Carry Back also made an appearance on the Pimlico strip Sunday, galloping for about 2 1/4 miles. Trainer Jack Price indicated he will give the Derby winner a "real run" either today or Tuesday.

The Preakness gained two more starters during the week end—Hitting Away and Fountain Hill—enlarging the probable field to eight.

Picking Up Fawn Deer Unlawful

Portland outdoor users have been issued a reminder by the game commission that it is illegal to pick up fawn deer or any other young bird or animal found in the wild.

With camping, fishing and other outdoor uses now getting in full swing, outdoorsmen will be coming across many of these young creatures in their travels through the fields and forests of the state, game officials brought out.

Foremost on the list are individuals taken in by the soft, limpid-eyed look of mother nature's most beautiful resident, baby deer, whose first reaction is to pick up the little "deserted" creature and take it home as a pet, thus becoming a benefactor of wildlife. Such action on the part of the individual may prove dangerous as well as costly.

Oregon law states that it shall be illegal for anyone to hold in captivity and bird or animal of the state without a permit from the game commission. According to the commission, no permits are issued for the keeping of fawns for pets. Anyone picking up a fawn and holding it in captivity is subject to prosecution under the law.

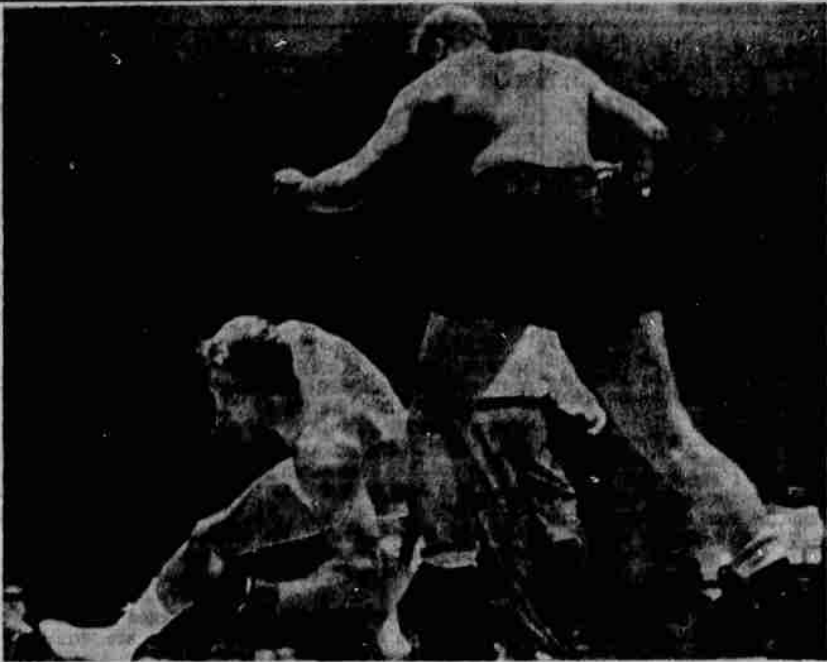
This ruling is to protect both the fawns and the people involved. Not only does captivity put the fawn in unnatural surroundings, but often, as the fawn grows older, this cute little creature can become dangerous. In the past many persons have been seriously injured by the slashing hooves or sharp-tined antlers of their pets.

Nature has amply provided fawn deer with spotted coats for camouflage and consequent protection from predators. Female deer often leave their young while they forage, and the fawns, dependent upon their protective camouflage, will allow persons to come near and even pet them. Often the mother is frightened away by the interloper but will return promptly when danger is past. And don't let be misled, the commission says this little creature is not lost or abandoned.

Only close observation should be the extent of the individual's relation with fawn deer. The commission advises to break out the camera and take all the pictures one likes, then back off and leave the little fellow right where he is found.

Oregon Aces To Attempt World Mark at Modesto

Eugene—UPI—University of Oregon track coach Bill Bowerman announced Monday that Oregon's four-mile relay team, holder of the American collegiate record, will make another attempt to break the world mark at the Modesto, Calif., Relays May 27.

The four-man Duck contingent, led by anchor man Dyrrol Burelson, established a new American collegiate mark at the Far West Relays at Fresno Saturday with a clocking of 16:29.3, only four seconds below the world mark.

The world mark of 16:25.2 was set by a Hungarian team at Budapest in 1959.

The Oregon team will compete against Oregon State university and Western Michigan at Modesto May 27.

