Plantings Are Increased At Garden of Old Roses

Medford Rose society reports that in recent weeks members have worked at the old rose garden in Jacksonville. This garden was established a year ago with the thought of perpetuating some of the loveliest of the older roses in a historical spot where they may be enjoyed by those who visit the Jacksonville museum, as well as all rose lovers.

On April 29 several members of the society spent a work day in the garden, weeding it, and digging new holes for additional roses. Roy Arthur, Dayton Dupue, Eldred Peyton, Wallace Peabody and Randal Axtell were the workers that day. They were served a luncheon at the Peabody home by Mrs. Peabody.

On May 6 a follow-up work day was observed when a shipment of the old roses was

received. At that time Carl Norris, Eldred Peyton and Randal Axtell planted 103 more roses in the garden. These roses are Bourbons, hybrid perpetuals, ramblers, moss roses, and musk roses. Most of them are the repeat blooming type which will add greatly to the delight of the garden all summer. It is stated that a great many of the older roses are very fragrant which is a characteristic often lost in modern roses in an attempt to improve the flower.

Mrs. Axtell and Mrs. Norris charted the roses.
