Mrs. Ralph Hibbs, league president, states that the group is undertaking the venture "in response to the great interest and enthusiasm throughout southern Oregon in bringing Broadway theater to the Rogue valley."

It is stated that the subscription membership plan will make it possible for Medford and southern Oregon to enjoy the same professional theater which, up until now, has only been seen in the larger cities north and south of Medford.

During the past year, plays presented by the Broadway Theater league have been "The Pleasure of His Company," with Joan Bennett, "Once Upon a Mattress," with Imogene Coco, "The

Andersonville Trials," with Brian Donlevy, and "Fiorillo."

Two of the plays to be presented during the coming season are "A Thurbur Carnival," a musical fable, and "The Best Man," a comedy by Gore Vidal, author of "Visit to a Small Planet." The two additional plays and casts for all four plays will be announced at a later date.

Fred Vogel, northwest representative of the Theater league, has announced that plans are underway to form a board of directors made up of interested people in the community as well as members of the sponsoring organization.

The district was presented an award for 100 per cent participation in the 1960-61 Care program. Mrs. Fred C. Gast, federation president, presented this award to Mrs. Clay M. Lee, Medford, First district president, at an awards banquet. First district was the only district in the state to receive this award.

Mrs. Ralph Foster, president of Ashland Women's Civic club, received an award for the club for 100 per cent participation in the federation program. Mrs. Gene Chamberlain, president of Medford Junior Women's club, and Mrs. Norman Wade, delegate for Travel Study club, both received the 100 per cent participation awards. Mrs. Lee received the award for Talent Federated Women's club, and the Rogue River Civic Improvement club for membership extension.

Judge Donald R. Cook, Umatilla county, Pendleton, spoke on child delinquency. He praised the Oregon federation for working to abolish pornography matter. He stated that when a boy or girl comes into juvenile court, the court only thinks of the child, not the parents; the court is not interested in their health, education, welfare and recreation, he said. The judge closed his talk by saying that a kind heart and understanding are better than all law books written.

The Oregon Federation took action on three resolutions. The women voted support of the Oregon Committee on Crime and Delinquency in its studies and recommendations, and encouraged local communities to take full responsibility in this effort and demonstrate that the trend in crime and delinquency can be reversed. Another resolution to support the conservation of natural resources in the state, urging state, local and federal agencies to cooperate in promoting and developing sound conservation practices, was passed. The third resolution passed was in support of the White House conference on youth.

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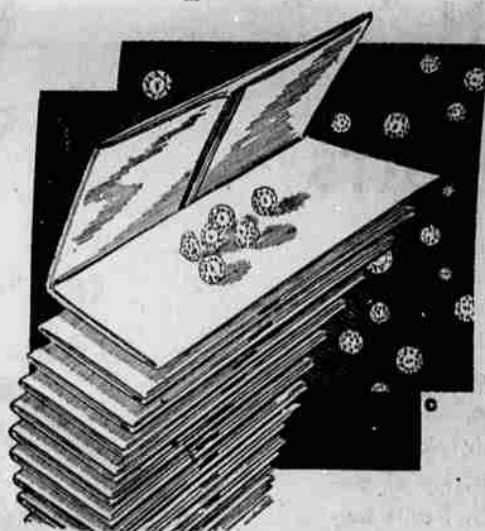
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
