Planned in its entirety before construction began, Mr. Brill reports that the design is somewhat hard to understand until explained.

The city will have no traffic stop lights and it is said that it will be possible to cross the entire city in about 10 minutes driving time, the travelers reported.

The Brills also visited the construction city where the more than 50,000 workers and their families are living while Brazilia is being completed. The travelers also visited Rio de Janeiro, which they thought "spectacular" and were particularly excited by the plane trip from Rio to Lima, Peru. Flying at about 24,000 feet by the snow-covered peaks of the Andes, the Brills took pictures of the vast range through the plane windows. In Lima they visited the pre-Inca and Inca ruins.

En route south the travelers stopped at Port au Prince, Haiti and in Trinidad, and also made a stop at Caracas. The return trip was by way of Panama, and Tucson, Ariz., where the Brills had left their car with their son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. George DeGregori. While on vacation the Brills also visited their son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Edminister, Merced, Calif.
