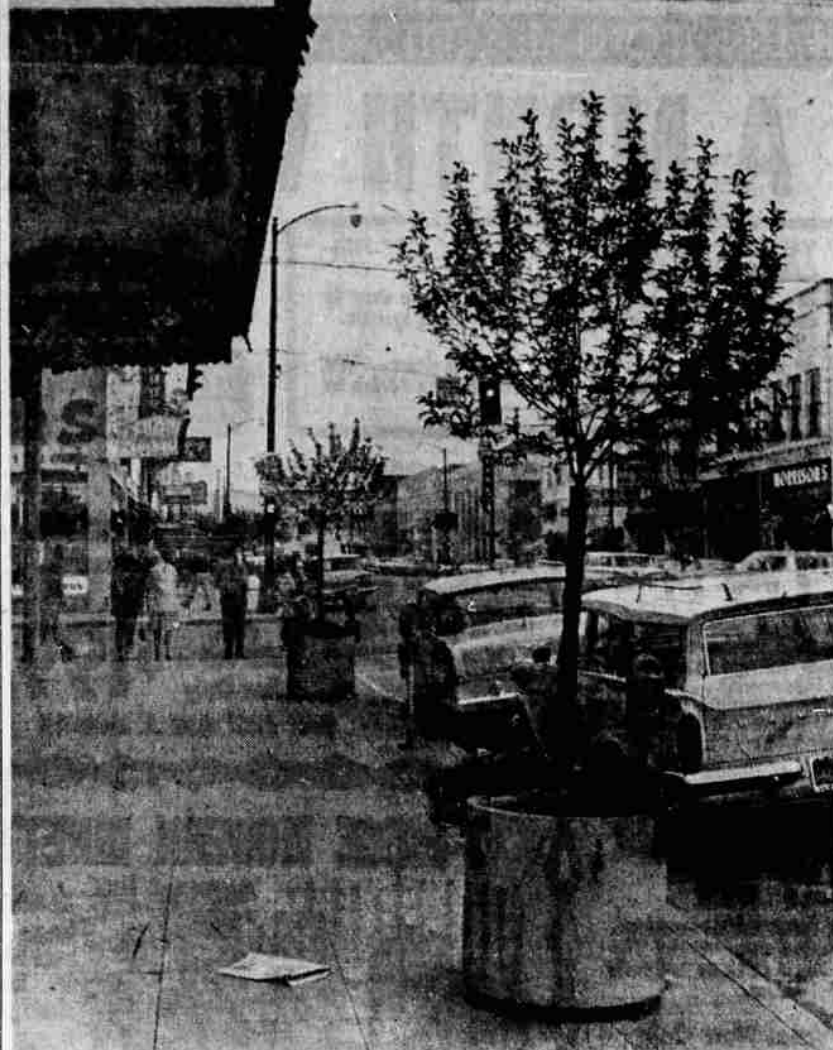

Work of Volunteers Reviewed At Quarterly Meeting of VAVS

White City—Representatives and guests of the Veterans Administration Volunteer Services attended the quarterly meeting recently at the White City domiciliary, according to Manager Henry C. Herzog.

Forty-eight representatives of organizations affiliated with VAVS reviewed past work and future plans. Herzog said. Dr. A. W. Foley, chief psychologist, spoke briefly.

Fourteen organizations volunteered to serve as an honor guard for the annual Memorial Day observances Tuesday, May 30, at the VA cemetery.

Emil B. Kroeger, Ashland, Oregon State Elks association representative, said his organization would provide printed covers for the Memorial Day programs.

Hours of Service
About 25,000 hours of voluntary service is contributed by 22 southern Oregon and northern California organization members, Frank J. Glonning, deputy chairman of the VAVS advisory committee, said.

Activities include several contributions and programs designed for the welfare, recreation and entertainment of the disabled—veteran members of the domiciliary, including everything from passive games for wheelchair members to sewing, live theater entertainment, dances, gifts of clothing, books, games, prizes, art, literature, language, reading clubs and music classes.

Hundreds of local posts and chapters of the various organizations throughout Oregon also contribute directly and indirectly to the VAVS project.

A review of the plans for the Memorial Day ceremonies was presented at the quarterly meeting, Glonning said. Eagle Point Cub Scouts will play the national anthem, "Stars and Stripes Forever," and "God Bless America." Father Lawrence Eskay will deliver the invocation.
