my father because I knew the

hat he was wearing," explained Colavito.

Rocky Defends Action

"He's 80 years old and I'm not going to let anyone take a swing at him whether it happens to be the Yankee Stadium or anywhere else. What would you have done?" Rocky asked writers who gathered around him in the clubhouse after the game.

Ed Hurley, the third-base umpire, immediately ejected Colavito from the game "for leaving the field."

"Hurley was very nice about it," Rocky explained. "He said, 'I know how you feel - after all, it's your father - but I have to throw you out just the same.'"

Fan Poked Wife

Friday night's trouble all started, according to Colavito's older brother, Dom, who

also was in the stands, when a fan began poking Rocky's wife, Carmen, in the back.

The unidentified fan allegedly continued to annoy Mrs. Colavito until Rocky's father, sitting alongside her, no longer could tolerate it.

"Before I knew it," said Colavito's brother, "this guy started to swing at my father. I was trying to get over there when Rocky happened to notice the commotion as he was coming in from his position in left field at the end of the eighth."

Rocky never was able to get at his wife's annoyer.

"I got close, but not close enough," he said. "Some big guy stopped me. Maybe he was just trying to help me."

Hood River's Vicki Jubitz and Joan Samuel trounced Diane Confer and Carolyn Christenson of McMinnville, 6-4, 6-1 for the doubles title.

Rounding out the top 10 in the boys' division scoring were: The Dalles 9, South Sa-

lem 9, North Salem 8, Grants Pass 7, Beaverton 7, Medford 6, Madison 5 and Wilson and Marshfield 3.

In the girls' division the other schools in the top 10 were: Hood River 13, McMinnville 11, Lake Oswego 9, Madison 9, The Dalles 6, Girls Poly 4, Hillsboro 3, and 12 other schools with one point each.

Hawaii Pounds Don Newcombe

The chunky righthander who led the National league with a 27-7 record as a member of the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1956, lost ground in his battle to win back a Dodger uniform.

He was pounded for five runs in the first seven innings as Hawaii defeated Spokane, 5-3, in a Pacific Coast league baseball game. Big Newk was lifted for a relief hurler in the eighth inning but the damage had been done and he was charged with his first loss since joining the Spokane team early this season. He won his first two starts.

Oregon 4-Mile Relay Team Smashes U.S. Record in West Coast Relays

Fresno—UPI—Dyrol Burleson, Oregon's distance sensation, turned in one of the great feats of mile history last night when he was clocked in 4:00.3 and 4:00.8 while running the anchor laps on two relay teams.

Burleson was timed in 4:00.3 while leading his teammates to a new American record of 16:29.3 in the four-mile relay. He came back less than nine hours later to anchor the distance medley relay and was clocked for the mile in 4:00.8.

Fresno—UPI—Getting a peek at the sun for the first time in a month, University of Oregon's classic four-mile relay team smashed the American record by 21.1 seconds as the West Coast relays got under way Saturday.

Anchored by Dyrol Burleson, the blond champion from Cottage Grove, Ore., Oregon was clocked in 16:29.3 compared with the pending mark of 16:50.4, set by Western Michigan in the Drake relays.

Burleson, sprinting through the first three laps and taking his time on the last, was timed in 4:00.3.

Nobody to Chase

"But I could have run faster if I had had somebody to chase," said Burleson later. He has been clocked in a 3:58.6 mile.

The other clockings were Vic Reeve, a Canadian from Vancouver, B. C., with 4:09.8 his all-time best; George Larson, from Scappoose, Ore., in 4:13.9, considerably off his best; and Keith Forman, Portland, Ore., 4:05.3.

"These boys were so happy to see the sun finally that they just ran well today," said Coach Bill Bowerman. "Maybe we'll take a shot at that world mark in the California relays at Modesto in two weeks."

Oregon State finished in second place, timed in 16:48—also breaking the old U. S. mark. University of Houston took third in 16:57.6.

Reeve got the Ducks off to a flying start, but Larson ran a bad first quarter, taking 65 seconds and Pat Clohessy, an Australian running for Houston, had his team in the lead at the end of the first two miles. But Forman came back with his good mile to get Oregon in front.

As he slowed down coming to the tape, Burleson raced back to take the baton from him and actually ran at least a mile and 10 yards.

Cracks Record

Rex Cawley, brilliant quarter miler from USC, cracked the relays record in the 400-meter hurdles with a clocking of 49.9—fastest in the world this year. The old mark here was 50.8, set by Dick Howard of New Mexico in 1959. The world mark of 49.2 is held by Glenn Davis.

Charley Clark of San Jose State easily won the 5000-meter run from a field of 35 with a time of 14:55.4.

Darrell Horn of Oregon took the hop, step and jump with 51 feet, 1 inch, and Rink Babka of the Southern California striders annexed the

discus with a not-too-good

heave of 180 feet 7 1/2 inches—more than 16 feet short of his own world mark.

Jim Grelle, former Oregon ace and member of the 1960 U. S. Olympic team, ran the best mile in the United States this year when he was timed

in 4:02.5, with a final quarter lap of 59.2. It also was the second fastest time in the world this year.

The relays record in the 400 meter dash was equalled when timed in 46.7. That mark originally was set in 1950 by the great Mal Whitfield.



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