Other members of the Oregon quartet are George Larson, Vic Reeve, and Keith Forman.

Card Manager Blasts Umpire

Pittsburgh—UPI—Rain forced a postponement of the St. Louis-Pittsburgh game Monday night but the biggest storm was kicked up in a name-calling battle between Cardinal Manager Solly Hemus and Umpire Frank Secory.

The 5-8 Hemus described the 6-2 Secory as "arrogant" and the umpire replied that his adversary was "an umpire balter who had a bad reputation as a manager and a player."

The David-Goliath battle of words took place in front of the visitors' dugout at Forbes Field before the scheduled series opener was taped by St. Louis radio station KMOX and fed to a 70-station network. Sports broadcaster Harry Caray conducted the interview.

Origin In Philadelphia

The dispute had its origin Sunday in Philadelphia when Umpire Frank Secory ejected Hemus. Solly thought Philly infielder Jim Woods had been tagged out by Cardinal third

Pitchers Shelled in Monday Major League Encounters

Someone must be feeding those hitters raw meat and that gesture isn't the least bit appreciated by any of the many battered American or National league pitchers.

The pitchers have every right to moan when you consider all the damage done them Monday.

The Cleveland Indians, for example, carried on as if it were batting practice. They went on their biggest spree in nearly four years with a merciless 21-hit attack in a 13-2 victory over the Boston Red Sox.

Giants Batter Cubs

San Francisco's sluggers never let up against five Chicago Cubs' pitchers, either. The Giants smashed out 18 hits in a 14-1 massacre.

And the Tigers entered into the spirit of the occasion with a solid 15-hit assault that buried the Baltimore Orioles, 10-5.

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The Indians' hit total against loser Ted Willis and Two Red Sox relievers was their highest since Sept. 13, 1957. Jim Piersall had four of the Tribe's hits while Woody Held and Tito Francona contented themselves with three apiece.

With such hitting support, it was a breeze for Jim (Mudcat) Grant, who limited Boston to three hits, including a two-run homer by rookie Carl Yastrzemski.

Braves Beat Dodgers

In the National League, the Milwaukee Braves defeated the Los Angeles Dodgers, 7-5, and rain washed out the only other game scheduled between the St. Louis Cardinals and Pittsburgh Pirates.

Camilo Pascual held the White Sox to four hits and struck out seven in winning his third game for the Twins. Minnesota hopped on loser Cal McLish for two runs on three hits in the first inning and that was more than enough for Pascual.

Pinch hitter Lou Klimchick's eighth inning single broke up a 3-3 tie between the A's and Angels. Although touched for 10 hits, Bud Daley went the distance for the A's to even his record at 4-4. Reliever Ted Bowsfield was the loser.

Burdette Wins, Homers

Lew Burdette of the Braves, who hasn't lost at the Los Angeles Coliseum since 1958, scored his eighth straight victory there and his third of the season by stopping the Dodgers on seven hits. Burdette aided his own cause with a homer.

Nieder Flattened In First Round

Philadelphia—UPI—Olympic shotput champion Bill Nieder picked up the broken pieces of his pro boxing debut today and vowed to continue fighting, with former heavyweight Jersey Joe Walcott newly hired as his trainer.

Jim Willey, a Philadelphia heavyweight with a 10-9-6 record, wrecked the blond Nieder's fists bow Monday night by knocking him out at 2:01 of the first round.

Nieder, whose only previous boxing experience was an amateur in Kansas in 1954 when he scored six knockouts in a row, was floored twice, the force of the second one sending him stumbling across the ring and through the ropes.

Completes Count

When Referee Joe Sweeney completed the count of 10, Nieder, aided by helpful ring-side fans, was trying to squeeze back into the ring between the lower and middle ropes. He didn't make it in time.

About one minute earlier, another potent Willey right had dropped the Olympian to one knee. He sprang quickly to his feet and took a mandatory eight count.

"It was a big mismatch," said Nieder, who stands 6-foot-3 and weighed 216 pounds, 18 more than Willey.

"I wasn't hurt," the amiable 26-year-old said. "I was more embarrassed than anything else."

"Big Bill was first to admit he needed more training. Walcott, who handled him in the past few weeks here in an advisory capacity, nodded in agreement."

BAXES RELEASED

Portland —UPI—Jim Baxes, veteran third baseman who was batting only .095, was handed his outright release by the Portland Beavers of the Pacific Coast league Monday. Baxes' release brought the Portland roster down to the PCL limit of 21.
