Shakespearean Drama Sweeps Television's Academy Awards

"Life is but a walking shadow, a poor player that struts and frets his hour upon the stage and then is heard no more." William Shakespeare's "Macbeth" was heard from again, however, Tuesday night. The two-hour Shakespearean drama won five awards, sweeping the 13th annual television Academy Award presentation.

It won the top honor of the night — the program of the year.

Additionally, the show won an Emmy for outstanding program achievement in the field of drama. Costars Maurice Evans and Judith Anderson were awarded statuettes for best single performance by an actor and actress, respectively. Its director, George Schaefer, won the outstanding directorial achievement award.

Perhaps more dramatic than "Macbeth's" success was the victory of Jack Benny for the best program achievement in the field of humor.

Benny, a weeping pallbearer at Gary Cooper's funeral earlier in the day, was too grief-stricken to appear at the star-studded presentation ceremonies at the Moulin Rouge night club.

There were more than 100 empty seats at the Moulin Rouge.

The 90-minute television telecast was held simultaneously at the Hollywood nitery and the Ziegfeld Theater in New York. Dick Powell was master of ceremonies in the West and Comedian Joey Bishop handled the chores in the East.

In all, 24 Emmys were presented to the top performers, shows and technicians of the television industry — and several old movie names were prominent among the award winners.

Among the three networks, the Columbia Broadcasting System won 11 Emmys, tying with the National Broad-

casting Co. The American Broadcasting Co. won two, one for the outstanding documentary, "The Valiant Years," and a technical award.

Dance master Fred Astaire won an Emmy for the variety show achievement of the year and another for outstanding performance in a variety or musical program, "Astaire Time."

It was the third consecutive year he has carted home awards.

The Emmy for outstanding performance by an actress in a series went to Barbara Stanwyck for her "Barbara Stanwyck show."

Harry Ackerman, president of the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences, cited everyone who had any-

thing to do with the presidential debates, including President Kennedy and former Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

Other winners included Raymond Burr, "Perry Mason," outstanding performance by an actor in a series leading role; Rod Sterling, "Twilight Zone," outstanding writing achievement in drama; Roddy McDowell, "Not Without Honor," American Heritage, outstanding supporting role performer in a single program; and Don Knotts, "The Andy Griffith show," outstanding supporting role performer in a series.

Huntley-Brinkley report won the award for outstanding program achievement in the news field.

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South Korea Troops Told To Keep Hands Off Military Coup

Seoul, Korea — (UPI) — The commander of South Korea's front line troops defied U. S. Gen. Carter B. Magruder today and ordered his troops to keep hands off the military coup that overthrew the government.

The order was issued by Lt. Gen. Lee Han Lim, commander of the republic of Korea's First Army which contains most of the ROK combat units that guard the demilitarized zone facing the Communists.

The order fell short of announcing outright support for the new military regime in Seoul but it was a severe setback to Magruder's appeal for

Space Power Gap May Be Bigger Than Believed

Washington — (UPI) — A report from behind the Iron Curtain suggests that the space power gap between Russia and the United States is bigger and may take longer to close than Americans have supposed.

The report, if it is true, indicates the Russians already have a spacecraft launcher more powerful than the Saturn rocket with which this country had hoped at least to narrow the power gap in 1964.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration has estimated the power of Russia's "basic booster" at 800,000 pounds of thrust.

This is more than twice the power of the Atlas, biggest rocket now available to the U. S. space program. But it is only about half the 1.5 million pounds of thrust generated by the Saturn's booster stage.

It now appears, however, that the Russians already may be using a space vehicle with a weight-lifting power of close to two million pounds of thrust.

This is suggested in a report on "Soviet-Bloc Research in Geophysics, Astronomy, and Space" compiled by the U. S. Joint Publications Research Service and distributed by the Commerce Department.

The report quotes a "Hungarian space expert" named Jozsef Sinka as saying the vehicle which launched the Soviet Venus probe Feb. 12 was a five-stage rocket weighing 1.6 million pounds.

This would make it about six times as heavy as the Atlas. It also would be 800,000 pounds heavier than the three stage Saturn vehicle.

If Sinka is right about the weight of the Venus rocket, its booster stage must generate around two million pounds of thrust, according to U. S. space experts.

troop support of the fallen government of Prime Minister John M. Chang.

Magruder, a United Nations commander in South Korea, technically controls the 500,000 man ROK military forces for "operations and administration." But as a matter of political reality he has little more than moral persuasion to enforce his orders.

Indignation Grows

Lee's announcement came as indignation grew over U. S. interference in South Korea's affairs. The military junta, headed by Lt. Chang Do Yung, gained support by the hour and started forming a new government.

The committee appointed full colonels to act as "liaison" men in the 12 major government offices and the Seoul city government. Civilian as well as military men were being considered for an interim cabinet and the names were expected to be published Thursday.

The United States found itself in an uncomfortable position.

Newspapers, politicians and people on the streets — even some who opposed the coup — criticized Magruder and U. S. Embassy Charge d'Affaires Marshall Green for issuing statements of support for the Chang government after it fell Tuesday.

Many believed they had backed a man who clearly had lost the confidence of the people and the nation through failure to wipe out corruption and poverty.

Stands By Statement

Nevertheless, Green stood by his statement today in a brief meeting with newsmen. "As far as my position is

concerned, I stated that yesterday unequivocally," he said.

Soldiers under the rebel commander threw up defenses on the outskirts of Seoul today to defend major roads leading from the north, but it was believed that Lee's announcement of neutrality canceled any military threat from this direction.

President Posun Yun, confined to his mansion, conferred for a half hour with Gen. Chang and several politicians, apparently in an effort by the revolutionaries to effect a smooth transfer of power.

At least seven of Chang's 15-member cabinet were reported under arrest, although Chang himself was missing.

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Wasco Demands for Hearing Rejected

Portland — (UPI) — A demand by Wasco county fruit growers for an immediate public hearing on alleged air pollution from the Harvey Aluminum company plant at The Dalles was turned down today by the State Sanitary Authority.

The vote was unanimous.

The decision came after an hour of debate in which reference was made several times to a suit filed by 25 Wasco county fruit growers seeking a permanent injunction against the aluminum firm.

Dr. Richard Wilcox, state health officer, questioned whether the Federal Court case might not produce the same testimony as a public hearing by the Sanitary Authority. Cecil Quesseth, attorney for the authority, said he believed it would.

The SSA last April 4 voted to continue indefinitely a show cause hearing in the case.

Judge Anderson's Body Discovered

Mill City — (UPI) — The wreckage of a light white and red Piper Tri-pacer containing the body of Circuit Judge Richard Anderson, 38, Newport, was discovered in a heavily wooded area 10 miles south of here Tuesday.

The discovery was made by Bruce Chambers, Salem, a bureau of land management employee. Robert Dunn, assistant director of the State Board of Aeronautics, said the plane was found in the "Snow Peak" area.

Judge Anderson's body was carried out of the heavily-wooded area today by a search party.

The plane had been missing on a flight from Newport to Lebanon since March 18 and was last heard from over Springfield the afternoon of the disappearance when Anderson reportedly he was taking
