

100 Physicians Attend Memorial Lectures in City

About 100 physicians from Jackson county and surrounding areas heard three medical experts specializing in the treatment of cancer at the annual John Tomlin Memorial Cancer lectures last week.

Doctors from here, Klamath Falls, Salem, Yreka, Calif., Grants Pass, Tulelake, Malin and Portland heard Dr. Sidney F. Thomas, Palo Alto, Calif., Dr. Laurens P. White, Boston, Mass., and Dr. Nicholas L. Petrakis, San Francisco.

Dr. White indicated that the time had come when "probable cure" or "prolonged remissions" could be expected in some cases from the use of the newer drugs. Encouraging results were presented with respect to the treatment of Wilms tumors, a type of cancer of the kidney in children, with the use of an antibiotic drug which seems to cause the tumor to be more sensitive to x-ray.

Produces Drugs

He said that it is only within the past 16 years that research has produced drugs which have the capability of acting on tumor or cancer tissues. The method of action is still unknown. It is thought that these anti-tumor agents possibly affect basic chemical process in the tumor cells.

Dr. Petrakis presented the natural history of leukemias and discussed possible factors in the production of this disease, such as chemical compounds, drugs, x-rays, and viruses.

Mustard or blister gas, used in World War I, has been modified so that now Hodgkin's disease and leukemias can be controlled with its use to prolong life.

Dr. Thomas showed, by means of slides and charts, the value of small doses of x-ray for certain complications of leukemias and Hodgkin's disease. Combining anti-tumor agents with x-ray resulted in increased relief over the use of either agent alone.

Available Equipment

He also demonstrated how a doctor in a small hospital using available equipment could inject tumor killing drugs into the artery of the thigh allowing the drug to circulate in a tumor of the pelvis, reducing pain associated with these tumors. The relief of pain may last from days to months.

Auditing the lectures was Dr. James Gillespie, program consultant of the American Cancer Society serving the

western half of the United States. He endorsed the idea of bringing research specialists to smaller medical centers such as Medford.

He stated that the Tomlin Memorial Cancer Lectures were unique in that seminars of this type were usually held only in large cities.

Dr. Gillespie stressed the need for the dissemination of newer medical information to physicians. He also asserted that if this information was to be applied to the saving of lives, that the public must cooperate by seeking medical advice at the first sign of disease.

Kennedy Ponders Khrushchev Parley

Palm Beach, Fla. — UP—President Kennedy today awaited word from Geneva and Moscow on whether it will be possible to meet informally with Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev in Stockholm or Vienna early next month.

The Chief Executive and his wife planned to fly back to Washington this afternoon after a long Florida week end.

A decision on the meeting with Khrushchev was not expected before Kennedy returned from Canada next Thursday. The Chief Executive and his wife fly to Ottawa Tuesday afternoon for a two-day ceremonial visit, their first trip to a foreign country since the inauguration.

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Price Machinery For Milk Shaping

Salem — UP—State Agriculture Department officials say they are moving "very rapidly" to implement the milk price control bill should Gov. Mark Hatfield sign it.

The law would go into effect immediately and would stay in effect until Dec. 31, 1962.

It would let the department set prices to producers, stabilizing the industry which is concerned over a milk price drop in northwest Oregon.

Some dairymen say the revenue loss from reduced prices will bankrupt them if continued.

Agriculture Director James F. Short is prepared to appoint an administrator to head the program. Other necessary personnel would include a secretary field representatives, clerks and auditors.

The department would conduct hearings in milk-producing areas throughout the state to determine what prices should be in individual areas.
